et me welcome all of you, including eleven new students Land one graduate, to the 2023 Summer Term of the Course of Study School of Ohio (COSSO)!

There is an inseparable link between the presence and work of the Holy Spirit and the mission of the church. In the book of Acts, it is the Holy Spirit who keeps urging the church to move beyond its boundaries in its missional and evangelistic endeavor. One of the most significant events in Acts was the conversion of Cornelius—the first full-blown encounter between a Christian Jew and a Gentile, with significant implications for the future mission and evangelism of the early church. Here the issue was not the legitimacy of a Gentile mission, but the inclusion of Gentiles at the table-fellowship.

Throughout the whole incident, hospitality becomes and remains a pervasive and thorny issue. Clearly, the Cornelius story was about the social barrier to the Gentile mission. For the Jerusalem church to overcome such a barrier, Peter first had to experience a conversion, learning firsthand that "God shows no partiality" (Acts 10:34). Peter's conversion then led to the conversion of the church from ethnocentrism to multiculturalism. According to Beverly Gaventa, "Indeed, in Luke's account, Peter and company undergo a change that is more wrenching by far than the change experienced by Cornelius."

Unfortunately, the church today is still faced with the same kind of challenge—to overcome its ethnocentrism and homogeneity and to reach people of different races, cultures. and economic classes. As Darrell Guder said, there is always a danger for the church to pursue "culturally exclusive forms of Christian witness and church formation." However, authentic mission and evangelism invites believers to go beyond their comfort zone to meet and form a community with people who are different from them, confronting the prevailing homogeneous patterns of human relationships in society.

I hope that the courses we offer at COSSO would help you envision and pursue a community of faith that intentionally crosses boundaries—whether racial, cultural, or economic established by society and communicates God's redeeming love in Christ with genuine welcoming.

SPIRITUAL FORMATION

"There is a time to die..." When someone dies life goes on, differently, but it goes on. Whether the person was a close loved one or a distant friend, everything stops, at least temporarily, and we grieve the loss. These are times that crush the spirit and stretch our faith. There is an emptiness that nothing can fill and so we look for something to fill the void. Depression may set in and push us to the breaking point. We try to pick up the pieces and they scatter in front of us, testing our faith. It happens to all of us at some point, but for pastors it is often devastating because it seems we have nowhere to turn, no confidant, no soul friend or confessor, just us moving into the next meeting or project on the calendar. There's no time to stop and put the pieces back together, no time to grieve when there's so much to do.

Yes, life goes on, faith and hope tell us this, and we will pick up the pieces, in time. But for now, in the time of grief, "there is a time to mourn."

I was thinking about this last week when I received word that a dear friend in England died. It took me by surprise because, well, I guess I didn't expect it. He was healthy and always so eager to stay in touch and help others. He was not only my friend but my mentor when I lived in England. We were pastors in the same Methodist circuit so we met regularly, but more than that he was my mentor. I was just out of seminary and he walked me through each new service that I had, funerals, baptisms, weddings, and it was truly a blessing. He said he did it because someone did it for him. I especially remember the time he came over for Annual Conference and was one of the sponsors at my ordination. Wouldn't it be nice if we all would pass on kindness to those who follow us, like Rev. Keith Jump did for me, and help others respond to God's call in their lives.

When Jesus dies on the cross, there is grief and there is hope as something new rises. And that is the call to us, to take the time to mourn and then live again.
