

Sal's Cruise-In had a nice turn out and a beautiful night to sit out and listen to the Oldies. I counted 13 cars that were displayed proudly.



A few months ago, In conversations I was having with our Webmaster, Don Downs, he mentioned he was interested in finding a high powered, four speed stick Mopar vehicle from the 60's.

Now Don is real quick to tell you he is "**Mopar or no-car**". He already has a 1968 Plymouth Sport Fury convertible as well as a 1973 Dodge Charger, which he has owned for a long time. His wife, Marybeth, also has a 1976 Plymouth Scamp.

With today's ability to find almost anything you desire on the internet, it wasn't long before Don found some interesting vehicles that fit his wants. It turned out that a couple of the ads were too good to be true and were likely even scams. One must really be on the ball when buying or selling online.

However, an ad popped up that got Don's attention. It was a beautiful frame off restoration of a 1965 Plymouth Belvedere convertible, red, with a 440 cross-ram four barrel setup.

It also has an A-833 four speed transmission with a factory Hurst floor shifter. The car is fitted with an 8 3/4" differential with 3.55 ratio positraction.



This type of vehicle is often described as a "sleeper" defined as a high performance car that has been built on a plain-Jane type of vehicle, usu-




ally a mid sized or even an economy platform. Cont. on page 20

The engine is the famous 250 cubic inch Ohv Six, which started right up and ran well. It has about 76,000 miles on it and has never been rebuilt.





Pumpkin Spice Muffins

Ingredients:

One spice cake mix One 15 ounce can of pumpkin Optional: you may add chopped pecans, walnuts or mini chocolate chips

Directions: Place ingredients in a bowl and thoroughly mix until well blended Grease mini muffin tin (or use paper cups)

Fill each opening to the top, about one heaping tablespoon. Bake at 350 degrees for 12 - 15 minutes until done. Makes about 24 - 30 muffins. Enjoy by themselves or with coffee, tea or milk.

With no other business, the meeting was adjourned at 8 PM.




Tech/Safety Is Your Car A Vintage, Antique or Classic? By Ralph Towner

In the old car hobby, the words vintage, antique and classic are thrown around frequently as well as the term, collector car. But what do each of these terms actually mean?

There is some blurring of where one term ends and another begins, but the following classifications are what most antique car insurance companies use.

Prior to 1916, these vehicles are in the "Brass" era. From 1917-1930, the cars are known as "Vintage". Vehicles manufactured from 1931–1975 fall into the "Antique" category and those from 1976 through 1998 are considered classics or collector cars as I tend to call them. AACA con-



Cruising And Playing The Radio

Maybe it was Chuck Berry who best described the joy of driving an automobile when he sang, "Cruising and playing the radio. With no particular place to go." At least since WWII, the radio has been an integral part of the freedom offered to us by the automobile.

In the early 1990s I tried to describe "cruising and playing the radio" to a visiting English friend, but he couldn't comprehend it. It was Friday night. So, we walked the few blocks from my house to downtown Lincolnton, N.C. where there were hundreds of teenagers cruising in their cars. This prompted two questions from the Englishman: "What is the purpose of all this?" and "Why do they play their radios so loud?" When I tried to explain that it was a unique part of American culture thanks to "freedom of the road", he smiled and said, "Well, all these young people sure seem to be enjoying themselves!"

I grew up "cruising and playing the radio". The year I was born was when the 45 rpm record was introduced by RCA Victor. The year I learned to drive the 8- track player was becoming the big thing. I still have a box of 8-track tapes in the garage, but the player hanging under the dash is long gone.

Let's share some important events in our history of cruising and playing the radio: -- in the 1920s and 1930s in-car radios were being introduced. They were expensive, adding about 25% to the price of a Model A. The top song of 1930 was "Happy Days Are Here Again". --In 1952, even though practically all stations were broadcasting in AM, the first in-car FM radio became available thanks to Blaupunkt. The top song was "Blue Tango". --In 1963 vacuum tubes were replaced with transistors and car radios became "solid state". The top song was "Surfin' USA". --In 1965 8-track players became available. Over the next several years 8-track players were added to many cars. The top song was "Wooly Bully". --By 1969 cars added stereo to their sound system, where the tuner amplified two channels, not just one. The top song was "Sugar, Sugar". -- In 1970 companies like Alpine and Pioneer sought to solve our problem of the 8-track player eating up the tape with cassette tapes. With the advent of cassette tapes, we could now play "my music" thanks to a "Mix Tape". The top song was "Bridge Over Troubled Waters". --By 1982 Bose offered the first Premium Stereo System teaming up with GM's Delco to offer it as an option in Oldsmobiles, Buicks, and Cadillacs. The top song was "Physical". --By 1984 Sony introduced an in -dash CD player. The top song was "Careless Whisper".

Now, buttons and dials have been replaced by touch screens and Bluetooth. If you don't know what that is, ask your grandchildren. Then, take them on a cruise in your "old car". If it has a radio, let them turn it up loud...


