## Can mold make me sick?

Mold can make some people sick. The problems mold cause are often the same as any allergy that affects your nose, throat, and lungs.

#### The most common health problems due to mold are:

- runny nose
- stuffy head
- itchy eyes
- •
- cough

• headaches

sneezing

sore throat

- rash
- fatigue
- upper respiratory infections
- asthma attacks

#### If you or someone in your home has asthma:



Being around mold can cause serious problems for a baby, child or adult who has asthma or other immune system issues.

You can't always stop mold from growing in your house, but it is very important that mold is cleaned up quickly to make sure that it will not trigger an asthma attack or cause other serious problems in people who are already sick.

## How can mold make me sick?

You can get sick from mold by:

- breathing in the tiny spores that mold releases
- touching the mold with your skin
- touching your eyes, nose, or mouth with fingers that have mold spores on them
- eating food that has mold on it



# Is it a cold or is it mold?



One way you can tell if your health problems are due to a mold allergy or if you are sick is to pay attention to how you feel when you are away from the place you think has mold.

If you feel better when you leave your home or office for a while, then there may be mold or something else that you are allergic to there.

If your problems do not go away, then you might have a cold or other sickness.
