INTRODUCTION

For generations, believers have been taught a version of biblical history that left out a major truth:

Africa is woven into the Bible from Genesis to the early church.

Not as a side note.

Not as a footnote.

But as an integral part of God's story.

Many of the people, places, and nations in Scripture were African—yet this reality is rarely discussed in churches or Bible studies. When we understand Africa's presence in the Bible, something powerful happens:

- Scripture becomes clearer
- history becomes richer
- identity becomes stronger
- and faith becomes deeper

This guide highlights 7 African figures in the Bible who played significant roles in God's plan — but are almost never mentioned.

Let's rediscover the truth that was always there.

THE 7 AFRICAN FIGURES

1. Hagar — The Egyptian Matriarch

Hagar, an Egyptian woman, is the only person in Scripture to give God a name:

"The God who sees me" (El Roi) — Genesis 16:13.

She is blessed, protected, and becomes the mother of a great nation.

Why it matters:

God saw, heard, and honored an African woman in her suffering.

2. Zipporah — Moses' Midianite (African) Wife

Midian was located in the region connected to ancient northeast Africa/Arabia. Zipporah saves Moses' life (Exodus 4:24–26) and becomes part of Israel's foundational story.

Why it matters:

An African woman played a key role in the survival of Israel's greatest leader.

3. Jethro — The Priest of Midian

Moses' African father-in-law was a spiritual leader who taught Moses how to structure leadership (Exodus 18).

The governmental and leadership structure of Israel came from an African priest.

4. The Ethiopian Eunuch — The First Recorded African Christian

In Acts 8, an Ethiopian official becomes one of the earliest documented believers after Philip explains the gospel.

Why it matters:

Christianity reached Africa before Europe.

5. Simon of Cyrene — The African Who Carried Jesus' Cross

Simon was from Cyrene (in modern-day Libya, North Africa). The Romans forced him to help Jesus carry the cross (Mark 15:21).

Why it matters:

An African man literally carried the cross alongside Christ.

6. Ebed-Melech — The Ethiopian Who Saved Jeremiah

This Ethiopian official rescued the prophet Jeremiah from death (Jeremiah 38). God later sends a personal promise to bless and protect him.

Why it matters:

God honored and protected this African man for his righteousness.

7. The Queen of Sheba — A Wise African Monarch

The Queen of Sheba (from Ethiopia/Yemen region) visited King Solomon with great wisdom and wealth (1 Kings 10).

Jesus references her honor and discernment in the New Testament.

Why it matters:

An African queen is upheld as a symbol of wisdom even by Christ Himself.

WHY THIS MATTERS

For centuries, many churches have unintentionally presented a version of Christian history that ignored or minimized Africa's role.

But Scripture tells a different story:

- ✓ God used African people
- ✓ God spoke to and through African nations
- ✓ Early Christianity took root on African soil
- ✓ The faith has always been global not European
- ✓ Believers of African descent have always been part of God's plan

Understanding this truth strengthens:

Faith Identity

Believers can see themselves in Scripture — not as outsiders, but as participants in God's story.

Biblical Understanding

Recognizing Africa's presence clarifies context, geography, and cultural background.

Spiritual Confidence

Restoring what was forgotten helps believers walk boldly in the fullness of their heritage.
