- Learned of gladiola bulb sales with money raised to go to House of Concern.
- Approved sale of pecans from Georgia, by Membership & Parish Life.

Women's Circle

At the October meeting, four were present. We continued with our reading and discussion of the Book of Ruth in the Good News (GNT), and in other translation print-outs from Michele. We came to a new appreciation for this poor widow and her devotion and PRESBYTERIAN WOMEN loyalty to her mother-in-law, Naomi. Through this relationship, and Ruth's marriage to



Boaz, a relative of her deceased father-in-law, the family inheritance was preserved and perpetuated. Ruth bore a son (Obed) to Boaz and Obed became the ancestor of Jesse and David; the forefathers of Jesus in the house of Israel! And all or much of this came about because of Ruth's and Naomi's great faith and faithfulness. We could see the importance of the close-knit fabric that is woven by family connections and loyalty. (We could also appreciate that as women, both Naomi and Ruth had themselves no rights for land ownership, except through males in the family). One of their future grandsons would be our Lord Jesus.

Also of interest to our group are the many words in the various translations which are foreign to us. In the TLV or Tree of Life version, for example, in 3:10 Boaz tells Ruth that although "I am a goel...there is one who is a closer goel than me."

Kae looked up the word "goel" for us and found it to mean "redeemer" in Hebrew and one such goel was a kinsperson responsible for redeeming or buying back property owned or lost; or to right wrongs or seek justice for another kinsman.

We went on to talk about our local Circle mission projects. Following the September meeting, Barb bought a case of infant formula and we took it and several bags of personal care items to the House of Concern. Joyce talked with the people at the shelter in Waterloo which opened in January of this year and run by C.A.P. They take in homeless people and people in in-between situations, as well as those escaping domestic violence and youth who, for various reasons, cannot live at home. And yes, they are always in great need of donations. She took the 10 personal kits we assembled in September, and they were gratefully received.

Circle members also wanted to learn more about race and to better understand why many of us, as white people, feel ourselves different and see and experience many parts of life differently than do people of color. Ginny suggested we all read Waking Up White, by Debby Irving, a white author. We made plans to find books for everyone. Joyce read to us a short story from Maud Martha, by Gwendolyn Brooks, a black poet and author, and we discussed that briefly; especially the part about going into neighborhoods which we've been taught to fear. We agreed to have someone at each of our next meetings bring a short reading pertaining to race or racism, to present before we begin our main study. Barb volunteered for November.

Kae will give our opening prayer. We hope Michele will be able to join us. We wrote a card to her today because she couldn't join the meeting due to injuries she suffered in a recent fall.

The next Circle meeting is on Monday, November 2nd at 12:30 pm in the Hawley Room at the Church. We invite interested others to join us. Bring a lunch and your mask!



Also, bring something for the House of Concern! Special item for November is non-food (detergents, paper products, bath soap, cleaning products, etc).

Newsletter readers are reminded that the House now serves increasing numbers of families affected by losses during this long pandemic. Food items are always needed, and you may take items directly to the House of Concern, Mon-Fri, 9am-3pm.
