Report from the Northern Illinois Annual Conference 2025 Janet Hugg, Lay Leader

The Northern Illinois Annual Conference took place June 9-11 this year at the Renaissance Conference Center in Schaumburg and the theme was "Grace Is Sufficient". There were about 700 clergy and laity members in attendance. This was my first experience with anything of this nature within my experience as a United Methodist and I found it enlightening, at times overwhelming, and overall affirming of what I believe and why I love my United Methodist faith. I also feel I have some sense of what it is like to be a representative in Congress! The legislative sessions were intense and filled with discussion, questioning, evaluating, amending, more discussion, and ultimately voting. I felt proud to be part of the discussion and humbled by the insight, opinions, and knowledge that others in the room brought to the discussion.

The constitutional amendments that were approved by the General Conference (all UMC churches around the world) in 2024 were put to a vote at this conference and all other Annual Conferences taking place around the world. This is basically the same as when an amendment is made to the US constitution and all states must ratify it. In our case the "Constitution" is our "Book of Discipline". The first and probably most significant amendment has to do with worldwide regionalization of the UMC. This would organize our denomination into geographic bodies rather than having all our global churches be under the jurisdiction of the US church. This would allow for other countries or regions to adapt parts of the Book of Discipline to their respective cultural norms. The second amendment was for the addition of the words 'gender' and 'disability" to the list of characteristics that do not bar people from membership in a UM congregation. The 3rd amendment is intended to strengthen the Discipline's wording on the UM stand against racism reading, in part, "Racism opposes God's law and diminishes the image of God in each person. Racism must be eradicated. The UMC commits to confronting and eliminating all forms of racism, racial inequity, colonialism, white privilege and white supremacy in every facet of its life and in society at large." The 4th amendment had to do with educational requirements for clergy voting rights at conferences and I don't feel I need to elaborate on it for you. All these amendments were passed at this conference and our votes will be added to the tally of all other Annual Conferences before the amendments are formally adopted with a 2/3d's majority.

At the local level, most of the legislative initiatives put forth by our conference centered around a commitment to recognizing the humanity in all persons and making a place for them in our society and in our churches. I was assigned to a group to discuss and vote on two initiatives. One called for our conference and its members to distance themselves by divestment from American companies that supplied war materials to the Middle East conflict. The second focused on resisting/challenging the political or religious groups supporting White Christian Nationalism in our country that seeks to combine patriotism and Christianity in a way that demeans and denies the humanity of any persons who don't fit their mold. I voted in favor of both of these initiatives.

I'm happy to report that with the help of donations from our own church, the conference provided over 4,000 lbs. of personal and home cleaning supplies as well as \$1K in donations to Midwest Mission for relief efforts in natural disasters, wars, and poverty stricken areas.

If anyone has any questions about the legislation I mentioned, I would be happy to talk with you after church or whenever is a good time. I look forward to attending future conferences.


