
## Saint Blaise, Bishop and Martyr

St.Blaise was a physician born in Sebaste, Armenia. He devoted himself zealously to the practice of Christianity and later became the Bishop of Sebaste at a time when Christians were being persecuted in early second century.

During the persecution of Licinius, St. Blaise moved from the town and lived as a hermit in a cave and cured wild animals he came upon. St. Blaise was later captured, imprisoned and tortured and executed for upholding his Christian faith. While imprisoned, visitors were permitted, many who were sick or injured and was able to cure and heal many.

His intercession was invoked for diseases of the Throat in the East. in the sixth century, St. Blaise in the sixth century and became a popular Saint during the Middle ages.

One reason for St. Blaise's popularity came from his being a physical performing miraculous cures especially those with throat ailments. Eventually, the custom of the blessing of throats arose. The priest held crossed candles to the throats while invoking the prayer of the saint and imparted God's blessing: "Through the intercession of St. Blaise, bishop and martyr, may God deliver you from every disease of the throat and from every other illness, in the name of the Father, and of the Son, and of the Holy Spirit." This practice continues on St. Blaise's feast day. February 3 is the Feast of St. Blaise.



## Web Site



At the recent Church Wake of Deacon Johnson, a father brought his young daughter to us who wanted to know why we post our Honor Guards by the casket?

When a member of the Knights of Columbus dies, if he was a member of the Fourth Degree (the ones who

wear the plumes and have the swords), an honor guard is present during the Vigil of the Deceased.

We do this as a mark of respect and honor for the deceased member. It is said that no man who stands with us never stands alone. It is also comforting for the family to experience this tribute and will be remembered for a long time.

Near the end of a wake, the honor guard is relieved of its watch and usually leads the attendees in a prayer service and presentation of a certificate.

# History of the Massachusetts Knights of Columbus

Daniel J. Gallagher was born in Newton, on August 31, 1873 and died on March 23, 1953. He was elected the eighth State Deputy on May 9, 1916. On May 10, 1896, he became Charter Grand Knight of Council 167 in Newton, MA when he was appointed District Deputy (1912-1914). He had transferred to Dorchester Lower Mills Council 180.

Only Sacred Heart Council 1847 in Framingham, was instituted in 1916 under his tenure. Even though Mr. Gallagher left as his legacy in his first report at the State Convention on May 10, 1916 that Councils should merge. Only Newman 825 of Springfield merged with Home City 63 on April 15, 1917 and Maplewood Council 448 of Malden merged with Santa Maria 105 on October 5, 1919. The size of the Knights of Columbus continued to grow. From 31,815 in 1916 to 34,961 by 1917 and 36,466 by 1918. This increase of 4,651 in so short a time showed

that the Order was strongly alive even after the World Way I.

One point that Mr. Gallagher emphasized before he left office was the need to circulate the Columbia. It was through its columns that \$50,000 was collected between 1899 and 1904 to endow a Chair of American History at Catholic University.

William J. Day was born on November 18, 1876 and died on May 30, 1950. He served as Grand Knight of Bunker Hill Council 62 (1911-1912), as District Deputy (1912-1916), delegate to the Supreme Convention (1914-1916) and State Secretary (1916-1918).

Mr. Day was elected as the 9th State Deputy in 1918 and served until 1921. The membership jumped from 38,446 members in 1918 to 72,049 members when he left office in 1921. As impressive as it is noted, it fell short of his goal of 75,000 members as stated at the State Convention of 1919. Seven councils were instituted

during his tenure. St. Augustine 2049 in Millville, Fr. John J. Flatley 2095 Canton, Maynard 2121 in Maynard, Orange 2135 in Orange, Monson 2151 in Monson, United 2212 in Springfield and North Quincy 2259 in Quincy.

The major challenge that faced Mr.
Day was to organize the efforts of the Knights of
Columbus to help servicemen in World Way I.
"Everybody Welcome! Everything Free!" became a
slogan of the Order with the Bay State collected
over half a million dollars

During the War, the Knights of Columbus followed the servicemen to the battlefield with chaplains. Among these volunteers, two Massachusetts priests, Oscar Boucher and John B. DeValles were cited for bravery. At the 1920 Convention, it went on record in support of the Congressional Medal of Honor for Father DeValles who died on May 12.

Our Assembly History starts next month
