FROM THE DIRECTOR

et me welcome all of you, including eight new students and two graduating students, to the 2022 Spring Term of the Course of Study School of Ohio (COSSO)!

Our hearts have been heavy since Russia invaded Ukraine in late February. We have been lifting up our prayers for the people of Ukraine. We have been praying that God will make this war cease and bring peace to the region.

Let me share an invitation to prayer for peace from Bishop Christian Alsted, United Methodist Bishop of the Nordic Baltic Area:

War and violence are evil and always entail considerable human costs.

The Christian message points to the path of reconciliation and never to war and violence as a solution to conflicts.

In the face of this evil, we pray for a logic different from the one based on geopolitical competition. We pray for a change of hearts and minds of leaders; we pray for de-escalation and dialogue instead of violence and war. . . .

We stand with the United Methodists in Ukraine in prayer for protection, reconciliation, and peace. We pray for pastors, leaders, and congregations in The United Methodist Church in Ukraine; may God grant that their witness of reconciliation and peace will bring strength and hope to the Ukrainian people. . . .

I call on all our congregations to intercede for the people of Ukraine and for the leaders in the world who have the power to bring an end to war. I call on all our congregations to pray and fast for reconciliation and peace in the world. May God, in his grace, open our eyes to the things that make for peace, may he protect us all from the escalation and spreading of war, and may we follow him on his path of truth and peace.

As I stated in one of the previous newsletters, Paul stresses in 2 Corinthians that reconciliation is the defining act of God in Christ, yet God has entrusted to us the message of reconciliation. Our ministry of reconciliation and peacemaking, our witness to the Prince of Peace, is central to the gospel and integral to the mission of the church. And it is God who appeals through us even in our ministry of reconciliation. It is thus crucial for us, as an individual Christian and as the church, to continue to grapple with these questions concerning the gospel: "What should be the message of the gospel in this particular context and time? And how should the gospel be communicated?"

Our classes will continue to be offered fully online through the Summer Two-Week Term this year. We hope to return to in-person classes in a hybrid format starting with the Fall Term.

All of us on the COSSO staff look forward to journeying with you this Spring term!



Rev. Dr. Sarah Lancaster


COS 122: Theological Heritage I: Introduction
