Executive Director's Report

What a year!



Early in 2023, we weren't sure what to expect as we embarked on a completely different method of presentation. Local organisations were on their path to recovery and audience numbers were just starting to make a tangible rebound after the holiday performances concluded.

MUO was embarking on a completely new model. Sure, we had data and testimonials to ensure us that we were on the right path, but big change is never guaranteed.

2023 featured MUO's first full season of activities. What brought on the change? It's simplest to say that we outgrew our festival format for a variety of reasons. Filling ten days with three different productions or concerts was asking a lot of ourselves and our patrons during the treasured last moments of summer. We saw on countless surveys that patrons would see more of us if it was spread out. Also, we could support our artists more without spreading our attention across different productions.

And so, we birthed our new season format. Three productions between May and September; uniquely MUO. As many organizations wind down, MUO opens up. Prudently, we decided to continue with our late August performance date for one of our productions but May and September allow us to reach new audiences and build momentum. The worries and doubts we had were quickly dispelled as each performance reassured us that we made the right decision by selling out! A particular highlight was selling out our production of The Corsair an entire week before we opened.

Financially, we hit the \$200,000 milestone for the first (and not last) time. Public support skyrocketed thanks to five separate project grants from the Canada Council for the Arts and Government of Canada, totalling over \$100,000. Individual donations grew and we welcomed a new corporate sponsor for our Opera for Children Tour. Box office hit a company record totaling over \$28,000.

Our financial success afforded us the opportunity to pay artists over \$100,000 for the work they did. Onstage or off, they told stories or heartbreak, triumph, and tormented a lost man with horrendously outdated views.

We continued to build bridges to our community by working with organizations not typically associated with opera. Our first production turned the Pyramid Cabaret, normally known for punk and hip hop, into a methodical realm with crazed opera fans. We returned to Club 200 to celebrate queerness and raise funds for Sunshine House, one of our favourite social charities. We also performed a lesbian pirate opera on a boat. I'll remember that one forever.

None of this would be possible without our beloved supporters. Thank you to our donors, sponsors, government agencies, and patrons. You believed in us, championed us, and celebrated what opera can be. Beyond that, you have demonstrated unwavering trust in our artistic vision. We can't wait to show you more.

From hell to heaven, back to hell, and then to a pirate ship!



Opera Around Town & Events



In May, we participated in Heritage Winnipeg's Doors Open. Singers Paul Forget, Paulina Gonzalez, and pianist Paul Rodermond presented a program of opera and musical theatre to patrons in between tours of Cercle Moliere's space.

In December, our artists gathered to spread the holiday cheer with caroling at the Winnipeg Art Gallery.

Thanks to the Canada Council for the Arts, we began a series of fabulous concerts at Club 200. 2022's ultrasuccessful *Divas & Dragoons* returned for two shows in December with many more scheduled for 2024. MUO started the year with a season launch party in March at Winnipeg Film Group. The event included upcoming artists, recordings of *The Mansplaining Division*, and an appropriately adorable, yet somewhat unhinged, preview video of our Opera for Children Tour.

In November we held a fundraiser for our Opera for Children Tour. Our outstanding Board of Directors took the reins under the leadership of Rosemarie van der Hooft. *Let's Party* was a charming get together held at the St. Norbert Arts Centre featuring jazz and cabaret with a silent auction and lots of treats. Together, we raised over \$3,000 towards bringing opera to children across our province.

Supporting Artistic Talent

The next generation of creative leaders



The artist's journey in opera is never straightforward to become a creative leader. This year, MUO invested in helping the next generation of leaders gain experience in the operatic artform through two assistantships, one apprenticeship, and a Conductor position.

MUO began a partnership with Tapestry Opera's Women in Musical Leadership Program. This program addresses a historic gender inequity on the podium by providing women and non-binary conductors active mentorship with leading conductors in the field, deep and varied experience with professional companies, and a robust artistic network. Conductor Maria Fuller joined us for *The Corsair* in one of the few Conductor positions offered in opera across the country.

Three local artists were selected to work with our directors this season as well. They already had extensive training in the theatre industry but less experience behind the table in opera rehearsals. Melissa Langdon and Max Fingerote worked alongside Adam Da Ros for *Castor et Polux* and Ntara Curry worked alongside Sawyer Craig for *The Corsair*.

Artists Engagement Report Creating Space for All to Thrive

Thanks to federal support through the Community Services Revitalization Fund, we engaged J. Hogue and Associates to hold a consultation with 13 artists that were part of our 2023 season.

Spurred by the desire to create an environment of care and actively challenge oppression, we launched the Artist Engagement Project. The purpose of the project was to connect with artists who had worked with MUO to learn how the company can shift and grow to ensure it is a place where all artists can thrive.

We learned more about how we can support artists whose identities are targeted by oppression to make their best work.

Below are a sample of the ten recommendations we received.

- Continue to use found spaces. Ensure these locations consider the needs of artists and consider accessibility for both audience and artists.
- Produce more contemporary operas, including operas that connect with the diversity of cultures within Manitoba and operas that challenge oppression.
- Continue adapting operas and roles in ways that challenge biases and oppression. Ensure there is full consideration for the impact of the adaptations and that both the adaptations and their impacts are explored with the cast.





Financials

At MUO, we value transparency. Yes, there was a deficit this year. We knew this was coming when we didn't receive federal support for our Opera for Children Tour. We decided to soldier through and present our tour despite the certainty of needing to dip into our surplus. We knew that over 500 children and their families outside of Winnipeg deserved access to live opera performance. We're grateful that we had five consecutive surpluses to rely on and use when it was absolutely necessary.


Earlier this year, we were delighted to see that MUO ranked 23rd in Opera Canada's Top 40 companies for our 2022 season.

Building on that success, we increased our revenue to over \$200,000 for the first time in company history.
