Our Mission: Give Hope

"Mission of Hope is best known for its free lunchtime program, but that's just one part of the ministry. Our food pantry, clothing, and recovery services offer support and work together to meet people where they're at. We restore hope by loving people well, and by sharing the good news of the gospel. Our prayer

is that those who we serve will be transformed in a miraculous way by the Holy Spirit. We often see lives change as people encounter the love and grace of Jesus Christ."

Holy Redeemer provides help to Mission of Hope in variety of ways: serving a monthly meal, food drives, clothing drives, Christmas families, volunteer hours, and monetary donations. While many thanks go to all who help with our assistance to Mission of Hope, a special thanks goes to Shari Singelstad for being a long-time coordinator of the meals and for checking in with the folks at the mission to see how else we might help.

School supplies: Thank you to everyone who donated school supplies for the family of Mission of Hope. It's very much appreciated. -- Shari

August meal: We served 145 plates of goulash, green beans, and desserts at Mission of Hope on August 21. There were a lot of new people and a lot of families with children. We will serve walking tacos on September 18, so please watch for the sign-up sheet on the bulletin board. If you would like to help, just talk to Shari. "We also have a lot of fun and laughs in the kitchen while we are cooking."

Extra surprise: While serving the meal, Shari said that a woman going through line stopped and asked how Shari was. Shari said, "Fine, how about you?" This lady was so excited to tell Shari she was getting a house to live in with another woman that day. She said she would be able to move out of a shelter house. Shari told her that was great news, congratulated her, and wished her the very best from our Holy Redeemer group. (These are the kind of heart-warming stories our volunteers get to hear from time-to-time at Mission of Hope.)

Council Corner

Holy Redeemer's Council met on Thursday, August 14. Here are a few highlights from their printed reports and meeting minutes:

Finances: For the month of July, we did not meet our monthly goal of \$16,017. Thanks to a generous donation we exceeded our general fund goal by \$121. However, we had a building fund shortage of \$1,041 for a total shortage \$920. Total year-to-date general fund giving is now up 1% over 2024. Building fund offerings for the year remain up 39%. Total giving for 2025 is 7% higher than 2024. Expenses for June were kept in check, allowing \$4,282 to be moved back into the contingency fund, for a new balance of \$21,958 at the end of July. This is the first increase in the contingency fund in several months. Our end of July mortgage balance was \$237,109.

Old Business Topics: Old business discussions focused on Eagle Scout project – scheduled for August 30, a second meeting with Deacon Jodi Schuman (provisions of our constitution and part-time ministry guidelines), and call committee.

New Business Topics: A single new business items was to approve the Mission of Hope food drive for "God's Work. Our Hands."

The next regular council meeting is scheduled for **Thursday**, **September 11**, **2025** at **7:00** pm.

Bishop Current on Sabbatical

Bishop, and the work of the synod continues with the Office of the Bishop team.

St. Stephen's Shelves Food Pantry

A year ago, the Southeastern Iowa Synod awarded St. Stephen's in Cedar Rapids a \$1,500 grant to help launch a new neighborhood food pantry. After months of preparation, St. Stephen's Shelves opened its doors in June 2024—and has been going strong ever since.

Operating in partnership with HACAP (Hawkeye Area Community Action Program) and Feed Iowa First, the pantry serves as a vital resource for local families. The ministry is led hands-on by Will Negron, Minister for Faith Life, with support from Barb Polglaze, who manages inventory, the Shelves Committee providing vision, and a dedicated team of volunteers.

In just six months, St. Stephen's Shelves has fed over 500 families—nearly 2,000 individuals—and the gratitude from those served is truly heartfelt. The original Synod grant played a crucial role in making this possible, helping cover essential expenses as the pantry grew.

Generous donations from the congregation, local businesses like Bruegger's Bagels, and the wider community, allow the pantry to offer a wide variety of food items. Behind the scenes, more than 150 volunteers have dedicated countless hours to making sure the pantry runs smoothly—from picking up food and stocking shelves to welcoming guests and managing inventory. Their hard work and commitment have made this ministry a true blessing for so many in the area.

St. Stephen's Shelves is a shining example of a community coming together to care for one another, and we celebrate the faithful work of everyone involved and the difference this ministry is making in the community.


Chair Yoga

Impact of In-Kind Donations

When is a yardage not just pieces of fabric? In the hands of someone learning to sew, fabric becomes a blank canvas of possibilities. A nearly empty closet containing the few items a refugee could fit in their

suitcase when traveling to the US turns into a place of pride when filled with hand-sewn clothes made from that fabric. If I could dream...I dream of curtains for bare windows and cloth to cover worn tables. I dream of the magic of small pieces of fabric fitting into beautiful patterns in quilts to brighten homes and become treasured wraps providing comfort and warmth. These dreams are becoming a reality thanks to the generosity of an LSI donor.

Connie Hansen from Audubon, Iowa, is no stranger to fabric and sewing. Connie has enjoyed sewing for much of her lifetime. In her younger years, she shared her passion for sewing, serving as a 4-H leader in Melville Township, sewing clothes for herself and daughter. Through the years, her love and passion for quilting has grown friendships with others who love the craft. Connie dreamed of keeping her newest neighbors warm with her remaining fabric and donated the yards to LSI. This fabric will be used by our newly resettled immigrant and refugee families to create quilts and clothing, helping them feel more comfortable in their new homes. We hear about dreams every day at LSI from our direct service providers, team members, and clients. Thanks to your generosity, these dreams can become reality.
