**O**nce upon a time, logging contractors were simply machine owner/operators, production was king, and margins healthy. That mystic era, if it ever existed, is no more.

Today, margins are tight and the successful logging contractor had better be thinking about more than production. Certainly loggers have to have one good eye on production and costs to survive. But the other should be focused on a slew of other issues, from log quality and road conditions to safety, weather, water quality, impending regulation changes, soil conditions and site disturbance, operator training, new company requirements for certification and documentation, regen protection, waste management, parts inventory, maintenance schedules and uptime, new equipment trends, public relations, community involvement and so on.
