

2021 New Issues - October

A Visit From St. Nick First Class Forever (58c) Double sided Booklet of 20 Oct 7 - Santa Clause, IN

These four new designs add to the plethora of Santa stamps that have been issued by postal administrations around the world, including the United States. These stamps tell the story of Santa's visit on Christmas Eve following the theme of *A Visit from St. Nicholas* commonly know as *'Twas the Night before Christmas*. Written by Clement Clarke Moore in 1822, the poem gives reference to St. Nick and his sleigh full of toys.

The first stamp shows Santa on a snowy rooftop with an enormous bag of gifts slung over his shoulder, stepping into a brick chimney. The second stamp shows green stockings hung on the fireplace with care a Sant's boots appear. A close-up of Santa's bearded face and stocking cap fills the third stamp. His left eye is winking which is a reference to "his wink of an eye" in the poem.



The final stamps shows Santa and the bag of gifts in his sleigh, which is being pulled across the sky by his flying reindeer. The background shows a stary night with a huge full moon. This completes St. Nick's visit that will be played out millions of times on Christmas Eve while we are all

sleeping.

Art director Greg Breeding designed the stamps with original art by Brad Woodard.

The first U.S. Postage stamp for 8-cents was issued in 1972. It was the 11th annual Christmas issue. The first line from Moore's poem 'Twas the Night before Christmas' is inscribed above the vignette.





Otters in the Snow First Class Forever (58c) Double sided Booklet of 20 Oct 12 - Otter, MT



A River Otter was previously illustrated as part of the American Wildlife Series of 1987. Issued June 13, 1987 in Toronto Canada!

The Otters in Snow stamps picture four different scenes of the playful North American river otter reveling in winter's white landscape. The original illustrations for the stamps were rendered in pen and ink with watercolor. Art director Derry Noyes designed the stamps with artwork from illustrator John Burgoyne.

River otters and sea otters are found throughout the United States. Otter Montana is a small community named for Otter Creek. Although it is unincorporated, it does have a post office, and now, a First Day of Issue ceremony.

These are the last two USPS issues for 2021. No other Holiday stamps will be issued this year as all the prior Holiday issues are still available from USPS.com and (maybe) at your local post office!

While it can be a bit confusing to get to, as well as leave, once you have done it a couple of times and determine the best route for your needs, it is not all that bad. The facility is much better than the former location to say the least. Please join us again if you have not yet attended a meeting and if you have, please keep coming back. Sadly, some of our members have permanently closed their albums over the past 18 months and will never return. Nothing compares to a live stamp event, meeting, show, or auction.

Along with our decreased attendance our auction lots are down a bit, but there is still plenty to bid on. We have occasionally noticed some higher quality items which of course command a higher starting bid which often fails to attract a bid. Keep in mind the time and supplies the individual has spent to prepare these items for auction. Most starting bids are still below what you could ever expect to pay a dealer or even possibly win in an online auction. A few club lots that did not attract bids in recent club auctions were taken to Tosapex and were snapped up by dealers at starting bid prices or above. While not a huge amount, our club profited in the amount of \$50.00. This indicates there was plenty of profit margin left in these lots for them to realize a gain. Every auction lot sale profits OUR CLUB and helps to pay the rent and expenses while keeping dues reasonable. Please attend your club meetings, bring auction lots, buy auction lots, and pick up and take home for your leisurely reading pleasure the many stamp periodicals that are being shared and are free for the taking. Knowledge is power. My late Great-Uncle John always said, "Get all the education you can, it is the only thing that can't be taken from you".

I attended the Tosapex show in St. Francis, WI, (Milwaukee suburb), Saturday, September 11th. A new location, not unlike Ken-Rock Community Center, not the easiest to find but worth the effort. Most dealers were busy, some overwhelmed, trying to balance purchaser and seller needs. I noticed a good number of people coming primarily to sell inherited collections, mint sheets, plate blocks etc., to the dealers, which can also make a show a huge success for a dealer. Civil War Revenue Tax 1862-1872 - Tim Wait

This space features interesting Civil War documents from my collection. I can probably continue this space until.....2099!



Receipt by an Express carrier, compensation over 25c to \$1, tax 2c. Received January 28, 1863 by Wm. A. Knowlton, Rockford, IL. American Express money package containing \$31 sent via America Express from Dubuque, Ia. to Cedar Falls, Ia. And then to Rockford. Tax paid with R9 2c Blue Express Imperf. This from a find of Knowlton cover fronts. Knowlton was the business manager for the wealthy widow, Mrs. John H. Manny. John Manny was the inventor of the Manny Reaper. Mary eventually married Robert Tinker, of the famous tinker Cottage in Rockford.

Central America Part I - Costa Rica - Tim Wait



Introduction

Central America was first visited and partially subjugated by Europeans from Spain in the 1500's. They partially controlled the region but continually fought with the British in theatres here and world wide! Today Central America is made up of seven countries. Below is their date of first stamp issuance.

Costa Rica - 1863

Honduras - 1865

Nicaragua - 1865

El Salvador - 1867

Guatemala - 1871

Panama - 1878

Belize - 1981 (formerly British Honduras)

We will start from their first stamp issues through Classic Period to 1940. Let's being with the first stamp issuing country, Costa Rica.



Costa Rica's 1st Issue American Bank Note Co.

Values 1/2 Real, 2 Real, 4 Real and 1 Peso.

In 1883 the currency was changed from Reales to Pesos and Centavos.

The original issue was revalued 1, 2, 5,10, 20 centavos.

In 1901 Costa Rica issued a bi-colored set of 10 values with a variety of scenes, buildings and historical figures.







Through 1940 Costa Rica had issued 195 regular postage stamps. In the Back-of-the-book section we have a variety of issues.

Air Post	C1-C56	1926-1940
Air Post Official	CO 1-13	1934
Postage Due	J1-J13	1903-1915
Official	O1-O94	1883-1936

Postal-Fiscal - From April 1884 to September 1889 revenue stamps were permitted as postage stamps when post offices were out of stamps. Not something the U.S. ever did.



Like many other Central and South American countries, Costa Rica saw the benefits of issuing MANY Air Post stamps. They were of higher values and there was a

great market for them by collectors throughout the world. By 1940 they had issued 56 stamps including this beautiful diamond shaped set of three.



Dedicated Official stamps were not issued until 1926 Regular issue postage and air post stamps were overprinted "Official". There must have been a lot of Official mail as they issued 94 regular and 13 Air Post issues

by 1940!







Our last category for Costa Rica is Postage Dues. Two designs were issued by 1940 with the first set of eight in 1903 and the second set of 5 issued in 1915. Shown is one from the second set.

The post office continues to issue many Air Post stamps compared to regular issues. In my Scott 2006 Catalog there are 581 regular issues and air post up to C939! They didn't issue Special Delivery stamps until 1972. No more postage due stamps were issued after the 1915 set above. No more Official stamps we issued either.

A new category, Postal Tax was introduced in 1959 and were for Children's Village and were obligator on all mail during December. These continue today.

This concludes our mini-tour of Costa Rican stamps. Next up will be Honduras.




