

USPS 2017 New Issues

Year of the Rooster January 5—Seattle, WA



The Year of the Rooster stamp is the 10th of 12 stamps in the current Celebrating Lunar New Year cycle. Compared to the design of most previous stamps in this current stamp series, the animal is pictured prominently, in the form of a rooster emblazoned on a red envelope. Parents present red envelopes containing money to children and loved ones during Lunar New Year celebrations. The color red symbolizes luck in Chinese culture, while rooster imagery is often used to ward off evil spirits.

The Year of the Rooster begins January 28, 2017 and ends February 15, 2018. In popular Chinese culture, people born in the Year of the Rooster, among other traits, symbolize fidelity and punctuality—the rooster being known for waking up people regularly and on time.

This stamp is a continuation of the Postal Service tradition of creating stamps that celebrate love. The first such stamp, issued in 1973, used as the basis for its design Robert Indiana's pop art "LOVE" sculpture. The 2017 Love Skywriting stamp is intended to add a romantic touch to letters and cards, not only on Valentine's Day, but year-round. As described by the USPS, "the stamp depicts the word 'Love' written in white cursive script against a blue sky studded with wispy clouds. Underlining the word is a decorative swirl of smoke. A small, stylized plane, dwarfed by the giant letters, completes the end of the swirl, with smoke trailing from its tail."

Love Skywriting January 7—Chino, CA



The art of skywriting is documented as early as 1915, just a dozen years after the Wright Bothers' history-making flights at Kitty Hawk, NC. In an online series on the history of flight, NBC News reported that stunt pilot Art Smith used flares to accomplish a form of skywriting on the closing night of the Panama-Pacific International Exposition in san Francisco.

Dorothy Height February 1—Washington, DC



The 40th stamp in the Black Heritage series honors Dorothy Height, an activist who dedicated her life to fighting for racial and gender equality. Starting her career as a caseworker in the New York City Welfare Department, she joined the National Council of Negro Women in 1937, serving as the organizations president from 1957 to 1997.

She became one of the most influential civil rights leaders of the 20th century, providing advice and support to U.S. Presidents from Franklin Delano Roosevelt to Lyndon Johnson. She received the Presidential Medal of Freedom in 1994 and the Congressional Gold Medal in 2004. She stood with Martin Luther King Jr. as an organizer of the 1963 March on Washington and was an honored guest at the 2008 inauguration of President Barack Obama. Born March 24, 1912, in Richmond, Va., Height died April 20, 2010 at age 98.

Flash Back ~ U.S. Post Office Department—50 years ago 1967

In 1967 their was a total of 15 commemorative stamps issued, all denominated 5¢. Subjects included; National Grange 100 years, Canada Centenary, 150th anniversary of the Erie Canal, Search for Peace, Lions 50th anniversary, Henry David Thoreau, born 1817, Nebraska Statehood 100th anniversary, Voice of America 25th anniversary, American Folklore-Davy Crockett, Accomplishments in Space, Space-Walking Astronaut-2 stamps, Urban Planning, Finland Independence 1917-1967, Thomas Eakins, painter, Mississippi Statehood 150th anniversary and ONE Christmas issue depicting a Madonna and Child. There were two airmail issues; 8¢ domestic rate, Alaska Purchase 1867-1967, and 20¢ international rate, "Columbia Jays" by John James Audubon. This was basically the same design as the 5¢ stamp issued in 1963.


I have all ten of the stamps, each showing a scene and a title such as "A railroad center", "industry", "a City of Culture"...

I enjoy collecting Rockford items, and was happy to purchase these at the last Chicagopex show in November.

Feature Article - Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition 1909

The Alaska-Yukon-Pacific Exposition was a world's fair held in Seattle in 1909, publicizing the development of the Pacific Northwest. It was originally planned for 1907, to mark the 10th anniversary of the Klondike Gold Rush, but the organizers found out about the Jamestown Exposition being held that year, and rescheduled. The fairgrounds became the campus of the University of Washington.

The fair was the idea of Godfrey Chealander, then Grand Secretary of the Arctic Brotherhood, who was involved in the Alaska Territory exhibit at the 1905 Lewis and Clark Exposition in Portland, Oregon.

Edmond S. Meany proposed that the exposition be held on the then largely forested campus of the University of Washington, which in 1905 had exactly three buildings and little deliberate landscaping. At the time, this was considered rather far from the center of town, but Meany eventually sold the others involved on the idea that the forested campus could, itself, be an attraction for out-of-town visitors.

The state legislature endorsed the fair, with the proviso that it would produce at least four permanent buildings, and that any state monetary contribution would be focused mainly on those buildings. King County stepped up with US\$300,000 for a forestry exhibit—the largest log cabin ever built—and \$78,000 for other exhibits. Because the original Klondike gold strikes had been in Canada, the concept soon evolved to an "Alaska-Yukon Exposition"; later, at the behest of the Seattle Chamber of Commerce, the "Pacific" theme was also added to emphasize Oriental trade.

The only foreign countries to erect entire buildings at the fair were Japan and Canada, but their presence was enough to validate the "Pacific" theme along with the US territory of Hawaii and the Philippines, recently ceded to the US by Spain. Other foreign countries were represented on a smaller scale.

The Stamp

Unlike the stamp issues for Expositions before, the Alaska-Yukon-pacific Exposition only had one stamp issued by the USPOD, Scott #370, issued June 1, 1909, and an imperforate version, Scott #371.





Imperforate sheets of 400 were first issued in 1906 at the request of several makers of vending and affixing machines. The machine manufacturers made coils from the imperforate sheets and applied various perforations to suit the particular needs of their machines.

August 28, 1909 Registered letter sent from Peru, ILL. to Kansas City, Mo. 1st Class letter rate 2¢ per oz, July 1, 1985 to Nov. 1, 1917. Registration 8¢, Jan. 1, 1893 to Oct. 31, 1909. Mute "PERU, ILL." boxed cancel used on registered mail. The Peru Registered CDS should NOT be on the front of the cover. It was to be struck over the envelope flaps on the back.

United States Revenue Stamps

At our Wednesday night auctions whenever there is a US Revenue lot there is spirited bidding. Are you one of those US Revenue collectors? Here is a the story of how revenue stamps were first used in the United States. A revenue stamp shows that a government tax or fee has been paid. They have been around much longer than postage stamps.

In 1755, Massachusetts enacted the first stamp duty law. The first "stamps" were colorless embossments indicating the State and amount of tax. Individuals had to buy the stamped vellum, paper or parchment with the embossments to use on the taxed transactions. British Revenue stamps for use in America started November 1, 1765. This was the dreaded "Stamp Tax" that the colonists fought so successfully and Great Britain capitulated repealing the tax on June 30, 1766.

The first of three issues of Federal Tax stamps using embossed paper was authorized by the Act of July 6, 1797, effective July 1, 1798 and were used until February 28, 1801. The second Federal issue was in use from March 1, 1801 to June 30, 1802, when all internal revenue taxes were abolished. After a gap of 12 years, with the country needing funds to wage the War of 1812, the third Federal issue was enacted and effective from January 1, 1814 to December 31, 1817.

These stamps can be found in the Scott catalog under the RM heading. The early stamps before 1798 are pretty pricy but many of the First, Second and Third Federal issue stamps catalog under \$50 for a clear impression on entire documents. Isn't it extraordinary that you can own a 18th century revenue tax item for less than \$50!
