Be aware of scammers: This was shared with us by Bob and Carolyn Seems’ relatives in PA: *It is so amazing what kind of scams people come up with. On Monday, I got an email from our pastor, Becki, asking me to email her back when I was free. I noticed it wasn't the usual email address, from the church's domain, but it was a gmail account, and I figured she had a personal account, too. Anyway, I wrote back and said I was free, and did she want to call me? She wrote back right away and said she was on a Zoom call and couldn't talk, but would I be willing to do her a huge favor - she said the community shelter had some folks in need, and she had promised to buy some gift cards for them, and had completely forgotten. Could I go pick up 7 \$100 gift cards to Ebay right away? The Ebay thing stopped me, and I forwarded the whole thing to Becki's actual email through the church, and she sent out immediate notices to everyone that there was a scam and not to do it, and to report it. Unfortunately, several other people had already bought the cards. When they emailed the scammer, who they still thought was Becki, they were told to just scrape the backs of them and let her know the numbers, which she would forward on to the shelter. None of them went so far as to do that. One person stopped payment through her credit card on them, but one person had actually bought them with cash. The church is buying them from her, and will try to use them in some fashion. But, she felt just horrible about being so gullible. She shouldn't feel bad - these people are so deceitful!! Please be aware of scammers.*

COVID-19 MUSIC-(Where's the Choir?)

Yes, the music has changed in the past six weeks, and there’s no one person who misses the choir as much as I miss them! We have tried a couple of things and are still seeking a presentable solution. The choirs and “remote” performances seen on TV are the result of solutions that are often times cost prohibitive or the result of many hours of behind the scenes sound engineering. There has been a lot of learning and goodness in what you have heard on a Sunday morning (assuming you ‘tune in’ at 10AM). Everything you hear is most likely a third generation recording, meaning: 1) The song is played and the accompaniment recorded, 2) The recording in step one was played and the lyrics were recorded, 3) The recording in step 2 was embedded into the PowerPoint slides, and 4) When the service was recorded for you all, the slides were run to generate the service file that you see each week.

The church in Cleveland decided this was a good time to paint the sanctuary so we lost use of the organ temporarily. Therefore, you have had a mix of music offerings in the online services. For example, your Gloria Patri is played on a pump organ, built in the 1890’s that has been passed down my father’s side of the house. While we are online, that recording will stay. To provide an organ sound the past three weeks, a keyboard has been used on one or two hymns. The nice thing about that is the transpose button; some hymns are written in higher keys and the transpose button lets you sing those hymns in lower keys. There was one song in the April 26th service that actually was sung and recorded at the same time. That is hard to do when there are several verses. You have also experienced some sound engineering, whereby, the original recording was a verse or two short and the solution was a successful ‘copy & paste’ to complete the hymn.

There have been so many changes in our lives relevant to the Coronavirus – even our worship music. There will be an anthem before we return to the sanctuary, but it has to be something that the choir can embrace. Until we get to that anthem, know that God has been and will forever be a constant in our lives. No change there. And we must all, joyfully continue to sing His praises and be grateful for all that is. - Hedra Harrison

[and please don't think Joyce is hinting for someone to cook something! she's just saying how it is for awhile and it's fine] Joyce is still reading Paul Theroux's The Pillars of Hercules [since December2019] and Judith Viorst's poetry collection Unexpectedly Eighty!

Michele Edmondson says she is continuing on a limited basis with her pet grooming business, observing all pandemic safety measures. She has made a few masks. When asked if she cooks, Michele said she's probably "cooking a bit too much!" She continues to play the harp and has recently found an on-line teacher in South Africa. Delicious Recipe

Circle did not meet, but here is a great recipe to try from Barb VanKirk's daughter, Liz:

Tomato soup

Liz D.

1-1/2 Lbs. Roma tomatoes, halved
3 Tbs. Olive oil
2Tbs. Unsalted butter
1 medium onion, diced
4 garlic cloves, minced
2 C chicken broth (or veg. broth)

1 Tbs. Fresh thyme, minced
one 28 oz can crushed tomatoes
2 C fresh basil leaves, chopped
2 Tbs. Dried basil
One tbs. Sugar
2/3 c heavy cream (almond milk works fine)



S & P to taste

Heat oven to 375. Place tomatoes on baking sheet, drizzle with oil, S&P, roast about an hour.
2) Saute onion in butter about 5 min. in large pot over medium heat. Stir in garlic & thyme, another 5 min.
3) Add crushed tomatoes, chopped basil & sugar. Stir, lower heat, cover, simmer 10 min.
4) Add chicken (or veg) broth, roasted tomatoes. Simmer, covered, about 30 min. Stir occasionally.
5) Blend until smooth. Return to pot. Stir in cream (or almond milk)
6) Reheat. Garnish with crumbled goat cheese & dried basil, crusty bread or grilled cheese sandwiches.
