

Global International

\$1.15 One Ounce International Rate April 28—San Francisco, CA



This issue snuck out in late April with little notice.

This new Green Succulent Forever international rate stamp offers a single price for any First-Class Mail International 1-ounce letter or postcard to any country in the world where First Class service is available. The stamp features a photograph of an Echeveria, a large flowering plant that is native to the Americas. The art director was William J. Gicker. Greg Breeding designed the stamp using an existing photograph by Erika Kirkpatrick.

Celebration Boutonniere

sage two ounce stamp can be used individually or as companions for celebration announcements. As with the USPS Wedding stamps, the Boutonniere stamp can be affixed to response mailers that would be enclosed in invitations within envelopes using the Corsage stamp. They can also be used individually, the Boutonniere stamp on greeting cards and the Corsage stamp on mailings such as overweight cards or bearing small enclosures.

This First Class Forever Boutonniere stamp and the Cor-

Celebration Corsage Two Ounce Rate (70c) May 2—St. Louis, MO



The stamp features an arrangement of ranunculus, with floral accents of succulents, Astrantia, Berzelia, and clubmoss greenery.

Similar to Wedding two ounce stamps, but intended for any occasion, this new two ounce stamp can accommodate RSVP replies, heavy enclosures, oversize greeting cards and mailings such as small gifts that require extra postage. The Celebration Corsage is similar in design theme to the Celebration Boutonniere Forever stamp, and the two form a natural pair. The stamp art features a photograph of an arrangement of Ranunculus with accents of Hypericum Berry, Astrantia, and Seed Eucalyptus.

A set of stamps similar to these has been issued frequently in recent years. The biggest complaint couples have is that they come out too late to use on their invitations!

The USPS should consider issuing these earlier in March or April for the blissfully unaware couples!

Strawberries 3c Make Up Stamp May 5—Acton, MA




The latest addition to the Postal Services Fruits definitive series is a Strawberries 3-cent stamp. The design features an illustration of three ripe, red strawberries surrounded by leaves and hulls adjacent to three smaller, green strawberries in various stages of growth. A small white flower from the strawberry plant completes the picture. Art director Derry Noyes designed this stamp using an existing illustration by John Burgoyne

The USPS has been slowly putting together this "Fruits" definitive series over the last few months including coil rolls of 3,000 and 10,000 and also die cut panes.

In 2013 the USPS issued a set of four apple coil post card stamps. Looks like "Fruits" are a popular topic. I like the clean colorful design.

Henry David Thoreau 1st Class Forever Rate May 23—Concord, MA

Henry David Thoreau; (July 12, 1817 – May 6, 1862)American essayist, poet, philosopher, abolitionist, naturalist, tax resister, development critic, surveyor, and historian. A leading transcendentalist, Thoreau is best known for his book *Walden*, a reflection upon simple living in natural surroundings, and his essay "Civil Disobedience" (originally published as "Resistance to Civil Government"), an argument for disobedience to an unjust state. Thoreau's books, articles, essays, journals, and poetry amount to more than 20 volumes. Among his lasting contributions are his writings on natural history and philosophy, in which he anticipated the methods and findings of ecology and environmental history, two sources of modern-day environmentalism. His literary style interweaves close observation of nature, personal experience, pointed rhetoric, symbolic meanings, and historical lore, while displaying a poetic sensibility, philosophical austerity, and Yankee attention to practical detail.

He was a lifelong abolitionist, delivering lectures that attacked the Fugitive Slave Law while praising the writings of Wendell Phillips and defending the abolitionist John Brown. Thoreau's philosophy of civil disobedience later influenced the political thoughts and actions of such notable figures as Leo Tolstoy, Mahatma Gandhi, and Martin Luther King Jr. Thoreau is sometimes referred to as an anarchist. Though "Civil Disobedience" seems to call for improving rather than abolishing government - "I ask for, not at once no government, but *at once* a better government" - the direction of this improvement points toward anarchism: "That government is best which governs not at all; and when men are prepared for it, that will be the kind of government which they will have." RECENT ACQUISITIONS (or Neat Stuff I Really Like) By Tim Wait



I collect covers sent Airmail and Special Delivery. They must have the appropriate Airmail and Special Delivery stamps to get into my collection. This letter from November 1962 is covered in interesting markings and stamps!

The airmail rate was increased from 6c to 7c August 1, 1958. The Special Delivery rate was increased from 20c to 30c July 1, 1957. Charles Hebb of Medina, Ohio was really behind the times in knowing his airmail postage and special delivery rates. Maybe he didn't send this type of mail very often and just found airmail and special delivery stamps and thought he was good to go!

This story gets more interesting after the letter was mailed. The Cleveland PO noticed that the letter was short paid 1c for airmail and 10c for special delivery. They also assessed 7c for an additional ounce of mail and marked the letter 18c due. Upon arrival at Cleveland, the address of Intrusion—Prepakt, Incorporated had changed to a PO box which was now in Cleveland Zone 1 instead of the street address in Zone 14. These "Zones" were the precursor of the USPOD Five digit Zip Code, which was introduced July 1, 1963.

Here's where this letter gets really fun. One 10c and two 4c stamps were applied to indicate payment of the 18c postage due. At some point, maybe when the letter was picked up at the PO Box, it was determined that the letter was not over one ounce and should only be 11c due and marked "Postage Due 11 Cents". The 18c in postage due stamps were marked "VOIDED" and two 5c and one 1c postage due stamp were applied to show the correct payment of 11c due.

A last observation was that this letter was to be handled Special Delivery that meant upon arrival it was to be rushed out to the address. The letter was marked "Fee Claimed at Office of First Address". Since the address had changed to a PO Box, the mail sorters just had to put in into the PO Box to satisfy the Special Delivery request that they even charged an extra 10c postage due for. What a fun cover!

The Belvidere B

This cover is under the Hopefully to be a Recent Acquisition. It is still active on eBay!

Rockford had the famous Blue Bird cancel used in 1869 and 1870. Belvidere had its own Blue Bird cancel but that is an extremely elusive cancel with only one cover in existence that I am aware of. Belvidere's second most famous, and much more available fancy cancel, is the thick letter B cancel used in late 1869 and early 1870. I have a few examples of this cancel on the 3c 1869 Locomotive issue for the 1st class letter rate but this is the first 1c drop letter rate letter I have seen. The one cent 1869 stamp catalogs \$270 on cover. With a fancy cancel it raises the value.

We'll have to see how dearly I have to pay for this cover!

Cover Sleuthing!

Thomas Bell Winnebago County Clerk 1877 to 1886

This Rockford postmark was in use for many years. It did not have the year date so it is hard to determine the year. In "Past and Present of Winnebago County" Thomas was listed as county clerk from 1877 to 1886. The 1st class letter rate was decreased to two cents on October 1, 1883. Therefore this cover would date from 1877 to 1883!
