Being curious about how decisions are made in your community


Volunteering

Why Civic Involvement Matters



When girls participate in their communities, they ensure their unique perspectives and needs are considered. Your voice matters because you see problems and solutions that others might miss. Being involved is how we make sure the world works for everyone—including girls just like you!

What Does Voting Mean?



Voting is how grown-ups age 18 and older choose leaders and make decisions about rules that affect everyone. When people vote, they're helping shape the future of their community!

- Adults pick leaders who make important decisions
- Voting helps decide rules about schools, parks, and safety
- In some places, people don't get to vote—it's a special right!
 - Did you know? In the United States, women couldn't vote until 1920. That's just over 100 years ago!

It's never too early to start thinking about voting - you'll be able to vote before you know it!
