


#### Wednesday Meeting Presentations

## 2021 New Issues - September

Raven Story First Class Forever (55c) Pane of 20 Jul 30 - Juneau, AK



Merging traditional artwork with modern design touches, this stamp depicts one of many stories about Raven, a figure of great significance to the Indigenous peoples of the North-west Coast. Among the cultures of the region, Raven plays an essential role in many traditional tales, including stories about the creation of the world. Inspired by the traditional story of Raven setting free the sun, the moon and the stars, Tlingit/Athabascan artist Rico Worl depicts Raven just as he escapes from his human family and begins to transform back into his bird form. Antonio Alcalá served as art director.



A few countries have issued stamps depicting the Raven. In 1995 Faroe Islands, part of the Kingdom of Denmark, issued Scott#287 showing a Black Raven "Corvus corax".


Happy Birthday First Class Forever (58c) Pane of 20 Sep 9 - Toast, NC



The stamp conveys exuberant greetings by calling to mind the childhood excitement of a birthday party. Each of the five letters in the word "HAPPY" is inspired by a different party decoration in the midst of a flurry of multicolored ribbons and confetti. This stamp was designed by Lisa Catalone Castro and Rodolfo Castro, featuring a digital illustration by the latter. Ethel Kessler served as art director.

Message Monsters First Class Forever (58c) Pane of 20 (4 designs +) Sep 24 - Topeka, KS

The four fun designs on this new pane of 20 stamps are supplemented by dozens of selfadhesive accessories in the margin around the stamps. With them, you can surprise recipients with personalized cards, letters and envelopes. The monster-ific accoutrements include cartoony voice balloons and thought bubbles with exclamations and salutations, hats and crowns, hearts, stars, crazy daisies and other fun flair. Art director Antonio Alcalá designed the pane with new illustrations by Elise Gravel, author and illustrator of popular children's books.





Day of the Dead First Class Forever (58c) Pane of 20 (4 designs) Sep 30 - El Paso, TX

In recent decades, Día de los Muertos, as it is known in Spanish, has caught on in the United States as a festive celebration for all ages. These new stamps showcase the Day of the Dead holiday, in all its flower-bedecked splendor. This pane of 20 Forever stamps features several iconic elements of a traditional Day of the Dead offering. Stylized, decorated "sugar skulls" are personalized as family members — a child with a hair bow, a father sporting a hat and mustache, a mother with curled hair, and another child. The vibrant colors of marigold flowers and other embellishments, along with the white of the sugar skulls, stand out brightly from the stamps' black background. Day of the Dead, with all its exuberant color, life-affirming joy, and appeal for the whole family, is fast becoming a popular American holiday.

### Civil War Revenue Tax 1862-1872 - Tim Wait

This space features interesting Civil War documents from my collection. I can probably continue this space until.....2099!

Certificate of Deposit \$100. Jan. 12, 1863. Bank of Binghamton, Broome Co., N. York. 2¢ tax of deposits up to \$100. Stamped with matching 2¢ Certificate "Yellow".

Beautifully engraved certificate with much imagery. The first  $2\phi$  stamps were printed in Yellow. They were immediately criticized as being indistinct and of poor quality. About October 10 the printers, Butler & Carpenter of Philadelphia, were instructed to change the color to blue. In 1864 the color of the  $2\phi$  stamps was change to Orange.

### Mexico Entegra Inmediata (Special Delivery) - Tim Wait

Mexico issued their first Special Delivery stamp in 1919. It featured a messenger on a tricycle cart vehicle. Proofs were prepared in a variety of colors with "MUESTRA", "SAMPLE" in English overprinted.



The stamp was issued in red & black at first unwatermarked and in 1923 on watermarked paper. E1 and E2.



The same design was printed on envelopes valued 30 centavos which included regular postage.



A new design was issued in 1934 showing a runner carrying a Quipu, or tube. The rate was lowered to 10 centavos.





A second special delivery stamp showing an Indian Archer was also issued in 1934 at 10 centavos. An orange red 20c was also issued. Nov. 12 1939 Air Mail / Special Delivery cover to Wilmington, State of Delaware with E2 and C12.

In 1944 a 25c new design was issued. In 1951 a 60c stamp was issued . Don't you love the 25c design!



In 1956 the rates changed to 35c and 80c and two new designs we issued showing hands and a pigeon and a plane circling the globe. These stamps were issued with new denominations in 1962 and again in 1975.



Mexico's last Entrega Inmediata stamp was issued in 1976. After that regular postage stamps were used for Special Delivery!



In the United States our last special delivery stamp, the 45c E45, was issued in 1969. many countries never issued Special Delivery stamps and most ceased issuing Special Delivery service stamps by the 1970's.



## Happy Birthday! - Update

Last month we looked at the Happy Birthday stamps issued with the last one being a 39¢ stamp valid through May 13, 2007. Well the USPS has come to the rescue after 15 years! A new Happy Birthday Forever stamp will be issued September 9 in panes of 20.



It will be the first forever stamp at the new domestic first-class letter rate of  $58\phi$  which goes into effect August 29.



### **Great American Stamp Show**

Adding to Frank's adventure reported on page three I was able to attend the show from set-up until tear down!

I showed two exhibits: U.S. Civil War Documentary Taxes 1862-1872 which received 91 points and a Large Gold and Rockford Illinois Postal Markings 1837-1939 received 89 points and a Gold.

On Wednesday I arrived at noon and began setting up mailed in exhibits after which I mounted my 17 frames! A close friend and fellow revenue exhibitor was supposed to arrive at 4pm but was delayed until 7 because of earlier storms so I stayed doing set up and fixing frames for exhibitors until 8:30! Boy was I tired after an eight hour day on cement floors!

After all that work it was time to enjoy the show. I went into work from 8-9:30 Thursday and Friday and then went to the show at 10. Too many dealers, too many society booths (I belong to 12 societies that had tables) many seminars to attend and over 850 exhibit frames to enjoy.

I was able to shop the dealer bourse and come away with a few nice items for my collections and future exhibits. I'll bring a couple for show and tell.

As a judge I get to travel the country to various shows and have made many philatelic friends, many of which I was able to visit with at the show. A GREAT time!
