

THE SEALS OF 1907 WERE ISSUED AND SOLD BY THE DELAWARE CHAPTER OF THE AMERICAN RED CROSS



1907

Two days after the first supply of 1907 seals went on sale more than 30,000 were sold. The Wilmington printer was swamped, so a Philadelphia firm was enlisted. Soon it was seen that "Merry Christmas" would be deadlined before the demand dwindled, so "Happy New Year" was added to the design.

When the 1909 sale reaped \$250,00 the doubters began to thin out, though some shook their heads... thought it was not possible to raise funds by this method. Carl Wingate designed the 1909 stamp.

For the 1908 Christmas stamp campaign, the American Red Cross moved to sponsor it in coast to coast. Howard Pyle, the noted Wilmington artist, designed this second issue. Two days after the sales started, the Washington headquarters of the Red Cross had to hire twenty extra clerks to handle rush orders.



1910

Some confusion resulted in the sale of "Christmas Stamps", some possible thinking they were buying postage stamps used them for the prepayment of postage on letters. It was then apparent that the name must be changed and the use of "seals" came into being. In 1910, the design by Mrs. Guion Thompson sold \$300,000 of seals.

In 1911 sales ran up to a record \$320,000, from a modest beginning just a few years before of \$3,000! By these mounting sales, no greater contribution has been made in the fight against tuberculosis than that of the late Miss Emily Bissell, who conceived the Christmas Seal idea. The 1911 design was the work of Anton Rudert.

United States Revenues - Their Purpose Illustrated by Tim Wait

Stock Transfer (RD) The Revenue Act of 1914 included a tax on the transfer of stock. From 1914 to 1966, a federal Financial Transaction Tax was levied on sales and transfers of stock. The rate was originally 0.02 percent of the stock's par value (the value stated in the charter, which is usually lower than current market value). In 1932, the tax rose to between 0.04 and 0.06 percent depending on the type of transaction. In 1959, after firms had become practiced at manipulating par value to avoid tax, the base was changed to market value, and the rate was cut to 0.04 percent. From 1960 to 1966, stocks were taxed at the rate of 0.10 percent at issuance and 0.04 percent on transfer.

The State of New York imposed a stock transfer tax from 1905 to 1981. The tax is still levied, but since 1981 it has been refunded upon request. The tax is \$0.0125 per share for stocks with prices under \$5, rising in steps to \$0.05 per share for stocks with prices of \$20 or more

The Documentary stamps of 1917 were overprinted "Stock Transfer" starting in 1918. Denominations from 1¢ to \$1,000 were overprinted. Our first example is a stock trade by Jacquelin & de Coppet, 47 Broad street, New York, Sep 19, 1930s.



The Stock "T" stood for the American Telephone & Telegraph Co., which reverted back to "T' in 1930. The Federal tax was \$1.25 and the New York State tax was \$1.00. This example shows the cents values and the \$1. The higher dollar values design is illustrated above with a \$50 stamp.

In 1940 the 1917-1933 documentary tax stamps were overprinted "Stock Transfer" and "Series of 1940" This Oct 21, 1940 example from Lapham, Davis & Bianchi, 44 Pine Street, New York is taxed 78¢ for Federal Tax and \$2 for the New York State Tax.


ROCKFORD STAMP CLUB
