

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



So, Harry rescued the 442, which had been totaled by the insurance company and Wilson, who may have been eu-

thanized, had he not adopted him... thus the title, "Rescue Man".

The car was repainted a factory original 1969 Olds 442 color, burgundy mist. While the restoration was being done, Harry found someone who wanted to get rid of a collection of Olds 442 parts. Harry bought the parts and rented a U-Haul truck to get them. Many of these parts were used in the restoration, and he has many parts still stored now.

The designation, 442, meaning, <u>four-barrel carburetor</u>, <u>four-on-the-floor transmission and dual</u> exhaust, was introduced as an option on an F-85

Cutlass in 1964. The model was popular, and in 1965 the 442 became its own model. However, the 442 label was changed to stand for a 400 CI engine, four barrel carburetor and dual exhaust. This 442 designation lasted through the 1969 model year.

On Saturday, May 20th, Harry and Wilson entered the Olds 442 in the Waldo Florida community car show. Harry and Wilson's Olds 442 won a top 20 award.




Denmark Acres Spring Festival

Tech/Safety Element Fire Extinguishers

Billed as "The world's smallest and longest lasting fire extinguisher", the Element brand is getting noticed more and more as a good alternative to the canister types. There are no materials inside the Element cannister that would deteriorate and it is not pressurized, which means it has a long term life.

When I did my article two months ago, as well as my fire extinguisher presentation at our meeting, I was aware of the Element, but I did not know enough about it to mention it.

Fire extinguishers have remained basically the same style for the past 100 years. A large, heavy canister filled with compressed gas and a messy powder is rapidly becoming an obsolete way to quench a fire.

Element uses a technology like nothing else, which is basically fighting fire with fire. It is currently used by police, military, and special forces around the world. Element looks and works like nothing else. The technology involves fighting the fire on the molecular level.

Element uses a potassium powder jet which is only produced when the charger is struck by its base. When the potassium contacts the air, alkaline salts



consume the oxygen in the immediate air, depriving the fire of its source of combustion. A quick oxidation process takes place, transforming the potassium into a gaseous state which interrupts the fire's natural chain reaction combustion process. This process leaves no messy debris and disperses 3-4 individual micron

potassium particles into the atmosphere, which falls to the ground with no toxic side effects.

There are three sizes available the E 25, which lasts for 25 seconds, E 50, for 50 seconds and the E100 for 100 seconds. Canister type extinguishers last only for 10-20 seconds. These units are pricy, but how much are your possessions worth to you?

There is a good demonstration video of this product with Jay Leno and a Rep from the Element Company on the internet. It can be viewed at: youtube.com/watch?v=oBjXecsF860.

Element has not been approved by UL, since they only test cylinder types and have no category as yet to test this design. Since it is not UL approved, it would not be recognized on the AACA showfield as an approved fire extinguisher. So, don't throw away your canister type but consider having an Element with you as well, in case the time ever comes when you really need it!

So, you received a 2nd or 3rd place AACA trophy for your car. Disappointed? Many are. I've always viewed judging as kind of a report card like when I was in school. It's an evaluation of how I'm doing

with my restorations. My view has changed somewhat over the years and I've gravitated more toward showing in HPOF for some time now. However, this year I decided to put a 'car' again in class judging. It got a second. I feel pretty good about it. As a part of my own evaluation of what I take to events I have always taken into account, what is the award worth. If a carpet has a little stain, is it worth a whole new carpet. Or, if there is a scratch somewhere, is it truly worth the expense and time to repaint a whole panel?

Now if it's some high dollar value vehicle, the answer may be yes, but I don't show real high dollar cars. I like to call it common sense restoration. While I rarely sell anything, I don't like to be too upside down on what money I put into a car. And, I don't take judging too seriously. It can lead to ulcers. Our judging system is if not the best, close to it. It's impossible to be an expert on everything and occasionally a judge may make a mistake, but this is not my subject of interest in this column.

I do try to bring vehicles to be judged in what I think is up to their greatest potential per dollar spent. This year we showed a 1997 Suburban. (not exactly a high buck show car). It came out of a salvage yard in 2017. It had 170,000 miles and had a bad intake manifold gasket. I intended to use it as a winter driver in the snow and salt. After we fixed the engine, I got to looking at it in more detail. There was one small spot of rust that needed to be repaired and a few scratches and door dings. Other than that, it was very clean inside and out especially for something with so many miles and its age. Somebody had cared for it for a lot of its life. It was just too nice to abuse in Nebraska winter weather. It had come out of Montana by the dealer sticker on the back which explained the lack of rust.

We cleaned and detailed it as much as seemed logical (engine compartments on this new of a vehicle is a nightmare with so many components, nooks and crannies). We also drove it to the show. It got a second. Not too bad in my book considering what I knew of its history and where it had come from. Will it ever get an AACA 1st Junior? Probably not. It might qualify for HOPF. It's nice to drive, comfortable and there are some things more important than a trophy. It is also signed up the AACA MAP award which I think is very worthwhile for additional enjoyment of our vintage vehicles. We've driven it enough to get our first milestone on it. My conclusion is to enjoy your vehicle even if it's an imperfect diamond rather than a freshly polished stone.






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
