Happiness is an emotion; it is response to what is happening. However, Joy is a state of being. It needs to be sought out and cultivated. Every one of us finds joy in different ways. Some of us find joy in having a cup of coffee and bird watching in the morning. Some of us find joy in art, like crafting, knitting, painting, gardening, etc. Some of us find joy in watching others, in silence, and in exercise. The important part isn't how we do it - it is that we do it.

So how do you find joy? What steps or actions are you taking to cultivate joy?

At church in June, we are cultivating joy in many ways. We will cultivate joy in Game Night on Friday, June 7th at 5:30pm. On Sunday, June 16th we will cultivate joy with Random Acts of Kindness AND an Ice Cream Social. On Saturday, June 22nd from 2p-6p, we will cultivate joy with We Exist-FLX by having a Table of Found Souls potluck luncheon. On Sunday, June 30th joy will be cultivated with a hymn sing. I hope you will join us as we lean into joy.

If you want to cultivate joy on your own, here are a few mindful perspectives and practices to cultivate joy in your daily life:

Shift Your Frame of Reference: I've made a case for finding joy in the nooks and crannies of our lives because too often, we reserve jubilation for milestones—a wedding day, the birth of a child or a hard-won promotion, etc. When we think of joy as belonging only to big events, we sideline the many small pleasures strewn along the way. Finding joy in our daily routines makes it far more accessible and creates a positive feedback loop. The more we attend to joy in the ordinary moments of our lives, the more we experience it, and the more joyous we become.

<u>Slow Down:</u> It can take the brain a few seconds to register that something good is coming your way. Slowing down lets your heart, mind, and body to acknowledge pleasure is present. Savoring the flavor of juicy peach allows you to enjoy it more as does pausing to feel your bare feet in the grass or lingering over the lines of a beautifully written poem.

<u>Non-Problematic Joy:</u> Sometimes, finding joy is as simple as noticing what's not wrong. In the wild swings between pleasant and unpleasant, we often neglect the contentment of the neutral middle. Most mornings, for example, my teeth feel fine, the sun rises with confidence, and birdsong fills the air. While these experiences might not thrill us, paying attention to them encourages an appreciation and gratitude for all that's still right in the world. As Chade-Meng Tan writes in Joy on Demand: The Art of Discovering the Happiness Within, "Knowing you are not entirely at the mercy of agitation can bring some joy."¹

Session Briefs

At its Thursday, May 23rd Meeting, the Session discussed several issues. The following is a brief overview:

- Treasurer's report for April was received from Treasurer Kae Hoyle, showing Total Revenue of -\$68,069.36 (reflects adjustment of Investment Account balances) and Total Expenditures of \$33,549.42.
- 2023 Audit: Accountant Judy Selover says all looks great. She has helped Kae and Laurie update all the items in QuickBooks to show our full and transparent financial picture.
- Clerk of the Session, Susan Sholar, attended the Seneca County Sheriff's Training on Active Shooter Threats, on behalf of the church. There have been increased threats in the county and they are providing church training for preparedness. 1) Church Floor Plan to be given to the Sheriff Department; 2) Looking into installing cameras at all entrances and exits; 3) Reminded that all church landlines have the address and phone number of the church in case there is a 911 issue.
- Youth Group received \$7,500 Synod Grant to host monthly social gatherings for Middle School and High School students. All youth 6-12th grades will be invited to these events. The youth determined the items they wanted to purchase and will be in charge of marketing their monthly events, beginning in the fall. They expressed that they desire a safe place to connect and build community. We will need volunteers for chaperoning these events. Please let us know if you are interested in helping.
- Pastor Leah attended the Policy Academy with the United Way in Washington, DC for four days.
- Session approved Family Leave Policy, Child and Adult Protection Policy, Anti-Harassment Policy, Sexual Misconduct Policy, and Anti-Racism Policy. All of these policies are required by the Book of Order and can be found in the Manual of Operations in the church office.
- Outreach Summit was scheduled for May 21st at 4:30pm at the UMC. The Minister's Association gathered, along with church members, so see if there are mission projects we can do collectively.
- Creative Choices received a grant to redo their playground.
- Ice Cream Social and the day of Random Acts of Kindness are scheduled for June 16th.
- Talks are beginning to do an Advent Community Sing Along with UMC.
- Art Mural will be painted sometime this summer. The artists are Phung Cao and Lauren Olmstead (members of the SF Youth Group). We look forward to the dedication service.
- Water pipe to Eastman Hall has been replaced.
- The church office has begun to digitize the Wills, Trusts, Deeds and building schematics.

Meets for LUNCH on Monday, June 3rd at Wolffy's...11:30am

At Circle's May meeting, Kae offered our opening prayer and Joyce read from Columbia University linguistics Professor John McWhorter's New York Times commentary on Black (African American) language: "There is simply no way Whiteness and Blackness will mingle as they have in music, cuisine, gesture, greeting styles, dating, matrimony, and multi-racial identity; **and yet be halted at Language**. The horse has been out of the barn ever since kids embraced Jay-Z and Tupac ..." (March 1, 2024, NYTimes). We talked about "style-switching", which young Black people often do in their speech when they may be in an integrated or all-White school campus, for example and then, return to their homes, neighborhoods, churches, and clubs. White kids have adopted the originally Black music genre: Rap, and strive to achieve the rhythms, gestures, and overall voice styles and language of Black performers.

In discussing the C.S. Lewis book, *Mere Christianity*. some take-aways: In **Chapter 8 The Great Sin ...Pride or self-conceit**: each person's pride is competing with everyone else's pride. The opposite virtue is, in Christian morals, called *Humility*.

Chapter 9 Charity ... Do not waste time bothering whether you "love" your neighbor. Act as if you do!

Chapter 10 Hope ... Aim at heaven and you will get earth thrown in. Aim at earth and you will get neither.

Chapter 11 Faith ... is regarded by some as a virtue; we have to be continually reminded of what we believe.

Joyce recommended the movie, *Shadowland*, a story of C.S. Lewis and his marriage with Joy Davidson, an American divorcee and member of the Jewish faith.






Church Family News

He spent nine months in Korea and was discharged in 1952 when he went into business with his father as a contractor. He taught carpentry at BOCES and then in 1968 worked at Gould Pumps as a Plant Engineer until his retirement in 1992. He was a Trustee of the Seneca Falls Savings Bank, and served in the Seneca Falls Historical Society, Library, and the Boy Scouts. Both Marv and Iva are members of FPSF.


