Giving Tuesday - December 2

Giving Tuesday is tomorrow, December 2. We are kicking off our special \$10 in 10 days, December 2 to 12th, in celebration of our 10th Anniversary program. All donations will be matched up to \$5000. This giving campaign is dedicated to the funding of the FOCCAS Distressed Animal Program (DAP). This program allows our rescue to provide much-needed medical care for pets that are injured or very ill. Often, it is an acute injury requiring surgery or immediate intervention. Just as frequently, the issue is chronic and a long-term health condition that has never been addressed. This could be treating heartworms, entropion, severe skin issues, and many others. These pets are expensive to treat, and we



dedicate 50% of our budget each year to fund this program. In 2025, year-to-date, our DAP covered the medical costs for 34 dogs and 10 cats, totaling \$47,283.53. This is a cost increase of over 77% from 2024.

THE 3 DAYS, 3 WEEKS, 3 MONTHS RULE OF ADOPTING A RESCUE DOG The 3-3-3 Rule is a general guideline of the decompression process for a Canine in a new environment. Every dog is unique and will adjust differently, so give them syspace and allow them to go at their own pace!



It's going to take some time - The 3, 3, 3 Rule

The "3-3-3 rule" in dog rescue is a guideline for the emotional adjustment of an adopted dog: 3 days for them to decompress and feel overwhelmed, 3 weeks to start learning your routine and bonding, and 3 months to feel at home and truly comfortable. It helps adopters understand that the initial days will likely be challenging, but with patience and consistency, the dog will gradually settle in.
