#### Pastor's Corner

Visio divina is a form of divine seeing in which we prayerfully invite God to speak to our hearts as we look at an image. As you gaze at an image, you will be offered some questions for silent reflection, some of which may speak to you, while others you may choose to ignore. As you gaze at the image, notice your breath and your body. Simply be present to the image and allow it to speak to your heart, without any particular agenda. It might speak to you in words or wordlessly.<sup>1</sup>



- How do you feel looking at the image?
- If you had to describe the image in a sentence or two silently to yourself, what would you say?
- If you were in the image, where would you place yourself?
- Do you get a glimpse of the sacred from this image?
- Is God speaking to you in this image?
- Does a name for God arise for you from this image? In silence, sit with what you have received.<sup>1</sup>

Artwork is from Kelli Lattimore: I started painting icons in 2011 while I was a member of the Common Friars from 2009-2013. Our collective work was about being more connected: to ourselves, each other, our surrounding community and the land. This manifested itself as a place called "The Good Earth Farm" where we held weekly services and meals and grew produce for our community and local food pantries. My friend, and fellow farmer, Paul often posed the question, "how do we become people who, in Jesus's words, 'consider the lilies of the field'? This became the focus of my first attempt at an icon entitled: "Christ: Consider the Lilies." Iconography has since become a practice of more considerations: of color and light, of brush stroke and form, symbol and meaning. I am trying to become a better painter. However, I do not wish to approach Iconography as an art form that simply follows an inherited tradition, knowledge and practice. I want it to be a creative process, meditation, and practice that brings about new self-knowledge for the viewer and myself. Who are the saints that are among us here and now? I feel the need for new images. In some icons I wish to embrace the traditional forms and image but for many icons the image needs reshaping, re-imagining, and re-wondering. There are icons here that people may find theologically unsound and wrong, or for others, helpful and inspiring. I think both reactions are important. My hope is that these icons do what all art can potentially do. which is, to create more dialogue. By transcending our biases, listening, and having inner silence about our convictions, our inherited traditions, or our favorite ideas we can become open to the patterns of work, knowledge and experience we may not have seen in the other or buried in ourselves. The other may have something to teach us about what we know, about who God is, the world we live in and who are our neighbors. This is the real work of being human and of art. Being more present. # **Session Briefs**

At its Thursday, February 15<sup>th</sup> Meeting, the Session discussed several issues. The following is a brief overview:

- Treasurer's report for January was received from Treasurer Kae Hoyle, showing Total Revenue of \$28,024.91 and Total Expenditures of \$20,367.67.
- Kae updated the Session on the 2024 Budget.
- Session approved moving \$5,000 from the Jewel Fund at the Presbyterian Foundation into the Jewel Howland checking account at Generations Bank. \$4,000 will be placed in a CD, until it is needed. Finance Committee suggested this because it is difficult to move the money from one account to another.
- Huntington Services resuming on the 2<sup>nd</sup> Tuesday of the month at 10am, from September to May.
- Building and Property Committee is discussing the design of a public play and art space in the green area near the Daycare.
- The Covid Memorial was moved to the green space near the Daycare. In the spring, the sculpture will be painted and new, colored ribbons designed to be used outside will be added, as the fabric was not intended to hold up in the elements.
- Worship and Music has decorated for Lent using candles and rocks.
- Highlights from Presbytery Meeting: 1) The General Council voted to direct the Committee on Operations to revise/rewrite the Presbytery's policy on the distribution of remaining funds from churches that close to follow the following guidance: 10% of remaining funds would be distributed by the congregation to the missions/programs of their choice; 40% would be used by the Presbytery to fund new/innovative ministries (new can mean new communities altogether, or outreach/programs to entirely new people, groups, etc.; it is not support of existing programs, but a huge encouragement for innovation from existing congregations or wholly new communities); 40% would be used by the Presbytery to fund existing ministries and/or discretionary needs within the Presbytery; and 10% would be used by the Presbytery to support PCUSA global missions. Any alternatives to this formula of distribution of remaining funds requested by a closing church would require the approval of the Committee on Operations and the General Council. 2) Approved a Presbytery Policy of Parental leave/family leave - 12 weeks paid. 3) Approved a Policy for Background Checks for all pastors and staff.


# Special item for The House of Concern in MARCH: Canned Meats & Canned Fish




# **Church Family News**


#### March is here!
