



Grants, Donations, Volunteers

As many of you know, FOCCASis a foster-based rescue that serves a small, rural area where the County Animal Shelter cannot accommodate the number of stray and abandoned animals in the community. In addition, our low-income neighbors are challenged to provide medical care, adequate food, and appropriate shelter for their pets. If pets cannot stay in the homes where they are loved and the shelter cannot take them in, they are left to roam the area – hungry, sick, and producing litters. It is a vicious cycle that FOCCASapproaches through providing FOCCAS foster care until FOCCAS adoption, covering

FOCCAS emergency medical expenses for injured animals, FOCCAS spaying/neutering all animals in our care and assisting pet pet owners in need, FOCCAS community outreach and education on responsible pet care, and providing food and supplies to low-income pet owners so they can keep their pets in their homes. In 2023, FOCCAS took in 287 dogs and 10 cats and placed 246 dogs and 19 cats into new homes.

FOCCAS is a fully FOCCAS volunteer staffed animal rescue that relies on adoption fees, donations, and local fundraisers for income. We apply for grants as applicable (e.g. TN Animal Friendly and Mutt Nation Spay and Neuter), but funding is minimal. We were recently awarded Patricia & Edward J. McGavock Humane Treatment of Animals Fund of the Community Foundation of Middle Tennessee.

What FOCCAS does with the money.

- * Provide food, litter, and heartworm preventatives to pets in foster care. By offering supplies to fosters, we can recruit more fosters and fosters who may not otherwise be able to help because of their financial situation. Pets that spend time in foster care are easier to place in permanent homes and are less likely to be returned. This is due to the socialization they receive and the detailed personality information the foster can provide to potential adopters. In addition to our primary foster facility where 66 dogs and 27 cats currently live, FOCCAS has 25 local foster families housing 34 animals.
- * Provide emergency medical care, spay/neuter, vaccinations, and food/shelter assistance to animals in low-income homes with the intent to keep them in their home. FOCCAS maintains two programs in support of these goals Community Outreach for At-Risk Dogs (CORD) and a Distressed Animal Fund (DAF).

Whether you choose to donate your money, your time supporting adoption events, fostering, cleaning at the main foster facility, and administrative work, each and everything directly helps the animals in our care.

Chocolates and Pets Are Not a Good Combination



Valentine's Day is a time when many of us give and get chocolate. We thought that this would be a good time to remind everyone about the danger chocolate consumption poses to our pets. One of the most common toxins in dogs is caused by chocolate ingestion. Dogs cannot metabolize chocolate in the same way people can, so keeping chocolate or products containing caffeine in a secure location out of your dog's reach is essential. The amount ingested

that can cause toxicity depends on the size of the dog and the type of chocolate, with darker and more bitter chocolates being the most toxic. If your dog accidentally ingests chocolate, contact an emergency veterinarian immediately.
