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MEMORIES OF GROWING UP IN CAPE CHARLES, BY WILLIAM (BILL) NEVILLE

"My twin brother Junius and I were born in 1941, and our parents brought us home from the hospital in Nassawadox to a new house on Randolph Avenue just a few days before Christmas. My brother still lives there.

One of my earliest memories is of dad driving us by the POW camp "Ettinger" near Oyster and shouting something to the Germans. He got a response of some sort. I wasn't fluent in German, (I'm still not) so I am not sure what he said.

In the summer, when he would come home from working in the PRR shops, he would let Junius and me stand on the running board of his Chevrolet and ride us two blocks down to the beach.

Looking back now at when and how we grew up in Cape Charles makes me realize what a cool place it was for a kid. We had it all the bay, beach, woods, fishing ponds, Sandy Island, plantation creek, and the abandoned old ferry dock. We had our school friends, great teachers, the boy scouts, football games, bonfires and pep rallies. We could ride our bikes all over town, roller skate, fish, swim, explore beaches, islands and creeks, build forts and take our BB guns with us to shoot stuff.

To add to all of this there was the railroad with big steam locomotives and ferries and a huge terminal where we could roam and watch passengers and freight moving between the trains and the steamers and count the automobiles as they boarded

It was always a thrill to watch the steam locomotives as they arrived or departed with the steam hissing, the screeching of steel on steel and the chugging. Seeing the stack belching smoke and steam along with all of the accompanying sounds and smells made an awesome spectacle for us kids.

Another one of my memories is of us going to the station to see our cousin Ruthellen Mears board the train to Atlantic City to compete in the Miss America contest in 1947. She was Miss Virginia, from little Cape Charles! When she started to step on the train, it lurched and frightened her. In my child's mind, I was pretty sure this was the cause of her not becoming Miss America!"

SCAMMELL CHINA VISITORS

Last summer several members of the Scammell family visited the museum. They were attracted by mention of our Pennsylvania Railroad holdings and were pleased to see it on display. Scammell China, owned by several generations of the Scammell family and successor to earlier venerable chinaware firms, was located in Trenton NJ and operated into the 1950s. The Scammells manufactured fine china for restaurants, hotel chains and others, in addition to the Pennsylvania Railroad. Across a canal from their factory was the steel wire making factory owned by the Roeblings of Brooklyn Bridge fame. An interesting book about the history of the firm that became the Scammell entitled 'The History of the Lamberton Works' can be found on the Internet.
