"Be still and know that I am God!" (Psalm 46:10)


Where are the positive voices? Why is bullying seen as the way to get ahead, even in the church? Where have compassion and "love your neighbor" gone? Why must parents keep their children from watching the TV news? How do we tell our children that insults and harassment are not proper ways to communicate, if that's all they see on social media?

As I ponder these questions and prepare for our 2-week term of COS in August, I find myself also looking forward to the end of August. Not because my year as Acting Director will be over, but because I will be going to England for a month, and I want to spend time writing and reflecting on what compassion means in my life as a Christian. How do I practice compassion, and how is it being changed by our culture? I don't know about you, but this worries me. Oh, I don't spend a lot of time thinking about it because there are so many other things that take my attention in other directions. But I want to spend time thinking about it, reflecting, praying, journaling and just "being," not "doing." Yes, I will be busy in England – preaching at two Methodist churches where I served in the beginning of my ministry, running a halfmarathon, and visiting friends and relatives - doing all the things that fill up vacation time, but I will be away. And sometimes that is what it takes to stop doing and open myself to just being in the presence of God.

What will you do before the summer is over to renew your spirit and your understanding of compassion or some other aspect of your spiritual life? We all won't be able to go to England or travel very far away, but we can plan spiritual "pauses" in our schedule by marking it on the calendar – a day or an hour to just pray and reflect, not plan and prepare. Bishop Judy Craig once told me to insure your time with God, mark an "X" on your calendar and write GOD – who can argue with that? (not even you!)

The older I get the more I am convinced that it is important (no, necessary) for a pastor to step away and listen to the One who called you into this holy vocation. Yes, you must read scripture and plan sermons and other ministries in your church, but the only way to maintain a spiritual calling is to revive your soul, and you can only do this by intentionally reserving time with God, otherwise it just won't happen. This is a unique vocation. It can lift you into God's arms and crush you beneath the weight of other people's agendas and burdens.

So, before summer is over, what will you do to insure that you spend time with God? Be aware. Be intentional. And your spiritual journey as a pastor will nurture your soul throughout your life, and beyond.

#### Randy Litchfield



t's easy to request an official transcript from GBHEM. Address your COS transcript I request to Pamela Frost, cosregistrar@gbhem.org. To help her confirm she has the correct student, include your

- full name
- PID# (it's on all grade sheets)
- annual conference
- date of birth

Pamela usually emails transcripts within a day or two. Please check any transcript you receive against the reports you receive on the first day of each COS class you take here (this is an UNOFFICIAL listing) and let us know if there are any discrepancies. If you have COS credit from another COS school which isn't showing on the UNOFFICIAL listing we provide, let us know and we will request a transcript and then update our records.

Grades are usually processed at GBHEM five or six weeks after the end of the COS term, at which time the course will show up on transcripts.

### CHANGE IN COURSE LOAD POLICY

Approval from GBEHM is no longer required for enrolling in more than four classes in a calendar year. With District and Conference approvals, students may now register for classes beyond the four-course requirement for full-time local pastors.

# **FROM THE WRITING INSTRUCTOR**

C or those unfamiliar with academic writing styles, knowing how to write in academic I language can be an intimidating challenge. Which words are acceptable? Which words are preferred? While those with experience can give a few general guidelines, it is the experience that informs us more precisely about appropriate language use in academic writing. The most important distinguishing factor about academic writing is formality. Academic writing is formal, even if we are writing about ourselves. This implies a few general rules and recommended avoidances. For a start, avoid slang, textmessage spellings, clichés, and contractions. Phrases like to be honest, super cool, lo and behold, ain't nobody got time 4 dat, a turn for the worse, the cat's out of the bag, through the roof, so to speak, and it was a doozy have no place in academic writing. These casual expressions may be appropriate in personal emails, text messages, and when you are chewing the fat but they are inappropriate in academic papers. Use

standard American English spelling for all words, and if you are not sure if a word is a slang term, look it up in the dictionary. Avoiding colloquialisms will help you maintain a scholarly tone throughout your work and will also help you come across clearly and without ambiguity.
