June started out with the best weather ever and I want to highlight June 1 and the Blueberry Festival. People have no idea how much work goes into planning and put-


ting the Festival together. You can have all the plans in the world but on a daily basis things change, right up to the last minute.

Forward: During June, I had one of my most interesting interviews since I started doing these member feature articles, with

Doug and Mary (Kathy) Smith. They have been married since the early 80's. Both had previous marriages. Kathy has one son and one daughter. Doug has two sons and a daughter.

The Smiths moved here 7 years ago from near San Antonio Texas. They found a nice one acre lot in Lake City, and they have developed it to suit their needs. They have a nice home with a special "Car Room" which displays many model vehicles of all types as well as several other pieces of interesting and rare memorabilia. Doug has an air conditioned garage for his 1953 Ford convertible, which has a lift to put the car on. When the car is lifted, a car cover that Doug hung just right, completely covers the car.

Through the years. Doug has searched Craigs List and other sites regularly looking for good buys on vehicles and Real Estate. They both remain vibrant and young at heart. Doug still does all his landscaping and property maintenance which helps to keep him strong and healthy.

Doug has written a superb article about their adventures in life - the kind of story you can't put down. Please read on...

Once upon a time a very young lad aged 17, joined the US Air Force in February 1955. After completing basic training at Lackland AFB in Texas and tech school at Gunter AFB in Montgomery, Alabama, he was sent to Turner AFB in Albany, Georgia. Yep, you guessed it, that would be me, ole Doug Smith. Anyway, one evening I realized that I needed a car, so I hopped on a bus and went into Albany to see what was out there that I could afford. I happened up on a used car lot that was still open and THERE sat the car that was right for me. I wanted a red convertible but knew I had to buy a cheaper ride so the 1953 Ford dark green 2 door sedan was a possibility. After all the nonsense you go through in buying a car I decided I needed to put more YENOM down (money spelled backwards) so I left with the idea of taking some more YENOM out of my footlocker at the Air Base and returning the next day to buy myself a set of WHEELS !

After returning to the base I stopped at the squadron bulletin board (bulletin boards were a long time before computers) and to my surprise, there was my name, Airman Third Class Douglas John Wayne Smith report to the 1st Sgt for reassignment to England. Uncle Sam needs you, Boy! So long 1953 Ford, I'll be back in 1959 if you are still for sale! After a few months of being stationed in the middle of England I took a train down to see old London town. Remember, this was in

1955 just 10 years after WWII ended. Here I was, a 17 year old lad walking around one of the greatest cities in the world and STILL seeing some damaged streets and buildings. That reminded me of how great it was to be an American and how thankful I was for America's involvement in WWII Europe. I still thought about the 1953 Ford now and then.

When my first enlistment was up in 1959 I decided to go for 16 more years and re-enlisted.

I married an English lass in 1957 and we had a daughter and two sons and after returning to America, I asked to be stationed at MacDill AFB in Tampa FL, but they got me as close as they could I guess; I was stationed in Great Falls Montana for four years. I went out looking for the 1953 Ford again and instead found a 1956 Turquoise and White Chevrolet Nomad with a 265 CI power pack V-8 and overdrive transmission. I was told the difference between the power pack V-8 and the standard V-8 was high compression heads, 4 barrel carburetor and dual exhaust. In 1962 I was sent back to England for 4 more years. I still thought about the little '53 Ford.

After getting my family and my Nomad all safely to England we enjoyed another 4 years and by then England was really turning around in most families and some had two cars. When it was time to return to the USA, I requested MacDill in Tampa again; this time I got much closer; Dover AFB in Dover. Delaware!

In 1968 while stationed in Delaware during the Vietnam war, I was transferred to Air Intelligence. (WOW) Wonder what that is? It was flying around the jungles in a Cessna O-1 Bird Dog, noting enemy coordinates. The Cessnas flew so low to the ground that we could get knocked out of the air with a large rock ! You know how happy I was about that assignment. After being sent to the Air Intel school in Denver for training, I discovered that to qualify for this duty you had to have PERFECT eyesight. Having one eye just barely good enough to be in the military, I very happily ran down to personnel and was reassigned to my former career field and again I asked for MacDill in Tampa and almost made it; this time I got Lackland AFB, San Antonio, TX.

In 1971, I was reassigned again, and this time I was given the grand opportunity to live near the North Pole for a year at Thule AFB, Greenland (talk about fun times)! Didn't need air conditioning up there! Again, I asked for MacDill AFB on return, and this time got even closer - right back to Lackland AFB, San Antonio. The little '53 Ford didn't show up in my mind much anymore. Continued on page 7

We settled in, the years flew by, and as the kiddo's grew up, we all liked Texas so we just stayed there when I retired in 1975. In 1976 we bought a piece of property on Medina Lake, abut 50 miles north of San Antonio so we wouldn't have to haul our boat back and forth. In 1979 my wife and I divorced so I moved to the lake property.

In 1980 I met my <u>forever</u> wife, Kathy, and we kept improving and buying lake front property until we had six joined lots and lived there until 2002. Over the years keeping up with a seawall and getting older and not spending much time on the water, we decided to move to another town closer to San Antonio and build a new home. After living there until 2016 my Kathy, having been born in Texas, had never spent any time on the east coast, mentioned that she would like to move there... maybe Florida. So we moved in 2017. Still never made it to MacDill nor did I buy the little '53 Ford.

Back in 1980 when I first met my Kathy, we went on a 30 day motorcycle trip that started in San Antonio. We traveled through Missouri and Tennessee to see Graceland, Alabama to see Elvis's birthplace, on to Georgia to visit some of my relatives, then down to Tampa where I was born, to visit my mother, to Lake Okeechobee, on down to Key West and then returned to Texas via Alabama, Mississippi, and Louisiana. When Kathy and I moved here from Texas in 2017, we brought 25 motorcycles with us, all of which I have since sold.

Never did I know as a small boy the love affair with cars that would go through life with me (and later in life with my Kathy), as can be seen in my "car room." Some of the toy cars were owned by us in their full size. New ones were a 1964 Austin Mini Cooper that I bought while stationed in England with the USAF, a red 1967 Mustang Convertible while

stationed in Dover, Delaware, the first 2007 Miata Retractable Hard Top to reach San Antonio Texas and used first and second generation Miata's, (the Miata Retractable Hard Top is the only one of the eight or ten retractables out there that does not sacrifice ANY trunk space), a new 30 year anniversary Honda Gold Wing motorcycle, which I later had converted into a Trike with matching trailer. (I had always been a bike guy). We also owned some other really nice used cars including a 1956 Turquoise and White Chevrolet Nomad, a 1966 Mustang Convertible & 1966 Mustang Hardtop, a 1961 Ford Ranchero, a 2004 Cadillac XLR, plus many more.

Over the years Kathy and I have bought cars we couldn't afford when they were new and when we came to look at Lake City we had a Miata, but after deciding to move there, we sold it. After getting settled in, we missed not having a cruise car so I found a 2006 Miata with only 16,000 miles and bought it. Being so low to the ground, the Miata was getting hard to get in and out of. While one of my sons was visiting us from Texas he just went crazy over the Miata so we gave it to him. Continued on page 8

After not having a cruise car, we found a Red 2004 Cadillac XLR Retractable with only 28,000 miles and bought it. After owning it for about a year we found out that the XLR's top,

front and rear lights were very troublesome and even though our tail lights and head lights were OK, the top went south! I bought a set of shop manuals and for a week, I was in the trunk replacing all seven of the hydraulic pumps and hoses and believe me they are not easy to replace. Then it was time to say bye-bye to Mr. XLR. I put it on Craigs List and a gentleman from South Florida wanted it for his private car collection. So sight unseen, he bought it and a flat bed truck came and picked it up two days later. Now, I'm thinking about the '53 Ford again!

I found one exactly like the one I now own at Gateway Classics in Illinois, in the fall of 2022, but the weather was forecasted to be terrible, so I kept looking in the south and found one at Burnyzz Classics in Ocala and bought it. The only problem was the top was black and the interior was red and black but I wanted a white top with red and white interior. They have their own upholstery and engine work shops so I contracted with them to do the interior and engine/ transmission work.

A week or so later someone told me about the magic that could happen at "da SHERM'S" Dreams Come True Place. So even though the upholstery work had started, I could still have the mechanical work done here in Lake City. After talking to Sherm, we decided on a crate roller motor around 300 -350 HP, 12 volt wiring, power disc on front, 4 speed automatic transmission, a Holly Sniper Carb, new tilt steering, steering wheel, and all new gauges. We wrote a check and asked our friend Sherm to "make us happy" and he DID !! Thanks, Sherm and all your crew !

WOWI Did I mention that we finally bought a '53 Ford after all these years and it is a convertible ? Our dream car!

My '35 Ford Model Car Story Text by Doug Smith Photos by Ralph Towner

When I was a little boy (a LONG time ago), when I would visit my Aunt Hope at her house, she would let me play for a short time with a small green rubber toy car she had ... IF I was really careful with it. This went on for years until I was



old to play with toy cars. Do you

EVER get too old to play with cars?

Many years later, in the mid 80's, as I was visiting her in Florida from Texas where I lived, she said that I was the only



nephew who ever treasured the little toy so she gave it to me. I asked her how she acquired the toy and she said that when she was about 30, it was given to her as a gift at the



1935 San Diego, California World's Fair by a Ford Motor Company booth attendant.

When Aunt Hope gave me the car, she was in her early 80's – all my aunts and uncles on both sides of my family lived to be 100 or more and my Mom went all the way to 109 after having worked for the State of Florida taking care of people no longer capable of living on their own in her home. My two brothers and I tricked her into quitting her job with Florida at age 100 but that's another story. Ask me sometime.

About 10 years later at a Swap Meet in Conroe, Texas, I bought a car book entitled The Ford Road, 1903-1978 about Henry Ford. It is a year by year description of each model year's changes with pictures and information. To my surprise, when I got to car year, 1935 and turned to page 94, there was a lady giving out the little rubber toy cars to visitors at the Fair!!!

The green ones were 2 door sedans and the white ones were 4 door sedans. It's hard to tell in the pictures, but on the table is a group of green cars and a group of white cars just below her hand. That picture on page 94 authenticated and completed the history and origin of my little toy Ford. If Kathy and I had been there in 1935, maybe the little green 2 door sedan would have a white 4 door next to it! Now, the car and the book will be a pair and will remain together until passed on. Needless to say, my attachment to this little car will go on as long as I live. I just hope that the little car will be passed on to a relative who will treasure it as I have. This little car was made of rubber circa 1935 and when viewed closely, it is weather-cracked, so if it is not handled very carefully, it might break apart.

The VA Domiciliary display for Father's Day was another perfect weather day. We



Tech/Safety Necessities to Carry in Your Car By Ralph Towner

You never know what may need attention or repairing while on the road. This article provides how to be prepared when a breakdown occurs.

Let's talk safety first. Carry a fire extinguisher in every vehicle. Keep it in the cabin for quick accessibility not in the trunk. Check it annually to be certain it is fully charged. The <u>"Element" brand</u> is recommended for easy storage and less dam-



age of your car if it needs to be used. This brand was covered in an earlier "Oil Can" article about fire extinguishers. A reflective triangle or flares should be carried as well, to warn oncoming traffic of your breakdown.

Carry a couple quarts of the same brand and viscosity oil that is currently in your engine. Check your oil at each gasoline refill. Other fluids to carry are a gallon of coolant, brake fluid, automatic transmission fluid and power steering fluid.

A basic tool kit. with the type of boltheads in your vehicle, English or Metric or some of both. Other items are jumper cables, a tire lug nut wrench, flashlight, fuses, a small hammer, duct and electrical tape, rags,



paper towels, tire pressure gauge, wheel chocks and waterless hand cleaner.

Check your spare tire for condition and proper inflation monthly. Be sure you know how to use that vehicle's jack properly.

Consider carrying a fully charged car starting battery pack as well as a portable air compressor which runs off your battery for airing up tires. Finally, It's a good idea to take a cooler with some water and snacks, especially in the hot months. You will be thankful if you happen to break down on a country road, miles from a store.




Consider all these items as insurance... you hope you never need them but they are there if you do.
