

# The First Presbyterian Church of Seneca Falls

**Pastor's Corner** 





I wanted to take a moment to update you on my time in Pittsburgh. The classes I took this term were Public Theology/Prophetic Witness and Pastor as Adaptive Change Leader. My final project in Public Theology will engage with Artificial Intelligence and the Theology of Stewardship; how does Al direct where and how we spend our time? Where and how do we use our resources under the guidance of Al? Who is gaining the treasures from Al as a product? Does being a good steward in this context mean asking questions about the tools Al is using? The final project for Adaptive Change will wrestle with the question: how might God be moving in our practices of stewardship in partnership with the community? You will hear more about these on Feb 25th at Coffee Hour, but for this month I wanted to discuss a little of what happens when I am not in class.

On this trip I was able to visit The Heinz Museum, where the set for *Mr. Rogers' Neighborhood* to show is located. I am pictured here with Mr. Rogers who said, "Nobody else can live the life you live." Mr. Rogers was an ordained PCUSA pastor, who went to Pittsburgh Theological Seminary and lived in the Squirrel Hill neighborhood of Pittsburgh. The Seminary and Pittsburgh are filled with tributes to his life and ministry.

Mr. Rogers' ministry was in a public context. He had to talk to viewers, mostly children, without using theological language. As the world changed, his show adapted to the changing times. He understood and taught those watching that there can be many truths existing at the same time. He said, "All of us, at some time or other, need help. Whether we're giving or receiving help, each one of us has something valuable to bring to this world. That's one of the things that connects us as neighbors - in our own way, each one of us is a giver and a receiver." Mr. Rogers taught people that being a good neighbor was giving and receiving help. Being a good neighbor was about being honest with the ways we were feeling and giving those feelings healthy outlets. He couldn't tell the viewers to turn to the Psalms, but he did invite them to turn to music to express their feelings; the Psalms and prayers set to music.

Mr. Rogers didn't use the words "ministry" and "mission" in his show, but he did say, "As human beings, our job in life is to help people realize how rare and valuable each one of us really is, that each of us has something that no one else has or ever will have something inside that is unique to all time. It's our job to encourage each other to discover that uniqueness and to provide ways of developing its expression." It was nice to be in his neighborhood where one is valued, neighbor, helper, and helped all at the same time. It was nice to be in his neighborhood.

In 2024, our congregation will continue to do acts of random kindness, and remind others that "it is a beautiful day in the neighborhood." Peace, Pastor Leah

## **Session Briefs**

At its Thursday, January 25<sup>th</sup> Meeting, the Session discussed several issues. The following is a brief overview:

- As usual, our Treasurer Kae Hoyle gave us a great report of our financials and Jay Hoyle, Chair of the Financing and Stewardship Committees, already has the next committee meeting scheduled. With this duo, we can feel confident about the management of our funds.
- In December, the Presbyterian Foundation notified us that an anonymous donor who established a Charitable Remainder Unitrust in December of 1991 recently passed away. Per the terms of the trust agreement, a permanent fund entitled The Marge and Al Johnson Memorial Fund has been established, in the amount of \$73,185.22. The church will receive the first distribution of funds in April 2025. We are so grateful.
- This week, we also received notification that the church will be receiving funds from the estate of Bernie and Muriel Horle - Muriel passed in October. Again, we are truly blessed by this generosity.
- We do have a few needs within the community that we should meet; the costs are minimal; be we want to be there when we feel strongly that funds are needed. That is the whole purpose of having fund raisers, isn't it? We want to be there to help others.
- On Sunday, January 28<sup>th</sup> we will have the installation of three Session members: Marion Crull, Anne Millis and Susan Sholar. Session looks forward to another year of accomplishments, within and outside our church.
- We had a discussion about Vacation Bible School. It was decided that we should provide daycare at the church during February break in 2025, for kindergarten and first graders whose parents must work. This will be a fun, safe place for them to play, eat and be read to.
- After the January Session meeting, we had a great presentation by Lifespan. The speaker was Sheila Brewer-Montero M.Ed, Ed.S, who lives in Corning, NY. What an education that presentation was! The topic was SCAMS. She told us about more than we ever thought would be involved in scamming, INCLUDING the dangers of Al techniques used in getting people's money. We will request that she return, if we have enough interest.

a great way to spend a cold winter afternoon.






- Learn to Knit with Barb Van Kirk will be held every Wednesday at 10am in the Hawley Room. ALL are welcome.

- In addition, we give a GIANT thank you to all of our volunteers and members who do the work needed to keep First Pres going. We see you, and appreciate you!


## Support for the Library
