DEC Announces Actions to Protect New York's Pollinators by Restricting Use of 'Neonic' Pesticides - NYS Dept. of Environmental

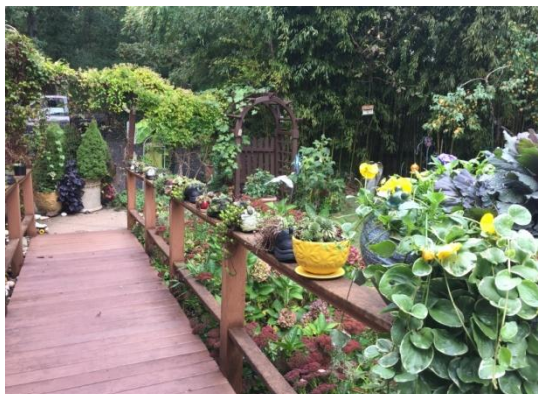

Gardening Time Line

If you recall in last month's newsletter I included a list of several early gardening tips that one can incorporate when preparing for the coming season. These early months of the New Year are perfect for certain gardening tasks. Whether you're a totally immersed garden junkie or the occasional amateur some preparation is required. I'll admit I'm the junkie type. At times I can get to be ridiculous in my seasonal gardening routine. But the gardening gods somehow seemed to take pity on me and keep me feeling grandiose. Anna however just looks at me and says 'Fat Head'. Back to reality, sensibility and reliable garden tips.

This time of year it seems that every merchant store you walk into has a small or huge display of plant seeds. From vegetables to flowers, those individual packets sparkle like diamonds in a jeweler's case. Fortunately they are not sold by the karat but the price has definitely increased and the volume within has decreased. I suggest that if you're a junkie like me to bring along a pair of horse blinders. But it's hard and even though I just went in to pick up a needed item, I also have a hand full of bedazzling seed packets.

You now have a packet of supposedly fresh viable seeds. But low and behold while rummaging through your shoe box of saved seed packets; you discover packets of the same variety. Will the older seeds still be viable? I have seeds that are several years old and every year they will surprise me with their ability to germinate true to form. But here it is several weeks before the recommended time to actually begin germinating. It may be too early to start, but it is the perfect time to check if the saved seed is still viable.



As seen in the photo on the right, all you need is a small container, fill with about three inches of potting soil and drop in about 10 saved vegetable or bean seed. Cover seeds per recommended depth keep moist, not soggy. Place in a warm location, sunlight is not necessary for the majority of seedlings. The plants you see illustrated were fava bean and they were purchased several years ago. I hadn't planted any in several years, but they were almost 100 % in germination last year. that fava bag of seed will be good for several more years. GC
