

BUT...


I really have to put it down. I have been asking... almost begging for the better part of the past 6 months for someone to step up. No takers...




Frank 'Rocky' Fiegel, born in Poland on January 27, 1868. He emigrated with his family to America where in 1887 he joined the Navy.



Coolant Hoses

It is Winter right now, but our cars, including the classics, can get real hot if we develop leaks in the cooling system. It is something that you will want to consider.

Our classics will generally have 2 radiator hoses, and then 2 heater hoses. Many will have a bypass hose near the water pump. If any of these fail, you will wind up like the guy in the picture to the right! Not a great sight, and something that always happens at a bad time.

For our classics, especially if we intend to show them, you should have original type molded to fit hoses. These will look like original and for the sake of judging are acceptable. They may be quite more expensive than a flex hose that we see here and there at times. Be carful to use the period correct hose clamps! Just ask Ralph about that!!

Heater hoses are simple and inexpensive. If you change your own, be careful not to yank and pull on the connections at the firewall. If you do you risk damaging your actual heater core. They can be both expensive and not much fun to install... so be careful.

If you have a bypass hose, it is generally near the water pump and easy to spot.

It is suggested that you inspect your hoses at least annually and replace them if suspect for age and wear. It is easier to keep up on them than to have them burst at the worst moment!





Were Cars Better in the Old Days?

Most of us have heard and/or stated the phrase, "They don't make 'em like they used to" many times as we talk with friends, other owners, and spectators at old car events. Whether the old vehicles are better is up for debate. My answer is a firm ves – and no: it depends on how the comparisons are made. Let's examine some of the facts.

on cars from 40 or more years ago were made from much heavier steel than the modern cars, not to mention all the most cars from that era were roomier with larger trunk space. The older cars were much easier for the average owner to do their own vehicle maintenance. As an example, a fuel pump could be changed in a few minutes by Now let's consider our modern vehicles; By using computremoving two bolts. Some cars today have the fuel pump located in the gas tank, a much more complicated feat to achieve.

An important part of our old car hobby is that we enjoy

driving. Cars from that era required more attention as they were being driven. There were no driver aids such as power brakes and steering, stability and traction control, abs brakes, warning buzzers and bells, cruise control, GPS, among others. These gadgets contribute to a modern cars "safety" but also make the driver more complacent about speed, driving too close to the vehicle in front, hard braking of the vehicle when stopping, rather than a gradual slowdown among others. Having control of these driving features is part of the fun of the old car hobby.

Virtually everyone agrees the styling of our classics is far superior to what is available today. 40 or more years ago, There is no doubt the frames, sheet metal, bumpers etc. every brand, even among the vehicles from the same company, had its own styling and evolved with each model year. In the last 25 years, most of the brands, foreign and plastic used in modern cars. Depending on the model, domestic, look so similar that it is impossible to tell the brand. Don't forget, the rumble of a tuned V-8 engine was a pleasant sound for most of us.


used today. Reliability has improved as well. Our older cars were considered shot or required an engine and transmission rebuild around 100,000 miles. Now, you can expect to get 200,000 or even many more miles from most brands. Much of this comes from improved lubricants, as well as advanced engineering, stronger materials and more precise tolerances used in the manufacturing process.

As mentioned before, modern cars have driver aids, which actually do assist less experienced or distracted drivers. Today's radial tires, with proper maintenance, are safer and last longer than the bias type tire construction of yesteryear. Research has proven that shoulder belts, air bags, side air bags, built in crumple zones, warning lights/buzzers, as well as backup cameras, help save serious injury or death from accidents.

Other areas of improvement through the years, are rust protection, better paints and finishes, as well as optional creature comforts. These include, cruise control, power windows, power door locks, XM radio, Bluetooth, heated and cooled seats, individual AC control and others.

So, which is better? It all boils down to personal preference. Most of us realize that the reliability and creature comforts are a necessity for our daily drivers or grocery getters as many of us call them. But the main thing about





the old cars still remains the nostalgia of owning a favorite car from your younger days... the thrill of driving and showing a piece of history and being able to talk about and listen to the praise from people you meet who often say "I had one just like that. They don't make 'em like they used to."

It is not always about buying or collecting things for



10 Tips for Buying a Car at Auction

Sold! Sold! It's easy to get carried away when bidding at an auction and wind-up spending thousands more than you budgeted or possibly exceeding the cars value. An auction is a fast paced, busy, and an exciting room, and the most basic principle here is to "know your limits" and not get carried away in the moment. Sometimes this is easier said than done. It also helps to be flexible and pick out several cars that interest you. Don't pin all your hopes on one vehicle and most importantly, be ready to walk away if the bidding becomes too frantic. Take time to inspect your chosen vehicle as the auctions open well before bidding commences to allow for this, so make the most of it.

Remember, do your homework, or invest in hiring an appraiser if you're not sure how to properly inspect the vehicle you wish to purchase. This may be the best money you ever spent. Don't be concerned about the one that got away, it's better than being upside down in a purchase or worse, winding up with a clunker.

Are you ready? Here's 10 Tips to remember when bidding for a collector car:

- Rule number one, take time to inspect your chosen car. Remember that all bids are Final. If you are the highest bid when the gavel drops, then there's no chance to change your mind later, "You Own It".
- Take your time and watch the action closely on all the cars up for auction. Look for suspicious actions such as bidders who seem to be active on every lot; they may just be trying to pump up the prices. Go to a few auctions before participating in one yourself. Get to know the players.
- If you're not sure about the providence of the car, I suggest you hire an appraiser, this could save you from making a very costly mistake.
- 4. Most importantly, stick to a budget. In the excitement of bidding, it's easy to get carried away. While you might pick up a bargain, you also could end up paying well over the market value of the vehicle.
- Listen to what the auctioneer has to say when they introduce the car. It could be that you'll hear something that will make you change your mind or make the car even more attractive. Caution – "As Is" Means "As Is"

- Attendance not mandatory to bid. Most classic car auction houses accept telephone bidding, online bids or by leaving a commission bid beforehand.
- To bid you need to register prior to the event. Most auctions houses require a "Bank Letter of Guarantee" proving your ability to pay for your purchase.
- 8. Keep in mind, auctioneers are tasked with selling up to 30 vehicles an hour, so if you've chosen a Lot, come to the stage area an hour before your car is schedule to cross the block, follow the action and be ready or you might miss out!
- Many auction houses charge a buyers' premium which is added on to the hammer price. Be sure to verify what percentage is charged so that you can add it to the total cost of the car. Ask if there are any other charges that might be added to the final settlement in order to complete the sale.
- Successful bidders need to arrange Insurance, your new purchase is covered up to \$50K and for 15 days allowing you time to add the car to your policy during normal business hours.

Know the Bidder rules and regulations. These differ from one auction house to another. Most auction houses post these rules online or present them to the bidder during the registration process. General Bidder Terms; the following terms are defined as standard terms throughout the industry:

"Lot" means any item identified and made available for sale at an auction event

"Bidder" means a person or entity bidding upon any Lot at any auction event

"Consignor" means a person or entity consigning a Lot for auction presentation and sale.

The terms "Bidder" and "Consignor" are understood as including his/her/its respective heirs, successors and assigns.

"Reserve" means the car has a minimum dollar bid the consigner set on the lot prior to the car being auctioned.

"No Reserve" means the car sells to the highest bidder regardless of price bid.






Thanks for all of your support and comments regarding my efforts with the Oil Can. I hope that someone will step up. I will help you. The club needs it.
