Bulk Rubbish Removal and Local Recycling Facilities

Fly tipping of rubbish on the estate including alongside the refuse bins is not acceptable and every effort will be made to identify the perpetrators and charge them for the removal.

Suggestions for removal of rubbish and recycling facilities are as follows:

Bulky Items: Lambeth Council can collect large, unwanted items that you cannot re-use or recycle.

Each collection costs £17.00, for up to 2 separate items or 2 bags.

Additional items cost an extra £8.00 each.

Please let the office know if there will be items left on the estate awaiting pick up.

If residents need help moving items to the pick up area please contact the office.

If residents are not able to arrange for bulk rubbish collection via the means above please contact the office regarding removal.

Items in good, usable condition can be donated to local charities. Some charities offer free collections, for example [Emmaus](#) or [British Heart Foundation](#).

Items that can't be reused, but can be recycled, should be taken to a [reuse and recycling centre](#) Lambeth provides lists of local recycling providers and enables you to search by product, eg, batteries, light bulbs, toasters etc.

Local pavement recycling containers include clothes and book donations on Baylis Road, shoes and textiles on China Walk Estate, Lambeth Road and small electrical items on Briant Estate, Hercules Road.

If you have difficulty recycling small electrical items please contact the office.

Disposal of furniture and mattresses between sub-lets is the responsibility of the leaseholder. Removal of old mattresses can be arranged with the purchase of a new mattress. We would be grateful if leaseholder landlords would comply with this to minimise the quantity of bulk rubbish and cost of collections to the estate.

Most retailers must provide a way for you to dispose of old household electrical and electronic equipment when you buy a new version of the same item. You should check with the retailer before you order a collection – find out more about [retailer responsibilities](#). This is particularly relevant to the purchase of large appliances such as fridges and cookers.
