t's been almost two years since, while at a Friday evening Hardee's cruise, a sharp looking 1961Corvette entered the parking lot and backed in next to my '57 Pontiac. I had never seen the car or driver before. As he exited the beautiful machine, I extended my hand, welcoming him.

# Antique Tag Info for Florida

Many of our members, especially those new in the hobby, may have some confusion on how to properly register and tag your antique vehicles. The following information may help you.



You may use a standard "MyFLORIDA.com" on your antique vehicle if you choose. They are available in three standard styles; County, Sunshine

Standard Florida License Tag State or "In God We Trust" styles. Several "Vanity" style plates are also available. Go to myfloridaspecialtyplate.com to see what is currently available.

Most people who own antique vehicles prefer to use an appropriate antique tag. If you are registering a modified or unmodified vehicle, manufactured in 1946 or license plate number).

later, and is at least 30 years old, you may choose the light blue "Antique" tag. If the car is modified, the engine must be at least 30 years old as well to qualify. For example, if you have

a 1947 Ford, with a 1988 engine, you must wait until 2019 to register the vehicle with an antique tag. Form HSMV83045 must be filled out to use this option.

If your vehicle is unmodified and 1945 or older, it is specialty tag is available as classified as an "Ancient" vehicle and you may wish to apply for a "Horseless Carriage" Tag. These are perma-



nent, non transferable tags, which do not need to be renewed each year. The vehicle must weigh less than 5000 pounds to this style. Form - HSMV 83045 must be

The most esteemed tag among Florida old car hobbyists is the "Authenticated" year of manufacture (YOM) tag. These are original Florida tags, in good

condition, 1975 and earlier with County code and any Class code. The documentation listed at the top of the next column must be sub- Authenticated "YOM" Florida Tag, mitted to the follow-



ing address for authentication:

**Department of Highway Safety and Motor Vehicles Title and Registration Issuance** 2900 Apalachee Parkway, MS #72 Tallahassee, FL 32399

Include a letter requesting the authentication of the license plate. The letter must include the following information:

- 1. Your mailing address (printed). If an out-of-state address or a post office box is used, a Florida residence address must also be provided unless you are an active duty member of the Armed Forces of the United States who is also a Florida resident. Such an applicant is exempt from this requirement.
- 2. Your Driver License number or owner's sex (using "F" for female or "M" for male) and date of birth (month, day, and year). If joint ownership, give the information for both owners.
- 3. A description of the license plate (the year and
- 4. A. A description of the vehicle (year, make, VIN number and title number).
- B. The actual license plate (for authentication purposes) must be furnished by the owner.
  - C. Include a copy of your insurance card.
- D. You must include a check or money order in the amount of \$60.00 (an estimated amount for most originals and renewals), made payable to DDL. Once authenticated the license plate is mailed back to you by certified mail.

For Street Rodders, a well. The requirements for this tag are: The vehicle must be 1949 or older, fitted



with major components, Street Rod Florida License tag such as engine, driveline, brakes, suspension and other major components manufactured after 1949.

Lastly, there are several specialty tags available; go to www.myfloridaspecialtyplate.com to see what versions are available. Costs vary. You may also apply for a personalized tag number such as "52OLDS". Form HSMV 83043 must be filled out to apply. First, check the availability of your specialty number by going to: https://sevices.flhsmv.gov/MVCheckPersonalPlate/.

Since many local DMV employees do not know how to handle "Horseless Carriage" and "YOM" tags, go to tyraaca.org/vomprocedure.htm for instructions.

I hope this helps clear up some confusion. Any current DMV changes will supersede any info in this article.


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






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
