On Sunday June 11, Ralph mentioned to me that at a previous

meeting, we had discussed going as a group to an antique car theme restaurant in Gainesville called "Ford's Garage". He added, "How about we visit them today and do a preview. There are not that many activities this month, so maybe I could take some pics and do a newsletter article about it."

Ralph had found the location on the internet and realized it was in a shopping center area on Route 24, known as Archer Road. He learned 'Ford's Garage' is a chain of casual dining restaurants located in four US states. The first restaurant was built in Ft Myers, Florida in 2012.

The Gainesville location has been open only since November, 2022. The chain has a licensing agreement with Ford Motor Company to use the Ford name and carmaker's logo. In 2017, Ford's Garage opened its first restaurant outside of Florida in Dearborn, Michigan. It is on Ford's property, less than two miles away from Ford's international headquarters.

Later in the day, we headed for Gainesville and got off I-75 at the Route 24 exit. We still didn't exactly know what to expect. Ralph pulled into the first shopping center heading East and entered the address in his phone GPS, which directed us to the front of the restaurant. It was tight parking in front. Ralph drove around the block to the back of the restaurant where we found adequate parking.

From the back, we entered a large outdoor seating area complete with a bar, two model A Fords and some antique automobile art and memorabilia on the walls. We entered the main building where we went to the check in area. It was busy, but we only had a five minute wait. There was another Model A on full display, mounted on a pedestal above the inside bar. The basic restaurant theme, besides the car theme is a sports bar.

A hostess seated us and soon a waiter greeted us with menus and took our drink order. The first thing we noticed was the silver ware, wrapped in an old used shop rag (thoroughly washed, we hope), which apparently was our napkin, secured with a hose clamp.



As we skimmed menu, It the was apparent the main food specialty was **"Burgers** of Fame". Some of the names were The Mod-A. Ford's el Signature, High -Octane". as well as nine other specialty burgers, even a Green and Veggie Clean Burger. You could "Rev-up"



your burger by substituting chicken breast or turkey at no additional charge or really "Rev it up" by subbing Bison for five bucks more. All of the Burgers of Fame were half pounders.

There was also a "Roadster" 1/3 pound menu with three heavily dressed up options. There were other sandwich op-

tions, including a Go Green menu and a Comfort Foods menu. Mama Ford's homemade meatloaf highlighted the Comfort Foods menu which also included BBQ pork ribs, salmon, chicken tenders and fish'n chips. There were a few desserts offered as well.

On Sundays, they offer a brunch menu. I ordered an item from that menu, a ham and cheese sandwich that was coated with powdered sugar. Ralph ordered a Brisket Ranchero Roadster. Most orders come with "Ford's Fries" but you can substitute one

of six other sides from the "Side Cars" menu.

While we were waiting for our order to arrive, Ralph walked around the dining area, both inside and outside and examined the memorabilia and took pictures of some of the best ones. Ralph got back to our table just before our waiter brought our order.

They must have a branding iron in the kitchen, as Ralph noticed his burger bun had the restaurant logo branded on it. The food was good but nothing really outstanding. They



tend to heap plenty of extra calories on everything. The atmosphere was good, especially for those of

us who enjoy antique cars and memorabilia.

Our conclusion: Since there are not too many activities in the summer, this would perhaps make a nice outing for our club to get together and travel to Gainesville. It is about 45 miles south of Lake City. It is one of those kinds of places that you really ought to visit at least once.

**3rd. Place The Rainbow Girls** 



With all the traffic on our nation's highways coupled with the aggressive, inconsiderate



and just plain horrible drivers, which recently seem to be on the highways in greater numbers, some car accidents are unavoidable. However, most causes of Distractions lead to many crashes, especially since the these unfortunate occurrences can be prevented.

millions of miles. Yet, just one slight mistake or miscalculation can result in disaster with life changing results.

Excessive speed, defined as driving 10 mph or more over the speed limit, is a major cause of accidents. This is true particularly in congested areas, curves, in areas with multiple entry/exit driveways to business or heavy residential areas, or on rain slick roads. Cruise control should never be used during a rain storm or on wet speeding, failure to use turn signals, failure to dim headroads of any kind. If you hit standing water with the cruise control on, your vehicle may hydroplane.

Tailgating, defined as less than four seconds travel time between your vehicle and the one ahead, leads to rearend collisions, which at the least damages both vehicles and may lead to a traffic ticket or at the worst, injure or even cause death to occupants of both vehicles. When driving our classic cars, extra space should be allowed since the drum brakes on our old cars will not stop your us or a family member in a preventable accident! vehicle as quickly as today's abs disc brakes.

Driving while impaired from alcohol, medications or from any drug or mind altering substance should always be avoided. This activity leads to multiple deaths on our highways and/or you may receive a felony conviction if proven guilty of a DUI charge. Driving while sleepy should always be avoided. On long trips, take frequent rest stops.

Distracted driving has become the leading cause of accidents in this era. > Drivers and all passengers should use safety belts. A firm punishment should be enforced on those violating traffic rules such as ignoring traffic signals, overlights and unsafe passing. Any unrestored car or motorcycle that is 25 years old or older is eligible to be entered in the HPOF classification for evaluation. The first time the vehicle is shown it is evaluated for the HPOF Award. Vehicles that receive their HPOF Certification are automatically considered for the highest level HPOF Original Award the next time it is shown. If it does not receive the Original Award, a Repeat HPOF Award is given as long as it still meets the requirements of the HPOF level. Repeat HPOF Original Awards are also given after receiving the HPOF Original Award.

At a higher level, there are three HPOF National Awards given at the Annual Meeting. These awards are for HPOF - Motorcycles, HPOF – Through 1929 and HPOF – Post 1929. These awards are selected from all vehicles shown in the HPOF Class during the year.



# How Can My Car Be More Original?



**AACA** created the HPOF Class (Historical Preservation of Original Features) in 1988 and introduced the "survivor" car to the antique automobile hobby and suddenly having an original unrestored car adds value to it.

One of the many reasons to preserve original cars is to document the actual factory construction of the car including paint, upholstery and mechanical parts as aides to restoration of the same or similar car. From these cars, we can document the size of the flake in a metallic paint or the stitching and seams used in the upholstery as well as the finish on the mechanical parts of the car.

The evaluation process for receiving an HPOF Certification is much the same as in class judging. Parts that wear can be replaced with new or rebuilt parts if they have the same appearance as the original part. These areas are the most common deductions in evaluating a HPOF car. Correcting these items will improve the score of your car and many times makes the difference between receiving an Original Certification and a Repeat HPOF Certification.

Common deductions which are easily corrected are: Incorrect hose clamps, Flex hoses instead of




