

# ORAL CANCER SCREENING "It's More Than Grasping the Tongue" Part One

Do you struggle with educating patients about HPV and oral cancer?

Does your office have established systems for oral cancer screening, documentation, and referrals?

Ever delayed a referral because a patient wasn't perceived to be at risk or their persistent symptom didn't seem concerning?

Dentistry is consistently changing and in recent years research, evidence, and technology are bringing rapid changes in all areas. At times it can be daunting to keep teams updated, clinicians calibrated, and patients educated. Oral cancer is a part of that ever-changing world of dentistry.

Current evidence reveals that there are known signs and symptoms of oral and oropharyngeal cancer that may be present before anything is identified with the naked eye or by palpation when screening. There are additional risk factors that may increase the risk of oral cancer.

Attendees will gain an appreciation for an updated health history, verbal inquiry of risk factors and persistent signs and symptoms, to help aid in screening and early detection.

This course is a journey into "what we know now" in oral cancer, the first three science based, pillars of screening in the "Cotten Method" - etiologies, additional risk factors, and signs and symptoms. Utilizing current evidence, oral cancer survivor stories, and awareness of liability concerns, attendees will gain a deep understanding of why these three pillars are essential in today's thorough screening, and why screening is more than grasping the tongue.

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# ORAL CANCER SCREENING "It's more than grasping the tongue" PART TWO

Ever wish you were more confident when performing the intraoral and extraoral evaluation?

What specific parts of the screening are you unsure about?

"I've never had this done before" is your team calibrated?

Time constraints, a lack of confidence when screening, production-driven procedures taking precedence, or the belief a patient isn't at risk are reported reasons the visual and tactile, extraoral, and intraoral evaluation isn't performed thoroughly or at all. Sometimes there is no reason, it just isn't performed. Dental professionals are at varying stages of skill and confidence in screening. The purpose of this course is to meet dental professionals where they are, and support them in achieving confidence and skill in this life-saving procedure, When a clinician is skilled and confident in performing a procedure it is more likely to be done, and performed efficiently and thoroughly.

This is the 4th pillar of screening in the "Cotten Method". Susan will utilize her comprehensive instructional screening videos, and/or photos, to show what a thorough intraoral and extraoral evaluation entails, discussing provider and patient positioning for optimal visualization, and techniques for palpation. Utilizing Susan's training as a Myofunctional Therapist, attendees will learn Mallampati Score and Tonsil Grade recognition and documentation, and why

these are important in the oropharyngeal evaluation. Liability concerns and updated coding will be addressed.

## "Let's Give Them Something to Talk About" How About the "Oral-Oral Link"!

Are your patients aware their poor oral health is a risk factor for oral cancer?

Do you want to increase your knowledge of HPV?

Would you like to have more confidence sharing information about HPV with patients, and strategies to share this critical information?

The "oral-systemic link" is one of the most popular and critically important topics in dentistry today and with good reason. Poor oral health and oral pathogens are known to have ill effects on systemic health.

There is another conversation that is critically important "oral-oral link" conversation is as important, if not more important to the dental community and patients, than the popular oral-systemic link?

Evidence shows that two persistent oral infections are known to be risk factors for oral cancers. Poor oral health/periodontitis and the oral pathogens associated with this oral disease are known risk factors for oral cancer. Persistent oral infections with oncogenic types of the Human Papillomavirus/HPV, are known to cause over 80% oropharyngeal/throat cancers.

This course will discuss periodontitis and it's role as a risk factor for oral cancer, and will take a deep dive into the Human Papilomavirus/HPV. Attendees will expand their knowlege of HPV, HPV infections, modes of transmission, HPV vaccine, and oral HPV testing.

Do you have a plan to protect and replace your income in the event you are injured or become ill and can no longer practice clinical dentistry?

During a day in clinical dentistry, clinicians often contort their bodies for optimal visualization, rush between patients to stay on time, and at times work with equipment that isn't optimal ergonomically. All of these can put a clinician at risk for an injury and a musculoskeletal disorder/MSD.

An unforeseen illness, injury, or MSD can prohibit the dental professional from physically being able to work in clinical dentistry or continue with their full clinical schedule.

If you experience an injury or illness what is your plan to replace your income and pay bills until you can return to work, or find another source of income? A proactive approach to income replacement, disability insurance can help maintain a lifestyle, home, and pay bills, when an unexpected injury or illness occurs.

This course will discuss important basics of disability insurance, different riders to consider, and critical information comparing individual policies, employer policies, and group policies. Susan will weave in her experience of a career ending injury and how her disability insurance was instrumental in her keeping her home, after loosing her ability to practice clinical dental hygiene.

**Susan is dentistry's oral cancer coach!** She lives and breathes early detection of oral and oropharyngeal cancer, thoroughly screening every patient, and reducing the risk of liability for the dental professional. As a skin cancer survivor, Susan advocates for observing the skin of the head and neck for abnormalities during the oral cancer evaluation and making a referral to a dermatologist for further investigation.

There was a time in Susan's dental hygiene when she knew very little about oral cancer and was neither confident nor thorough when performing an oral cancer screening. It was two events within the same week, a heartbreaking conversation with her favorite patient who is an oral cancer survivor, and being selected for Donny Osmond's Make a Difference program, which acted as catalysts for her passion and deep dive into HPV, oral, and oropharyngeal cancer, and the work she does now.

Susan is the founder and CEO of **Oral Cancer Consulting**, she developed the "Cotten Method", a dental oral cancer office system and method of screening. Susan believes the entire dental team plays a role in raising awareness, educating patients, and early detection. She works with dental and medical professionals in private practice, DSOs, Integrated Health Centers, and FQHCs, to increase their confidence in screening, increase early detection, and reduce the risk of liability.

Susan is the Dental Workgroup Lead for the Alliance for HPV Free Colorado, a 2024 member of RDH Magazine editorial board, a Regional Coordinator and RDH Advisory Board member at the Oral Cancer Foundation, a director at Dental Codeology Consortium, and KOL for several dental companies, past oral cancer screening coordinator and board member at Colorado Mission of Mercy, She is a published author in RDH Magazine, DentistryToday.com, and DentistryIQ. Susan has organized countless free oral cancer screening events, including the Denver Broncos Health and Wellness Expo, and volunteered with a head and neck oncology surgeon providing free head and neck exams and oral cancer screenings to the homeless. She has appeared on 9News in Denver discussing HPV, the HPV vaccine, and oral cancer.

Susan is the 2020 recipient of the Ethel Covington Award from the Colorado Dental Hygiene Association/CODHA. In 2018, a recipient of the Sunstar RDH Award of Distinction and CODHA Outstanding Contribution Award. Susan founded M.A.D.(Make A Difference) for Healthy Smiles as a 2010-2011 member of Donny Osmond's inaugural Make a Difference program, and received Volunteer of the Year from the Oral Cancer Foundation in 2011. In 2023, Susan was selected the winner of Dentistry's Got Talent, a dental speaking competition consisting of dentists, dental hygienists, consultants, and coaches. Judges were event planners from major dental conferences across the U.S.
