## RCIA PROFILE: Megan Campbell

### *A Journey Back Home to the Church*

One could say that Megan Campbell's life reflects the beloved adage, "Once a Catholic, always a Catholic." Her spiritual journey back home to the Catholic Church is inspiring and testifies to the grace of God, vibrantly alive in the world today.

"I grew up in a Catholic home and was baptized by Fr. Martello," she says. "I attended St. Joseph Parish School in Amherst for a few years. I made my First Confession and First Communion while attending there. My grandmother was a member of St. Joseph's Parish and I would attend Mass with her on Sundays and holidays sometimes. But then I left the parish school to attend Amherst public schools, so I wasn't confirmed. I think this is why I ended up stepping away from the faith."

Awhile later, Megan returned home to the loving arms of Mother Church. On July 6, 2020, she received the Sacrament of Confirmation, along with the blessing of her marriage.

"My husband, David, and I have been married for about 10 years, and we have an 8-year-old daughter, Taylor," Megan says. "When we enrolled her in St. Joseph Parish School, I decided to come back to

the Church. I felt comfortable coming back to our parish because it was the community I initially started to grow up in. Therefore, I enrolled in the RCIA [Rite of Christian Initiation for Adults] program here."

Megan truly enjoyed the RCIA process, finding it to be educational and inspiring.

"It was a wonderful experience," she says. "There was so much information to

## Getting to Know Parishioner **MARIA MROSEK**

### *A Life Fulfilled with Stewardship and Service*

Sometimes, it can be hard to quantify the impact that someone has had in our lives. But when reflecting, we see the plethora of ways in which their words, their example, and their priorities have shaped our own. For longtime St. Joseph parishioner Maria Mrosek, she credits that influence to her parents.

Born in Texas and raised in Pennsylvania until she was 14, Maria moved to Amherst in 1965. Her parents were faithful Catholics, who prioritized Catholic education for her and her seven younger siblings.

“I spent all 12 years in Catholic school,” Maria says. “As the oldest of eight children, my parents believed in the importance of a Catholic education, and I was so grateful for the opportunity and the sacrifices my parents made to make that happen.”

It was also her parents who instilled in her the value of stewardship. From a young age, Maria remembers knowing the importance of being involved in service to the parish community.

“My father taught us from a very young age that the Catholic Church is part of our community — that we are all God’s children and we need to give back to the parish and our neighbors, with the talents we have,” she says.

Over the years, Maria has served in a variety of different ways, from being a PSR and Confirmation catechist to singing in the choir, and serving as an Extraordinary Minister of Holy Communion. In retirement, she has taken advantage of the opportunity to be involved in even more ways, serving on the Stewardship Council, the Parish Council, and, most recently, organizing the 2020 Church Photo Directory for both parishes.

“I love to help in any way I can,” Maria says. “I guess it’s just part of my nature to volunteer.”

“I was somewhat limited during my working years — I never had time,” she adds. “But now, in retirement, I have plenty of time.”

Through her involvement, Maria has enjoyed the chance to get to know her fellow parishioners as they work alongside one another, seeking the common goal of building up the Church.

“I love meeting new people in our parish,” she says. “I love meeting new people, and also learning from them — learning what their faith means to them, sharing the ideas about our faith, and praying together.”

Although she has been active in her faith since she was young, Maria sees the mission of stewardship in the parish as a key part of fully embracing service to Christ.

“Stewardship encompasses our whole way of life,” she says. “It helps us to be more loving and caring, by using all our talents.”

Maria encourages ministry leaders in the parish to reach out to new members and other parishioners to consider how they might use their gifts and talents to give back to the parish family in service.

“Actively engage others in your committees and groups,” Maria says. “Encourage new ideas — embrace change. There’s so much that we can do to bring our parish to a new level in stewardship.”

A Letter from Our Pastor

## A Month and Year to HONOR ST. JOSEPH

Dear Members of St. Joseph and Nativity of the Blessed Virgin Mary Parishes,

**O**ur Lord and Savior Jesus Christ chose to enter the world through a human family. He came as an infant born into the marriage and home of the two holiest human creatures who ever lived — Mary and Joseph. At a time when our world and our Church needs family and faithful disciples now more than ever, could there be a more fitting time to venerate the man who gave his life and his love to the Blessed Mother and the Son of God?

Pope Francis has declared 2021 the Year of St. Joseph in honor of the 150th anniversary of the saint's proclamation as patron of the Universal Church. Our pope said he established the year so that "every member of the faithful, following his example, may strengthen their life of faith daily in the complete fulfillment of God's will."

As Christians, we are blessed to have Mary as our spiritual mother and Joseph as our spiritual father. Just as Mary guides us from heaven with loving devotion, St. Joseph also diligently provides for the needs of the family of God, the Holy Catholic Church.

Because of his special role as foster-father of the Child Jesus, St. Joseph has merited singular privileges in heaven unmatched by any saint aside from the Blessed Virgin Mary.

To give some modern-day perspective to the significance of this special year, Pope Francis has said the coronavirus pandemic heightened his desire to reflect on St. Joseph, as so many people during the

pandemic have made hidden sacrifices to protect others, just as St. Joseph quietly protected and cared for Mary and Jesus.

"Each of us can discover in Joseph — the man who goes unnoticed, a daily, discreet and hidden presence — an intercessor, a support and a guide in times of trouble," the pope wrote.


At the end of the First Vatican Council in 1870, Pope Pius IX declared St. Joseph the patron of the Universal Church. He is also the patron of carpenters, workers, fathers, and a happy death because he died in the presence of Mary and Jesus. The title of Joseph's March 19 feast day is "Husband of Mary." Pope Pius XII later declared May 1 to be the feast of St. Joseph the Worker to counteract the Communist May Day holiday.

As Catholics pray and reflect on the life of St. Joseph this year, they also have opportunities to gain a plenary indulgence or remission of all temporal punishment due to sin. An indulgence can be applied to oneself or to a soul in purgatory. An indulgence requires a specific act, defined by the Church, as well as sacramental confession, Eucharistic Communion, prayer for the pope's intentions, and full detachment from sin.

Special indulgences during the Year of St. Joseph can be received through various prayers and actions, including praying for the unemployed, entrusting one's daily work to St. Joseph, performing a corporal or spiritual work of mercy, or meditating for at least 30 minutes on the Lord's Prayer.

As we devote 2021 to St. Joseph's honor, we will undoubtedly unlock many special graces — not only for our parishes but for each of the faithful who increase their devotion to him during this special year. There is no greater model than St. Joseph from whom we can learn how to live virtuously in imitation of Jesus and Mary.

“This entire year, we will explore different ways to utilize our newly enhanced sanctuary,” Sue says.

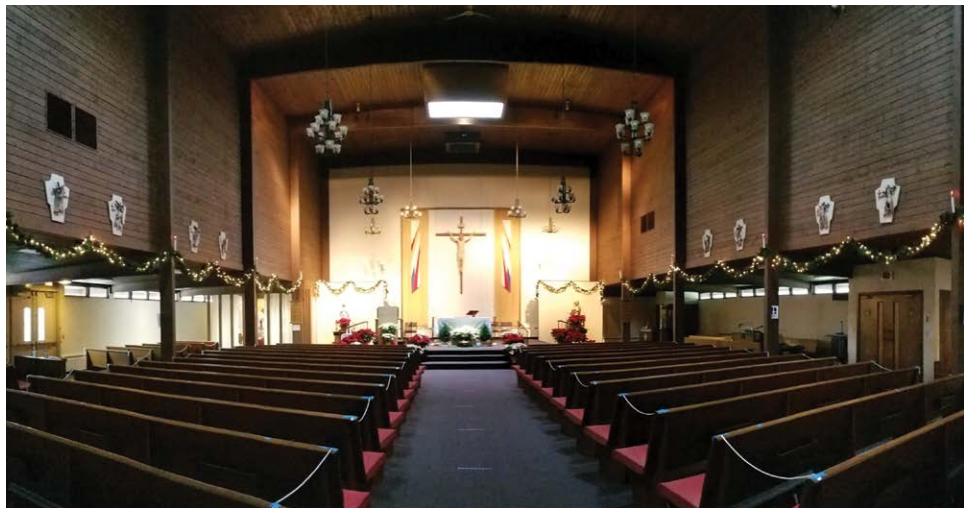

### **FASTING AND ABSTINENCE**

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are obligatory days of fasting and abstinence for Catholics, but are not Holy Days

of Obligation. Additionally, Fridays during Lent are days of abstinence. The norms on fasting are obligatory from age 18 until 59. When fasting, a person is permitted to eat one full meal, as well as two smaller meals that together are not equal to a full meal. Likewise, the norms for abstaining from meat are binding from age 14 onwards. If possible, the fast on Good Friday is continued until the Easter Vigil — on Holy Saturday night — as the “paschal fast” to honor the suffering and death of the Lord Jesus and to prepare ourselves to share more fully and to celebrate more readily His Resurrection.

learn that I actually came back for another year. I enjoyed the content of our RCIA sessions, and how it was broken down and explained to us. I also enjoyed the laughs we shared.”

While Megan points that she is still learning about the saints, she particularly appreciates the example of the saint she chose for her Confirmation — St. Brigid.

“She is the saint of infants and children with abusive fathers,” Megan says. “She is also known for helping those who are less fortunate or poor.”

Now that she is a fully initiated Catholic, Megan savors her newfound faith and appreciates how it is positively transforming her.

“One of the aspects of the Catholic faith that appeals to me is the sense of community that it gives to you, the feeling

of family,” she says. “It is great to know that we are all at church for different reasons, but yet for the same reasons. Now as a Catholic, I hope to become a better person and to share this goodness with others.”

Looking forward, Megan hopes to embrace stewardship in a new way.

“When things calm down with COVID, I would like to help out our community by giving more than just monetarily — for example, maybe with the school as they help with the Blessing House throughout the year,” she says.

Currently, Megan works with the Amherst School System as the Color Guard Instructor for the Marching Band. She also works in administration for a long-term care facility, and as a state-tested nursing assistant.
