

2022 New Issues - August

Nancy Reagan Pane of 20 Jul 6 - Simi Valley, CA

Born July 6, 1921 in New York City as Anne Frances Robbins, the future First Lady of the First Class Forever (60c) United States was enjoying a film career, as Nancy Davis, when she married Ronald Reagan in 1952, who at that time was president of the Screen Actors Guild. She served as First Lady beside her husband during his two terms in office, from January 1981 to January 1989. During her years of service as First Lady, one of her primary interests was recreational drug prevention and the founding of the "Just Say No" campaign.

> The stamp art is a detail from the official 1987 White House portrait by Aaron Shikler. The oil-on-canvas portrait features Mrs. Reagan dressed in her signature red color, in a flowing gown designed by James Galanos. The full-body portrait was cropped to accommodate the stamp format.

> There have been suggestions that all First Ladies should be honored on stamps. To date the only ones so honored have been Martha Washington, Dolley Madison, Abigail Adams, Eleanor Roosevelt and Lady Bird Johnson.

Buzz Lightyear First Class Forever (60c) Pane of 20 Aug 3 - Hollywood, CA

Previewed on June 8 at the red-carpet premiere of Disney and Pixar's "Lightyear," the new movie featuring Buzz Lightyear, this pane of 20 stamps, is titled "Go Beyond" by the USPS, with that name on each stamp. The fictional character is a Space Ranger superhero, part of the highly popular Toy Story franchise. He was given the name Buzz in honor of Apollo 11 astronaut Edwin "Buzz" Aldrin, the second person to walk on the Moon.

Buzz is known for being Woody's best friend in the Toy Story movie franchise from Disney and Pixar.

Elephants First Class Forever (60c) PSA Double-sided Booklet of 20 Aug 12 - Hohenwald, TN



This lighthearted and playful stamp celebrates America's affection for elephants. A graphic illustration of an elephant interacting with its young calf represents the loving nature of these beloved animals. Two stylized plants and a bright orange sun add whimsy and color. Americans have been intrigued by elephants since the first one arrived on our shores in 1796. While Americans loved the floppy-eared giants, they were not always conscientious in providing care and nurturing for the emotional and sensitive creatures. However, changing attitudes in the United States have increased awareness of conditions for captive elephants, encouraged circuses to discontinue using elephants as performers, enabled legislation to ban ivory importation and encouraged conservation efforts for elephants in the wild.

The First Day site, Hohenwald, Tenn., is the home of The Elephant Sanctuary, the largest natural-habitat sanctuary for elephants in the U.S.

Be careful, be safe, be seen. Happy stamp collecting.




PCU Beloit LCS 29 - Jeff Hall

PCU [future USS] Beloit LCS 29 was Christened & Launched on May 7, 2022 by ships sponsor Army Maj. General Marcia Anderson at the Fincantieri Marinette Marine Shipbuilding on the Menominee River in Marinette, WI. The Beloit is the only 2nd ship to be named for local city since the USS Rockford [PF-48] during WWII [commissioned March 6,1944- decommissioned August 26,1945] she was then Lend-Leased to the Soviets.

Pony Cars First Class Forever (60c) Pane of 20 Great American Stamp Show Aug 25 - Sacramento, CA

In the 1960s, a new breed of vehicle began appearing on our nation's roads. Over the past six decades, fast and fun pony cars have become a uniquely American obsession. Since their emergence, these performance coupes and convertibles have brought a youthful spirit to the automotive world.

These stamps celebrate five iconic U.S. automobiles — the **1969 Ford Mustang Boss 302**, the **1970 Dodge Challenger R/T**, the **1969 Chevrolet Camaro Z/28**, the **1967 Mercury Cougar XR-7 GT** and the **1969 AMC Javelin SST**. The bold and dramatic artwork, painted with oils on panel, captures the energy and mystique of pony cars.

By the time of the 1970s energy crisis, sales of the once ubiquitous pony cars had begun to decline. But by the end of the decade, the cars had a resurgence. Pony cars were cultural icons; throughout the 1970s, they appeared in many television shows and movies.

National Marine Sanctuaries First Class Forever (60c) Pane of 16 Aug 5 - Santa Cruz, CA

For 50 years, U.S. marine sanctuaries and marine national monuments have protected areas with special ecological, cultural and historical significance. Each of the 16 stamps on the pane features a photograph from a site that is part of the National Marine Sanctuary System, showcasing some of our nation's precious natural treasures. A map of the National Marine Sanctuary System is printed on the back of the pane.

Santa Cruz is home to the Monterey Bay National Marine Sanctuary. Overlooking the Pacific Ocean, it is one of America's largest marine sanctuaries.

Interrupted Mail - Mail Robbery - By Tim Wait

Dec 21, 2932 12m Englewood, Colo.

Christmas card mailed at the 1-1/2¢ Printed Matter Unsealed third-class, single piece rate.

Beginning on May 4, 1911, it became possible to send certain types of mail matter unsealed such that third-class, single-piece rates, rather than first-class rate, applied.

Included in this category were cards such as Christmas or Easter cards, which could contain in writing such simple inscriptions as Happy New Year, Dear Sir, signatures, etc.

This special category was discontinued as of January 7, 1968,

The card was mailed at Englewood, Colo. December 21, 1932, at the $1-1/2\phi$ per 2 oz. rate effective April 15, 1925 to December 31, 1948. The letter received water damage and had the stamp partially torn off and secured with tape that turned the envelope paper brown before finally falling off. It received an auxiliary marking (USPOD marking that helped explaine how mail was handled or what caused a delay) of:

DELAY & DAMAGE DUE / TO MAIL ROBBERY

The backstamp, Dallas, Texas, April 8, 1933, almost four months later, indicates that either the mail was "lost" and then found or perhaps held as evidence! Further research is required.
