

The First Presbyterian Church of Seneca Falls Pastor's Corner



In January, one of the courses I will be taking is called Practicing Communal Discernment. Our reading, writing and class time is designed to create a space to cultivate habits and practices for listening to God in everyday life. One of the books for the course is *You Are What You Love: The Spiritual Power of Habit,* by James K.A. Smith.

I am enjoying reading this book and want to share a few of the gifts I have received while reading it. November is often a month where we lift up all that we are thankful for in our lives. I am thankful for books; they are a gift that keeps on giving!

Smith says, "You need to curate your heart. You need to worship well. Because you are what you love. And you worship what you love. And you might not love what you think. Which raises an important question. Let's dare to ask it." We are what we love, so what do you love? Who do you love? How do you spend your time showing this love and sharing it with others?

James K.A. Smith feels that our answer to this question speaks to our discipleship. "Discipleship, we might say, is a way to curate your heart, to be attentive to and intentional about what you love." Shorthand, if the people "will know we are Christians by our love," what do we love? Spend some time this week, this month, thinking about what you love. What is your discipleship? Smith feels we aren't what we think; not "I think therefore I am," **but** rather "I love therefore I am." "What if, instead of starting from the assumption that human beings are thinking things, we started from the conviction that human beings are first and foremost lovers?"

Our discipleship, our worship, our habits, and practices are informed and shaped by what we love. "We learn to love, then, not primarily by acquiring information about what we should love but rather through practices that form the habits of how we love." Thus, "The practices of Christian worship train our love." How are we training our love? What do we need to do more of or less of, to train our love and develop healthy habits?

Will meet on Monday, November 7th at 12:30pm In the Hawley Room

Kae led the Circle meeting in October and read to us from Habakkuk 1:2-4; 13 and from an article, "Keeping Watch in a Broken World" - with the message "GOD is always in charge!"

We resumed discussion of *The Women of the Bible Speak*...as Kae talked to us about God's plan and Esther's part in it and a demonstration of the power of collective prayer. We also discussed Rahab's faith, and more importantly - her actions; without which, "faith is lifeless."

Joyce reported on her calls to the Women's Shelter and House of Concern. The Personal Care Kits we assembled and took to the shelter before the pandemic were gratefully received at that time and still remembered and appreciated by staff there. We all agreed we should do kits again and made plans to each shop for specific items. We also checked in our left-overs supply. We'll put kits together at this next meeting. Each kit (in a zip-lock bag) will hold: Wash Cloth/Towel, Comb, Tooth Brush/Paste, Shampoo/Conditioner, Tissues, Bar Soap, Deodorant and Lotion. We had planned to buy another case of infant formula for the House of Concern. We learned they have an adequate supply at the present time and asked us to wait because they cannot keep formula very long because of its short shelf life. What they need most, they said, are items for their "NEEDS" room, where people may take personal care items: deodorants, tooth paste, bathroom paper, bar soap, body wash, and shampoo, etc. We'll ask for those items from the congregation for November.

Before leaving the meeting we wrote notes and signed Get Well cards to Elaine Ritter and Michele Edmondson.

Ginny will lead the November meeting and lead discussion of **Chapter 7** - **Mary and Martha of Bethany: Two Pathways** in *The Women of the Bible Speak...*we have two more chapters to discuss in this book and will resume discussion in January.

At the November meeting we'll also make plans for the **Holiday Pot Luck** luncheon in December, to which all of the women of the church are invited. We look forward to this time, which we haven't enjoyed since December of 2019!

As always: We invite all women of the congregation to join with us whenever you can, at Circle meetings.

Those attending in November, please bring one or more non-food items for the House of Concern. These will go to their NEEDS room and can include household paper and cleaning products, as well as personal care items.



A Per Capita Primer Presbytery of Geneva

What is Per Capita? In essence, per capita is a set amount of money (apportionment) per member that is paid to the Presbytery of Geneva, the Synod of the Northeast, and the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church (USA). Just as a train cannot move without an engine, our church councils require a power source to enable them to provide basic services which support our mutual mission as the Body of Christ. Per capita covers the ecclesiastical expenses of the denomination: the coordination and evaluation of mission, and the performance of ecclesiastical, legislative, and judicial functions. Per capita is an opportunity for all members of the Presbyterian church to participate equally, responsibly, and interdependently by sharing the organizational costs of the larger church.

What does the Book of Order say about Per Capita? "Each council above the session shall prepare a budget annually for its operating expenses, including administrative personnel, and may fund it with a per capita apportionment among the particular churches within its bounds. Presbyteries are responsible for raising their own funds and for the timely transmission of per capita funds to their respective synods and to General Assembly. Presbyteries may direct per capital apportionments to the sessions within their bounds but in no case shall the authority of the session to direct its benevolences be compromised." (G-3.0106)

How is per capita paid to the Synod and General Assembly in the Presbytery of Geneva? Different denominations have different ways of collecting revenue. Some receive a "head tax" of more than \$50 per member. Others receive a certain percentage of a congregation's receipts (up to 25%). In the Presbyterian Church (USA), per capita is an obligation of the Presbytery. The Presbytery of Geneva affirms the interdependent nature of our church by allocating funds in the annual operating budget for Presbytery, Synod, and GA per capita regardless of income from the churches.

What are the consequences if a Church does not contribute to the Presbytery? The majority of congregations in the Presbytery generously contribute funds every year. When particular churches do not contribute, a greater burden of responsibility is placed on sister churches in the Presbytery to fund our mutual mission including our partnership with Synod and General Assembly.

Per capita establishes a minimum level of financial participation in the vital work of our connectional church as the Body of Christ, strengthening the sense of community among all Presbyterians. It is a moral obligation we share with one another. Some sessions encourage each member to contribute per capita beyond regular giving to the church. For more information about per capita:


