Embracing STEWARDSHIP: A DISCIPLE'S RESPONSE A Blueprint for Catholic Life

In 1992, the United States Conference of Catholic Bishops (USCCB) released a pastoral letter that would resonate through the years, shaping the way Catholics perceive and practice their faith. Titled *Stewardship: A Disciple's Response*, this document serves as a profound blueprint for how Catholics should live stewardship as a way of life and is — in essence — the roadmap for how we live out stewardship at our parishes.

At its core, stewardship is not merely a financial concept, but a profound spiritual principle deeply rooted in Catholic teachings. The 1992 pastoral letter seeks to enlighten Catholics on the transformative power of stewardship, inviting them to view their lives through the lens of discipleship and responsibility.

One of the pivotal messages of the document is the recognition that everything we have — our time, talent, and treasure — is a gift from God. Stewardship, as outlined by the USCCB, is the grateful and responsible management of these gifts in a way that reflects our love for God and others. It is a call to live out the Gospel in concrete and intentional ways, not just within the walls of the church but in every aspect of our daily lives.

The pastoral letter emphasizes that stewardship is not an optional aspect of the Christian life but an essential response to God's love. It challenges Catholics to move beyond mere Sunday worship and integrate their faith into every facet of their existence. In essence, stewardship is presented as a way of life, a continual commitment to recognize and utilize God-given gifts for the betterment of the world.

Furthermore, the document urges Catholics to embrace stewardship with a spirit of generosity, emphasizing the importance of sacrificial giving. This sacrificial aspect goes beyond monetary donations; it encompasses the giving of one's time and talents for the service of others. By doing so, individuals are called to be active participants in building a community that reflects the love and compassion of Christ.

Stewardship is not a one-size-fits-all concept, and the pastoral letter recognizes the diversity of gifts within the Catholic community. Each person is uniquely endowed with talents, and the document encourages a discernment process to identify and employ these gifts for the common good. In essence, the USCCB provides a framework for fostering a vibrant, engaged, and spiritually rich community by acknowledging and utilizing the varied talents of its members. The pastoral letter challenges Catholics to consider the broader implications of stewardship beyond the local parish. It calls for a heightened awareness of social justice issues, advocating for a commitment to building a more just and compassionate society. Stewardship, in this context, becomes a catalyst for positive change in the world, encouraging Catholics to be agents of justice and mercy.

Stewardship: A Disciple's Response is a timeless guide for Catholics seeking to deepen their relationship with God through the practice of stewardship. It presents a holistic approach to living out one's faith, challenging individuals to recognize and utilize their God-given gifts in the service of others. By embracing stewardship as a way of life, Catholics can contribute to building a community that reflects the transformative power of God's love in the world.

A Letter from Our Pastor

Living With a Stewardship "Attitude of Gratitude"

Dear Members of St. Joseph and Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parishes,

here is something about the month of August that is glorious. Summer is still in full force — the lazy, hazy days are with us, and some still have vacations on the horizon. And yet back-to-school preparations and a return to the busy-ness of life are just around the corner.

We are at that point in the year when some things are coming to an end and other things are beginning all at once. However, isn't that the way it always is? The Russian playwright and short-story writer Anton Chekhov once said: "People don't notice whether it is winter or summer when they are happy." There is certainly truth to that statement. You might say it is a stewardship statement.

You may be wondering how to make a connection between Chekhov's quote and stewardship. But the connection is found quite simply in the word "happy." I once heard someone say in a presentation about stewardship that people who live stewardship as a way of life are almost always happy. And there is a reason for that. Stewardship is a positive

way to live. It means being grateful and

centering our thoughts on gratitude. In other words, our focus is on the good things in life, not on the bad. This does not mean we have perfect health or that all is ideal in our family, that we always sleep well at night, or that we enjoy everything that happens to us or around us.

However, it does mean that when the good happens, we thank God. We recognize that good and are filled with a sense of joy and gratitude.

You and I know people like that, don't we? We know people who always seem filled with joy, regardless of what may be happening to them or around them personally. To me, these kinds of people are stewardship people — the kind of people we all need to strive to be.

No doubt you have heard that living a life of stewardship means living with an "attitude of gratitude." That is not easy, for you or for me. But it is certainly worth striving for, with


God's grace.

As we watch our summer season finish and the busier times of the year begin, let us concentrate on how God has blessed us. If we do that, I truly believe that we can be those people Chekhov described. If we are happy, it will not matter what time of year it is.

Bulk Mailers Ministry: Sharing Stewardship Gifts of Time and Enjoying Friendship in Return

or a parish to run well, a wide variety of support is needed from the parishioners. There are many ministries that require one to give of their talent. The Bulk Mailers Ministry asks its members to give of their time. The purpose of this ministry is a simple one — to assist office staff in sending out publications to the parishioners of the community.

"We primarily work to send out these newsletters to the parishioners," says Sandy Piwkowski, current coordinator for this ministry. "We send out over 2,100 each month so it takes a team to get it done. Typically, we get together on the last Wednesday of the month in the St. Joseph social hall. We have a system of how we lay everything out to make it run really smoothly. It usually takes us about two or two and a half hours."

The ministry has around 40 members, with an average of 20 who come to help each month. They work together to send out the newsletters while enjoying time together to be social and visit. Many of the volunteers are involved in other ministries as well. This is just one step to becoming more involved in the community.

"I always joke that it is like a quilting bee," Sandy says. "We get together and get the work done, but we visit at the same time and we have become friends. We get to catch up on each other's lives and the things that are going on. When we have new people join us, we make sure they are with experienced volunteers to learn the ropes. We want them to feel welcome and make sure they know how much we appreciate their help."

Friendships grow when you spend time together, visiting, and sharing about your lives. Those involved in the Bulk Mailers Ministry have found that it is a great experience to spend time together while also helping the parish with their needs. Working together towards a goal of helping others is a wonderful foundation for friendship.

Peace of Christ to you! This must have been the most frantic summer I have experienced while in the seminary. Between work, going to Kansas in the Chaplain Candidacy program, the Eucharistic Congress, and getting back in time for the Fest, I feel like I did no vacationing on my summer vacation.

And yet here we are again — another summer gives way to another year of formation. This starts, as always, with a silent retreat at the Jesuit Retreat Center in Parma. I recommend this place, should you ever find a reason to go!
