Wai'oli Hui'ia Church has stood the test of time. The original Mission was established in 1834 in the heart of Hanalei and its "Little Green Church" was built in 1912. It is listed on the National Registry of Historic Buildings and has become a world-famous house of worship.

On September 11, 1992 a storm with wind gusts up to 220-mph brought Wai'oli Hui'ia to its knees. A product of warm water conditions known as El Niño, Hurricane Iniki was born, bred and grew in the central Pacific Ocean. Iniki translates as "strong and piercing wind" and she more than lived up to the name. There were six deaths and a \$3.1 billion cost in damages on the island of Kaua'i.

One hundred miles south, and twenty-four hours earlier, Iniki was not considered a threat. After hitting a trough of warm water, Iniki turned straight toward Kaua'i. Eight thousand people sheltered down, along with the entire cast and crew of Steven Spielberg's *Jurassic Park*.

The extreme winds of the storm's eye wall sat atop Kaua'i ripping and tearing at the island. A 4.5 to 18-foot storm tide decimated beaches and waves up to 35 feet pounded the coastline. Over 1,400 houses were lost and 12,000 more damaged. Coco Palms Hotel in Kapa'a sits to this day as an eerie reminder of the destructive nature of Iniki.

Wai'oli Hui'ia Church was lifted off its foundation by the ferocious winds, causing extensive damage to the building's structure and smashing the Church's precious stained-glass heritage. The restoration committee appointed Alfonso J. Garza of Designare Architects and Callahan Construction of Hanalei to repair the Church. A nationwide search for a company qualified to replace the damaged windows began. That company turned out to be internationally renowned Bovard Studio in Iowa. The Bovard team supervised the sensitive removal and shipping of the windows after assessing and photographing the damage.

Before Iniki, the family of Emma Oneha gifted in her honor three windows near the piano. This glass reflected lighter colors than others in the church and became a sample for Bovard's four sets of new double lancet

stained-glass windows. Glass on the parsonage side of the Church is slightly darker. The front stained-glass began to bow due to excess weight. Paul Oliver, a tradesman and helicopter pilot from Kapa'a, re-leaded the windows to prevent further damage.

As Bovard explains: "Matching historical opalescent glass is exponentially more difficult than matching paint color or dye lots. In glass, we not only have to match a unique combination of color mix, but we must match the density and the unique refractory qualities of the light as it passes through the glass". Therefore, an expansive search for "old glass" took place. All but one was found. The main background glass for all the Wai'oli Hui'ia Church's stained-glass windows was green, amber and white opalescent. This glass had to be customized.

The restored windows were shipped back to Kaua'i and meticulously reinstalled in April of 1994.


