"God calls us to truth and action in a variety of ways. For instance, this is a compellation of work from the artist Kelly Latimore whose artistic style is icons. "I do not wish to approach Iconography as an art form that simply follows an inherited tradition, knowledge, and practice. I want it to be a 'holy pondering', meditation, and process that potentially brings about a new way of seeing for the viewer and me. What is the artwork in our churches and communities for? Who are the saints that are among us here and now? Where is Christ present right in our own backyards? My hope is that these icons can do what all art can potentially do, which is, to create more dialogue. By transcending our biases, listening, and having inner silence about our convictions, our inherited traditions, or our favorite ideas we can become open to the patterns of work, knowledge and experience we may not have seen in the other or buried in ourselves. The other may have something to teach us about who God is, the world we live in, and who are our neighbors. This is the real work of being human and of art. Being more present." 



Pentecost

I've had some questions come my way about Pentecost and the symbols we display. Here are some answers from our research for decorating ideas.

We usually celebrate only the Day of Pentecost (a single Sunday) and not as a season like Advent and Lent. Pentecost is most familiar as told to us in Acts 2:1-4, when the Holy Spirit came to the disciples seven weeks after Easter with a sound 'like the rush of a mighty wind' and with 'light in the form of tongues of fire' and each of them began to speak in their native tongue and understand and be understood by all. The liturgical color is Red.

Pentecost: occurs Seven Weeks after Easter.

Symbols: the descending *Dove* indicating the Holy Spirit and the power of God at work and *Seven Flames* indicating the separate flames on each disciple representing the divine appearance. These also symbolize the seven gifts of the Spirit - Wisdom, Understanding, Counsel, Might, Knowledge, Fear and Piety.

Trinity Sunday (or The Sunday after Pentecost): There are various symbols representing the 'Three in One' of the Father, Son, and Holy Spirit. The easiest to create for us was the *equilateral triangle*, but it could also be a Clover or Shamrock or some other form depicting a triad.

The next three Sunday symbols depict the three segments of the Holy Trinity.

The Second Sunday after Pentecost: God the Father. The Hand of God the Father reaching down from a cloud in blessing. It is one of the older symbols of God and is found in the scene of the Baptism of Christ.

The Third Sunday after Pentecost: God the Son, Jesus Christ. The *Cross* is the perfect symbol because of Jesus' death on the cross, but there are other symbols that are acceptable - The Fish (or ICHTHUS), the Lamb (of God), and the Rock.

The Fourth Sunday after Pentecost: Holy Spirit or Holy Ghost. This takes us back to the descending *Dove* used on Pentecost but could instead by an Eagle, or Fire (Flames). We sometimes skip revisiting this one and move on to the liturgical color Green.

The full season of Pentecost is 24 to 29 Sundays following the Day of Pentecost and ending with All Saints, and the liturgical color is Green. The number of Sundays after Pentecost is determined by when Easter is celebrated, as All Saints is a set time on the liturgical calendar. The ever-moving date for Easter is a whole different conversation! We have taken the liberty to extend the use of the Red scarves from just Pentecost Sunday to include the additional weeks of symbols - we use the red scarves so little otherwise.
