## The Glidden Tour in Cairo, Georgia Text & photos by Ralph Towner

One of the most prestigious tours in America, is the Glidden Tour. It is held annually with the combined effort and cooperation of the Vintage Motor Car Club of America (VMCCA) and the Antique Automobile Club of America (AACA). Each National club hosts the event every other year. All vehicles in this tour are 1942 or older.

The VMCCA hosted the 2023 Glidden Tour, held in South Georgia from October 23rd through the 27th. Thomasville was the host city and starting point for each day's tour. There are many entrants from both clubs no matter who hosts the event.

On Wednesday, October 25th, the tour route took the

tourists to Cairo, Georgia, where there were several locations arranged for the tourists to visit. One of them was the private auto and memorabilia museum, owned by Wayne and Marcia Hadden. When I learned the tour was going to visit the museum, I decided I had to go. I have visited this museum twice before, but not in about 25 years.

Since I was not registered, I contacted Wayne to be sure it was okay to drop by during the tour.

His answer was "Sure, but be prepared to help out if I need you". He wasn't kidding as when I got there, he handed me a large finger pointer which I used to direct the incoming cars to the parking area. At least, I got to see all the vintage cars as they came in. Continued on page 9

The museum consists of three buildings plus some shed areas where parts, a few tractors and some parts vehicles are kept. Before the Glidden tourists arrived, Wayne's wife, Marcia gave me a private tour of the first building which contained several antique cars as well as a huge amount of memorabilia. I also looked at some vehicles which were parked outside as well as the garage building where the museum cars are maintained.

The arriving tourists were arranged in two groups to accommodate the parking space available as well as less crowding in the museum. The first group started





One day Lester noticed the new owner of the adjoining farm repairing fences near the road, so he came over and introduced himself. He found the new owner, let's call him Ted, to be a friendly, outgoing person with a unique sense of humor. They talked for a while and the subject of the old car hobby came up. Ted told him he had an interest in old cars, but did not own any true antique vehicles.

Lester tried recruiting Ted to join AACA and the local Region, as one does not have to own and antique vehicle to be a member. Ted had never heard of the organization, but immediately turned him down, using the excuse we often hear, "I don't have time for a club. I have a full time job, a small business, a farm, and three kids playing soccer. I barely have time to sleep." A few years passed and Lester was persistent, inviting Ted to join AACA on several occasions. He got the same answer each time - too busy with life.

One Saturday afternoon, Ted was on his John Deere tractor doing some work near the road that led to Lester's home. Suddenly he saw a caravan of antique cars coming down the road towards Lester's home. Being an old car lover, Ted had to go over to look at the cars and find out what was going on. Lester greeted him and explained they were having a car club picnic. The people, who had driven their antique vehicles, were members of the local AACA Region.

Ted found the members to be friendly and with the same passion as he had for the old cars. Well, this was the turning point for Ted. He filled out applications and became an AACA member. It turns out that Ted had apparent leadership qualities and soon, the membership elected him to be on the Region Board and later he was elected by the membership as Region President. He also was appointed to be in charge of the swap

With all these accomplishments in AACA, it wasn't long until Ted was nominated to be on the ballot as a National Director. Ted had become well known by many people and was elected the first time on the ballot. gion is the Kyana Region, a very active AACA Region.





# Tour Guide

This year I've had the opportunity to participate in all but one AACA tour and talked with quite a few "freshman tourists" who said they wish they had discovered the touring side of the hobby long ago. Not knowing the guidelines for each


type of tour can create some apprehension to registering for your first tour so let's look at the various tours.

- Reliability Tour--The Reliability Tour is sponsored during even-numbered years for brass era cars, i.e., those manufactured in 1915 or earlier. This includes all recognized vehicles of that vintage.
- 2. Revival AAA Glidden Tour®--The AACA sponsors the Revival AAA Glidden Tour® during evennumbered years (2022, 2024, etc.) in cooperation with the Vintage Motor Car Club of America (VMCCA). The VMCCA sponsors the tour during the odd-numbered years. The Revival AAA Glidden Tours® are for the older vehicles and eligibility for AACA sponsored tours is limited to those manufactured in 1942 or earlier. Generally, this tour is held during the 2nd or 3rd week of September.
- 3. Founders Tour--The Founders Tour is sponsored annually for all vehicles, except race vehicles, manufactured from 1932 through a production year 25 years prior to the year of the tour.
- Vintage Tour--The Vintage Tour is sponsored during odd-numbered years for vehicles manufactured in 1931 or earlier.
- Sentimental Tour -- The Sentimental Tour is sponsored during even-numbered years, beginning in 2004, and is for vehicles manufactured from 1928 through 1958, except race vehicles.
- 5. Divisional Tours --- The AACA sponsors two Divisional Tours annually during even-numbered years, one in the Central and one in the Eastern geographical regions, and during odd-numbered years, one in the Southeastern Region and one in the Western Region. These tours are designed to be shorter in duration (minimum three days) than the traditional five-day tours.

The host Region or Chapter is free to decide which vehicles are eligible to participate in any Divisional Tour, except race vehicles will not be included. However, all vehicles must be of a production year at least 25 years prior to the year of the tour.

If you would like more information on touring you can go to aaca.org, click on the "Publications" tab and then "Policy & Procedures Manual." Section 4 has everything you ever wanted to know about touring.




