PRAYING OUR WAY TO THE CROSS: An Easter Vigil for Holy Week

NOTES: Easter Vigil services vary in format and time; some include Holy Communion and some are incorporated into a shorter Easter Sunrise service. The following may be adapted for a service during the Easter Triduum (last three days of Holy Week), recounting the scripture story from Palm Sunday through Holy Saturday. The individual days could also be posted as readings/videos throughout Holy Week. Before the service (or after Holy Thursday reading), altar items may be removed or draped in black cloth, and after the Holy Saturday reading the black cloths are removed and altar items returned. Prayers of the People may be included at any point, and appropriate scriptures may be added after each reading. After midnight on Holy Saturday (or at Sunrise service), candles may be used with traditional "first fire," a small bonfire outside the church, and a procession following the "light" into the church.

<u>Praying with stones</u> relates to the Jewish tradition of placing stones at gravesites, to symbolize a "bond" with the deceased, their memory lives on in and through us. You may provide a selection of stones at entrance to sanctuary for folks to choose a stone for the service.

Use these and other resources to help guide folks through a prayerful Holy Week. Communion elements are used if your conference approves of online communion.

It was on the Monday that religion got in the way, Then, the holiest man on earth

He turned the tables on Monday...

the day that religion got in the way

(hold stone and reflect on the wisdom in Jesus' resistance)

It was on the Tuesday

that he laid it on the line.

If you had been there

you would have thought it was a political rally.

They wanted to know why

and they wanted to know how.

The questions they asked were trivial,

they were just looking for an argument.

So he told them what he thought.

And that was on the Tuesday...

the day when he laid it on the line.

(hold stone and reflect on Jesus' way of grace)

HOLY WEDNESDAY

It was on the Wednesday

that they called him wasteful.

The place smelt like a perfume parlor,

as though somebody had spilled a whole bottle.

The woman was the poorest of the poor,

and they called him extravagant and wasteful.

Jealousy was in the air over a poor woman's generosity.

That was on the Wednesday...

when they called him wasteful.

(hold stone and reflect on Jesus' way of love)

HOLY/MAUNDY THURSDAY

It was on the Thursday

that he became valuable.

He didn't have anything to sell,

he wasn't into making things anymore,

after leaving his hammer and saw behind.

He was into talking and listening,

so his work wasn't worth much.

Put him on a stage and he might attract an audience,

worth a silver coin or maybe thirty.

It was on the Thursday...

that he became valuable.

(hold stone and reflect on ways Jesus meets our needs)

(Silence as items are removed from the altar or draped with burlap/black cloth; see Stripping of the Altar, BOW 351, for this ancient practice)

GOOD FRIDAY

It was on the Friday

that they ended it all.

Of course, they didn't do it one by one.

They threw their stones in crowds

where they could feel safe:

a crowd in the church, a crowd at the office,

a crowd in the street, a crowd on the hill.

And he said nothing.

He took the insults, the sight of his friends

throwing stones, turning away.

And he said nothing.

He let them do their worst
until the worst was done.

And on Friday they ended it all...
and that would have been the end
had he not cried,

"Father, forgive them..."

And that was not the end.

(hold stone and reflect on the gift of new beginnings)

A READING from the Gospel of Mark 15:22-24

They took Jesus to a place called Golgotha, which means the place of the skull. They tried to give him wine mixed with a drug called myrrh, but Jesus would not drink it. Then they crucified him and divided his clothing among themselves, throwing dice to see who would get each piece of clothing.

AN ENDING

Jesus, our friend, we meet beneath your cross, Grieving our loss and the loss of the world. So write your gospel on our hearts, And when we betray you to suit our needs, May we hear the cock crowing; And when we deny you, turn us around, that we may try again to live your gospel, Amen.

HOLY SATURDAY

It was on the Saturday
that he was not there.
Men shiver in an upstairs room.
Women weep in a circle of grief.
Memories flood in, they try to remember

(hold stone and reflect burdens you carry;
in silence items are returned to the altar/drapes are removed)

LAYING OUR BURDENS DOWN

Holding our stones, let us remember our Lord's life. Stones are what people wanted to throw at Jesus;

stones are what surround him in the tomb, and on the third day he pushed his way back through stones. Holding our stones, we remember our bond with Jesus in life. Jesus said, Give me your burdens.

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world.

I am the good shepherd,

I know my sheep and I lay down my life for them.

Holding our stones, we lay our burdens down.

(If service ends here, all leave in silence and place their stones on altar or at cross)

HOLY COMMUNION FOR A HOLY ENDING

(after receiving communion, stones may be laid on the altar or at the cross)

IN THE WAITING

God of life and death

We wait in hope.

God of all the world

We wait in peace.

God of all that is to come

We wait with love.

IN THE BEGINNING

They gathered in an upper room to share a meal. And the names of the apostles were these: Simon, called Peter; his brother Andrew; James and his brother John (the sons of Zebedee); Philip and Bartholomew; Thomas and Matthew the tax collector; James the son of Alphaeus; Thaddeus; Simon the patriot, and Judas Iscariot. (Matthew 10:2-4)

Seeing that we are surrounded with such a great cloud of witnesses to our faith – those who ran their races before us, and those who have entered into their rests – we join with them now to praise your name and sing your unending hymn:

Holy, holy, holy Lord.

God of power and might, heaven and earth are full of your glory.

Hosanna in the highest.

Blessed is the One who comes in the name of the Lord.

Hosanna in the highest.

For us you were born, for us you healed, preached, taught and showed the way to heaven; for us you were crucified, and for us, after death, you rose again.

Our hands are empty, our hearts are sometimes full of wrong things. We are not fit to gather up the crumbs from under your table. But with you is mercy and the power to change. And so we offer ourselves to you in praise and thanksgiving, as we declare the mystery of our faith:

Christ has died. Christ is risen. Christ will come again.

When the hour came, Jesus and his apostles reclined at the table. And he said to them, "I have eagerly desired to eat this Passover with you before I suffer. For I tell you, I will not eat it again until it finds fulfillment in the kingdom of God."

And he took bread, gave thanks and broke it, and gave it to them, saying, "This is my body given for you; do this in remembrance of me."

In the same way, after the supper he took the cup, saying, "This cup is the new covenant in my blood, which is poured out for you. But the hand of him who is going to betray me is with mine on the table. The Son of Man will go as it has been decreed, but woe to that man who betrays him." They began to question among themselves which of them it might be who would do this. (Luke 22:14-23)

IN THE ENDING

Before he died, he spoke from the cross, the only words that can set us free, "Father, forgive them." And so, we are forgiven in this holy meal. And that is why we are bold to pray Our Lord's Prayer,

Our Father...

Pour out your Spirit on us gathered here, and on this bread and wine. May they be for us a new beginning. May we know in our hearts what our lips say, Christ died for our sake. Look, the Lord comes to us in the bread of life.

Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world. (break bread and eat)

And this cup is poured out for you and for your salvation. **Lamb of God, you take away the sin of the world.** (drink from cup)

PRAYER AFTER COMMUNION

My God, my God, your words reach us from the cross and we thank you for this holy feast, may they lead us to know that we belong to you, and that we belong to each other. And may this be enough for us to know that we do not walk or cry alone. Help us to leave our burdens at the cross and find your light waiting there in the morning. Amen.

A BLESSING FOR A NEW BEGINNING

(For a Sunrise service, the congregation may move outside gathering around the "first fire" of Easter. After the reading, a large candle is lit from the fire, individual candles may also be lit; after the reading they follow the "light" into the church and the altar candles are lit)

Just before daybreak, Mary went to the tomb.

And she heard a voice, "Mary, why are you looking for the living among the dead? He is not here. Don't be afraid. Go and tell my friends that they will see me." Praise the Lord for Christ is risen.

He is risen indeed!

Sisters and brothers, this is a great moment when we can declare that the love of God is stronger than the sin of the world and that nothing in the heights or depths can separate us from God's love. The peace of the Lord be with you.

And also with you.

Praise the Lord for Christ is risen.

He is risen indeed!

(The Easter celebrations begin!)
