A Message from Our President


Looks like we are skipping Spring and going right into Summer. That's ok by me; I love the warmer weather.

AIthough originally from Warsaw, NY, I have spent the major part of my life in Florida. My parents brought me to the Sarasota area in the 50's.

After high school, I served three years in the Us Army. I worked several jobs for a few years before landing a job

with Ringling Brothers Circus. My duties were in transportation and I was the Assistant Chief of Security.

Through the years, I was a part of many adventures with the Circus across the USA and Canada. One of the most interesting assignments was working on the theme park known as Circus World. The project was located near Haines City on the SE corner of I-4 and US Highway 27, about 12 miles from the Disney theme parks. The park was patterned after the Circus World location in Baraboo, Wisconsin.


Circus World continued into the 80's, sometimes profitable, but with the opening of Disney's Epcot Center, it was not possible to compete with them and the park was shut down. Other companies such as Board-


walk & Baseball rethemed the park but none lasted. The land was eventually sold to an investor and is now a mixed purpose retail center called Posner Park.

In 2005, after fifteen years with Ringling Brothers, I retired. Tired of the hustle and bustle of my years with the circus and the Sarasota area. I moved to

I have always been interested in nice cars. I owned a Plymouth Super Bird for a few years, long before it became such a valuable model. 



Tech/Safety **Fuel For Thought** By Ralph Towner

Maintaining your collector car's fuel system is vital for safety as well as avoiding highway breakdowns and costly repairs. A gasoline leak of any kind is one too many. Over time, fuel



lines, connections, the fuel pump and the gasoline tank can develop leaks. If it is leaking at a connection, be sure the connectors are tight. If the end of it can leave a gummy residue that a rubber hose is frayed, there is usually enough will require a professional to remove. excess hose to cut off the damaged end and reclamp. Internal rot of fuel lines, fuel pump, or the tank will mean a costly repair of your time or repair shop labor and parts costs... it's not a cheap hobby, but it must be done to keep running.

Should I use ethanol free gas? If your vehicle is pre 1976, and has never had the rubber ETHANOL FREE fuel lines replaced, yes. Even if 100% GASOLINE you have taken precautions, it is



best to use ethanol free gasoline when possible. Your antique car engine will likely run better as well as get better mileage, offsetting some of the higher price for non-ethanol.

that sell ethanol free gas. Hunter Fuel, on Hwy 90, one of our ad sponsors for the newsletter and website, is where I get fuel. Also Murphy gas at Walmart has it as well as the Circle K at the junction of Baya and Highway 90. Websites listing availability are, Pure-Gas.org and BUYREAL-GAS.com.

Gas has an expiration date. Aging gasoline

rarely becomes a problem over the passage of a month, but much longer than that can cause some bad issues. If the old gas sits long enough,



A tank should be filled prior to an extended storage. Both "Stabil" and the Isopropanol (check the label) version of "HEET" brand or equivalent fuel additives should be added to stabilize the fuel and prevent water condensation, particularly if the gasoline contains ethanol.

Should I use lead replacement additives? No. Lead lubes the valves somewhat but the main cause of premature valve failure is lower octane fuel. Rather than spend money on useless additives, use premium gas. If a valve job is needed, use hardened valve seats. Also, look for the words, "Top tier gas" on the pumps. Some of the off brand gasoline stations offer top tier as well. There are a few gasoline stations in Lake City Again, look for the designation on the pump.



While visiting the library you can view any of our books or look at specific information regarding one of your cars or maybe just an automobile topic that you are interested in. For those of you that can't make it out to the library in person, we offer off-site research available to anyone who is interested to be completed by library staff.

If you are interested in off-site research, please fill in the Research Request Form as completely as possible. The form can be found by going to <u>aaca.org</u>. Then click on "Library" at the top. When the Library site comes up, click "Use the Library". A scroll down will appear. Then click "Research". Then scroll down to the form which can be filled in and emailed.

We will search our collection and then contact you with a list of available information and the applicable fees. We aim to reply to each request within 1 business week, but during busy times of the year it can take 2-4 weeks or longer to complete your request – we appreciate your patience! Shipping is fulfilled via the US Postal Service only.

Research Fees

- <u>AACA Members First 2 hours free per year with up-todate paid membership dues;</u> \$30 per hour afterwards

"America's Automotive Library" Identifies its Oldest Artifacts By Steve Rossi VP - Public Relations

& Event Planning

The Chris & Kathleen Koch AACA Library & Research Center has identified its oldest antique automotive artifact. The collection includes A Handbook for Steam Users Being Rules for Engine Drivers and Boiler Attendants by M. Powis Bale, from 1890. In addition, a February 14, 1891, issue of Scientific American features an analysis of the 3- wheeled Butler Petrol-Cycle from Great Britain.

According to Library Director Jen Wolfe, "Since automotive history is an inexact science, trying to pinpoint the first piece of automotive material ever published is impossible...though Duryea is credited with producing the first American automobile in series by 1896."

Some believe that Panhard began producing promotional literature...in color...during 1892 (from Panhard & Levassor: Pioneers in Automobile Excellence, by David Beare, which the AACA artifacts predate. The Smithsonian's Smith Hempstone Oliver contended that the first automotive catalog appeared in 1888/1889, from Philadelphia's Moto-Cycle Manufacturing Company which featured Lucius D. Copeland-designed steam cycles and steam carriages, along with typewriters. (The Bulb Horn, May-June 1966)

Either way, as a function of the publication timeline above, "America's Automotive Library" is at the forefront. The AACA Library & Research Center was established in 1977 and houses some 3+ million individual automotive artifacts at its Hershey, PA headquarters, and is the largest and most comprehensive institution of its kind.

In addition, the Library also oversees nine single -marque collections within its climate controlled, secure and professionally managed facility which includes a state of the art fire suppression system.



The Library is free and open to the public. Research requests are included with AACA membership (for the first two hours at no charge, per year), while additional photocopies, scans and reproductions are further available for a fee. Donations such as literature, books, artwork, manuals, periodicals, toys/models, etc. are welcomed and encouraged. Upon receipt of materials, the Library will provide the donor with a letter acknowledging the gift.

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




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It Just Needed Painting
