16th. This is an important
event for our community allowing us to serve over 30
Creston families!



In order to encourage highprotein and nutrient rich donations, we will be tallying items a bit differently than in past years. Items with more nutritional value will be scored double. For example, a can of tuna or chicken will count as two items while a can of corn will count as one. This is a new system, so we appreciate patience as we work out any details we may not have anticipated. Any cash donations will still be counted as \$1 = one item. Donations will be counted a couple of times each week and class totals will be recorded in the front entrance. The class with the highest total will win a prize. As in past years, please donate only shelf-stable, nonperishable items in unopened boxes, bags, or cans. If you're not sure what to donate, think about what you like to keep in your pantry and that's a good guide. A well-balanced donation bag could include: a bag of pasta, two cans of chicken/tuna, a jar of peanut butter, a few cans of beans, a bag of rice, a can of tomatoes, a few cans of soup either with meat or beans, and another can of vegetables.

Family Life

October is Bullying Prevention Month. We know that school staff can do a great deal to prevent bullying and protect students, but they can't do it alone. Parents and youth also have a role to play in preventing bullying at school.

The entire family can help with potential bullying. Kids learn from adults' actions. By treating others with kindness and respect, adults show the kids in their lives that there is no place for bullying. Even if it seems like they are not paying attention, kids are watching how adults manage stress and conflict, as well as how they treat their friends, colleagues, and families.

Bullying can occur in multiple ways. Bullying can be verbal, physical, through social exclusion, and via the Internet. Kids who know what bullying is can better identify it. They can talk about bullying if it happens to them or others. Kids need to know ways to safely stand up to bullying and how to get help. When families are engaged in bullying and create positive school climates, students feel safer and can focus on learning, Teachers and staff can focus on their work, Schools can develop more responsive solutions because students are more likely to see or hear about bullying than adults and School climate improves because students are engaged in taking action.

Principal's Corner:



Creating a Safe and Inclusive Climate at Creston Together

In speaking with PTA around the focus this month on bullying prevention, I'd like to start with sharing what I say to any student involved in a situation around feeling unsafe at school:

I tell them that my most important job at the school is to make sure all students feel safe, comfortable, and happy at school so they can do their most important job- to learn.

I believe providing a climate of safety and comfort is a team effort. That team includes teachers, support staff, students, parents, community, and district level support personnel. To create a climate in which everyone feels safe, everyone must have a voice in sharing what that looks like to them and how they feel comfortable addressing behaviors that make them feel uncomfortable, unsafe, or threatened by others. This communication among all groups is at the heart of addressing the issues. We must provide forums for students to regularly talk with the adults in their lives, both at home and at school, so that when issues arise we all know we can count on each other to help solve them.

In explaining how we have already started our Climate work at Creston, get ready for a few acronyms! I think it is important that parents understand these, along with how we use them as a district and school to address school behavior and climate in a proactive and team based way. We have a Climate Team at Creston that is made up of several teachers, representing a cross section of grade levels. We will also be seeking parent involvement soon, once we get the baseline for our work this year mapped out. So if you are interested, we'll be reaching out around the beginning of November for some parent representation.

Since I know that Creston staff and families are part of a tight community, we are at a strong advantage for already having created a circle of support around students by having

caring, familiar, and trusted adults to talk to. In working with staff and our Climate Team members at Creston, in conjunction with our district level Climate support staff-Sydney Johnson (Restorative Justice TOSA *Teacher on Special Assignment) and Karina Kidd (Climate TO-SA), we have begun to look at our work this year in using a tool called a TFI *Tiered Fidelity Inventory to guide our work. This tool is standard in schools using Culturally Responsive PBIS *Positive Behavior Intervention Support schools. (A great resource to learn more about PBIS schools is at www.pbis.org)

This means that we establish universal schoolwide behavioral supports and expectations for all students around positive interactions, clear communication, and systems of problem solving based on a reciprocal accountability to each other for creating a safe learning environment that honors each person's beliefs, background, culture, race, religion, identity, and individuality. By focusing on a community based on equity and inclusion that respects and cares for each other, we create responsibility for our own actions, as well as the actions of others in our community. Essentially- we are a team and a family that works together for the good of us all!

If you have any questions around our Climate Team work, please feel free to chat with me, or any of our team members any time. And again- if you want to get involved in the work, we will be reaching out soon for family members who are interested. I would like to thank PTA and staff for all of their work and focus on making Creston a safe and caring community for students.
