### Pastor's Corner



The Season of Lent is almost upon us. I love this time of year, not because the church is decorated in my favorite color, BUT because it is a reminder to be intentional.

A season to be intentional in our relationship with God and repent. To be intentional in our relationship with ourselves and ask for forgiveness. To be intentional in our relationship with our community and be aware of what we are eating (maybe you give up chocolate), what we are engaging in (maybe you fast from social media), and we are aware of the countdown until Holy Week.

We are called to be intentional about our actions and to fast from those things that make us feel distanced from God. What makes you feel distanced from the love of God? Is it talking negatively about yourself and others? Is it the amount of energy you spend on worry? Is it the amount of time you spend trying to numb your emotions and feelings?

We are called to be intentional about our giving. Where is God calling you to give? Is God asking you to give time, talents, or treasures? Is God asking that you give someone space to forgive you or space to forgive another? Is God calling you to serve in a new way? Is God calling you to give a "yes" when you would like to say "no?" Is God calling us to be more mindful with our words?

The Season of Lent is a gift, a time set aside to pause and make sure our priorities are in order. How will you use this gift in 2022? You might not have answers to these questions and the others you have for God in 40 days. This is OK. Lent isn't a homework assignment to see who has done the most repenting, forgiving and charity work. I look forward to hearing about these 40 days spent intentionally engaging with God, and about how it has changed you. Peace, Pastor Leah

# Women's Circle Will meet on Monday, March 7<sup>th</sup> at 12:30pm



In February we discussed Deborah and Jael in *The Women of the Bible Speak* and in the story of Jael we saw an example of a woman's violence against a man. The author points out "...most often in Bible

women man. The author points out "...most often in Bible stories, the violence runs in a different direction..." citing Genesis 19 and Judges 19. Violence done by women was for reasons of defense; their own or for an entire family or people. The violence inflicted by men to women was punitive and meant to demonstrate power. Women were, in effect, the property of men. Since a part of the chapter's title was *Women of Valor*, we talked about our individual understandings of that word, <u>valor</u> and agreed that valor was, yes: bravery; but bravery in the cause of good.

Kae shared that she had experienced some "a-ha" moments in reading about Deborah and read to us from The Song of Deborah. Deborah was a prophetess and spiritual leader and creator of "one of the longest poetic compositions in all of the Bible." P. 82 Women of the Bible Speak

February was Black History month and Barb recommended an essay by Elizabeth Alexander, *Embracing Black Freedom*. We talked about the experiences of Brian Flores who for three years took over coaching the Miami Dolphins and had winning records over two of those years, and then was fired. No other team would hire him. He was invited to interview for a team, unaware that the position had already been filled. On February 1<sup>st</sup> of this year, Flores sued the NFL for racial discrimination. In the world of college sports, some progress appears to have been made toward respect for indigenous peoples as the Washington Football team, the Redskins, re-named itself The Commanders.

In the business segment of our Circle meeting, we heard Barb's treasury report and asked her to buy another case of infant formula (which has gone up in price!) for The House of Concern. Planning for March, Barb will lead the discussion of Chapter 5: Hannah and Miriam: Speaking God's Truth. Kae will offer an opening prayer and Joyce will have a diversity item.

We are grateful for donations from people in the congregation on Communion Sundays, using the Communion envelopes in the pews. Laurie has been good about getting notice into the worship bulletins.

#### **VOLUNTEERS NEEDED FOR A FUN PROJECT!!**

#### PRESBYTERIAN DISASTER ASSISTANCE Out of Chaos, Hope

The current Russian invasion that started on February 24 follows eight years of conflict between Russian and Ukraine. Hundreds of thousands of people across the country are enduring bombings and assault by Russian military forces; and have lost power, been cut off from water and fuel. As people head toward the western regions, there is a shortage of food and other basic supplies. The reports of displaced persons inside Ukraine continue to rise every day, already in the hundreds of thousands.

Our first priority is to provide funding to our partners on the ground. While the scale of this crisis is new, receiving refugees from Ukraine and other countries in Central and Eastern Europe is not, which means we have trusted, established partners with the knowledge and expertise to carry out this important work. In fact, One Great Hour of Sharing - the single largest way that Presbyterians come together every year to provide hope, help and relief - was started in response to refugees coming out of Europe.

Our response to the situation in Ukraine will include both financial and technical assistance as the network of faith communities providing humanitarian assistance grows in the months ahead.

The needs for the response will be great. God's people are called on to stand in the "GAP" - Give. Act. Pray.
