


Member Health and Welfare

Shel Silverstein First Class Forever (58c) Pane of 20 Apr 8 - Chicago, IL The extraordinarily versatile Shel Silverstein (1930–1999) was one of the 20th century's most imaginative authors and illustrators. "The Giving Tree," published in 1964 by Harper & Row, is about a friendship between a motherly tree and a boy. As the child grows older, the tree gives him its shade, apples, branches and trunk. The story ends with the boy, now an old man, returning to rest against the tree's stump. The best-selling tale of selflessness, which is accompanied by the author's elegantly simple black-and-white illustrations, is considered a classic of children's literature.

Children are enthralled by Silverstein's poetry, which is full of fantastical imagery and often deals with the joys and fears of childhood.

One of the nation's greatest modernist artists and a founding figure of Native American modernism, George Morrison (1919-2000) challenged prevailing ideas of what Native American art should be, arguing that an artist's identity can exist independently from the nature of the art he creates. Morrison is best known for his abstract landscapes and monumental wood collages. A pane of 20 colorful stamps showcases five of Morrison's artworks. The selvage features a photograph of the artist in his home studio. Antonio Alcalá was the art director and designer for this stamp pane.

The Citizens Stamp Advisory Committee (CASC) was founded in 1957. Members are appointed by the Postmaster General (PMG). Citizens come from all walks of life with historians, artists, designers, educators, scientists and at least one stamp collector! They make recommendations to the PMG for future stamps based on submissions and insight from the public

Ukraine Stamps by Jim Stadermann

After the collapse of the Romanov dynasty and its Russian Empire near the end of World War I, an assembly of native Ukrainians met at Kyiv and declared the Ukrainian National Republic on January 22, 1918. The first Ukrainian stamps were issued in July 1918.

For most of the next three years independent Ukraine and its Ukrainian army were amidst friends and foes in an ongoing civil war. The Bolshevik armies were well-equipped with the arms from the Russian arsenals. So were the White Russians (the anti-Bolsheviks under Kerensky). Allied and Polish armies were added to the mix, and fought back and forth across the country. A bad time to be a mailman in Ukraine!

By November 1920 Ukraine was finally occupied by Soviet forces, and Soviet stamps were used from that time until the re-creation of the independent nation of Ukraine on December 26, 1991.





Ukrainian stamps are varied and are in the Ukraine language—the official language of the nation. Ukraine is the second largest nation in Europe, trailing only Russia. Overlaid on a map of the U.S., it would extend east to west, from New York City to Chicago!

Fun With Stamps by Frank Schmitt

While stamp collecting can be serious business when we are in pursuit of that ever-elusive stamp or cover we so desperately need to add to our collection or exhibit it can also be the source of some fun.

It is time for our high school "Class of 1967" reunion – 55 years. We are now the group that the class of 2017 points at and says, "look at those old guys, wow!". Just as we did back in 1972 trying to comprehend having graduated from high school so many, many years ago.

As a stamp collector and, as many, having a surplus of discount postage I offered to provide the postage for the invitations. That offer was quickly accepted and the invitation to affix the postage on the envelopes was extended to me as well. I felt that was reasonable and it also gave me free reign to choose and properly affix the chosen stamps.

I looked through my assortment of stamps that would provide me with 58 cents of postage in a reasonable number of stamps. I then had the thought that the stamps should be of some significance to our class and reunion. The hunt begins.

Being children and young adults in the period of the great space race I found Scott #2631-34, the 29¢ Space Accomplishments issued in 1992, to be appropriate as it coincided with our 25th reunion and demonstrated the vast advances made in that period. Since all of us were affected in some manner, Scott #2109, the 20¢ Viet Nam Memorial stamp was an obvious choice, having a different meaning for each classmate. Logically, in my mind, next would be a stamp issued in the year of our graduation, 1967. I chose to mix it up a little and chose the following options (all 5 cent commemoratives); Scott #'s 1323 National Grange Poster, #1324 Canada Centenary, #1325 Erie Canal 150th Anniversary, #1328 Nebraska Statehood 100th Anniversary and #1337 Mississippi Statehood 150th Anniversary, all of which had the year 1967 in the stamp design. Since most of the classmates were born in 1949, I chose a selection of 1949 commemoratives (all 3 cents); Scott #'s 981 Minnesota Territory Issue, #982 Washington and Lee University Bicentenary, #983 Puerto Rico Gubernatorial Election, and #984 Annapolis Tercentenary Issue. The total of the combination of four of these stamps was 57 cents, so I completed the first-class postage rate with Scott #4672, the 1¢ Bobcat issue of 2012 (45th graduation anniversary) which demonstrates our tenacity to live the "wild-life" and survive to celebrate this reunion!

So, there you have it. A fun, themed, timeline of life for our class on the cover for our invitation. It also may spark new, or renew, interest in stamp collecting in some of my classmates. Afterall we were of the era when most magazines, newspapers and matchbooks had coupons to send in 25 cents for a set of approvals or for free stamps to whet our appetites and lure us into this great hobby of stamp collecting.

I have included this cropped photo of three of the covers to be used for the mailing of the invitations.



Do any other members have fun with their mailings. We might not have an event with so much history that inspired Frank but we can still have some fun preparing our mailings and saving money by using discount postage!

Two years after I married Bonnie I asked her if I could put the stamps on our Christmas cards. Back then we sent about 75. I went about acquiring MANY Christmas stamps of various denominations over the next year and she got a surprise one morning when I had them all stamped with three to five stamps on each card! Now she buys Christmas stamps when I drag her to a stamp show! - Editor.
