A Way Forward

I would like to take this opportunity to share with you the process of the Commission on "A Way Forward." The Council of the Bishops has been in a special session of the General Conference of The United Methodist Church. The purpose of this session was to receive and act on a report from the Commission that is based on the recommendations of the Council of Bishops. The 32-member Commission (9 nations represented) was authorized by the 2016 General Conference and appointed by the Council of Bishops. Their work was to do a complete examination and possible revision of every paragraph of *The Book of Discipline* concerning human sexuality and explore options that help to maintain and strengthen the unity of the church.

The structure of the UMC is comprised of three branches:

- The Executive branch bishops who enforce the laws.
- The Legislative branch General Conference, the lawmakers.
- The Judicial branch Judicial Council (to determine if laws are constitutional).

How we got here:

- The 2016 General Conference asked the Council of Bishops to lead in overcoming the UMC impasse on homosexuality.
- The Council of Bishops proposed creating a Commission to examine every paragraph in *The Book of Discipline* related to human sexuality and provide possibilities for a called General Conference.
- In January 2017, the commission convened for the first of a dozen meetings.
- In January 2018, a handbook was released for use by the UMC.
- In May 2018, the Council of Bishops decided what the Commission would present to the 2019 General Conference.
- In July 2018, the Council of Bishops asked the Judicial Council to rule on the constitutionality of three plans submitted for consideration.

On Tuesday, February 26, 2019, the final vote by the Council of Bishops was in favor of The Traditional Church Plan.

Let us continue to keep our focus on God and trust Him. God knows what is best for His church and His people. Remain hopeful and at peace.

Two Scouting Groups at Windsor!

There were many national news articles in 2017 and 2018 with the Boy Scouts of America announcing significant changes to the scouting program. Beginning in 2018, elementary aged girls could join single-gender Cub Scout dens. On February 1, 2019, a single-gender scouting program for 6th through 12th grade girls became available. All Scouts will have until their 18th birthday to earn the rank of Eagle Scout.

As of February 1, 2019, the new name for both the single-gender older boys' and older girls' programs is *Scouts BSA*. All older youth in these programs are simply called **Scouts**. The name of the overall organization did not change; it continues to be called Boy Scouts of America.

Windsor now has two scout troops! Windsor's Troop 900 continues as an all-male troop (for boys in 6th through 12th grade). They meet on Tuesday nights at 7 PM. In February, Windsor officially welcomed an all-female troop, Troop 2870. They meet on Sundays from 7 to 8:30 PM and currently have ten middle school girls registered.

SCOUTS BSA TROOP 2870

In 1907, Lord Baden Powell founded The Boy Scouts in England. Three years later, The Boy Scouts of America was founded. In 2019, The Boy Scouts of America renamed the program for 11-17 year olds and allowed formation of girl troops. The program name is now Scouts BSA, but the national organization is still the Boy Scouts of America. Scouts BSA was actually the same program name used by the BSA in the early 1970s.

Girls of Troop 2870 started officially meeting on February 1, 2019. The troop plans an outing each month, with meetings each Sunday in Harbor Hall at 7 p.m. The first outing was a weekend "Founders Campout" at Camp Barstow on the western shore of Lake Murray. Upcoming campouts include a district camporee at Poinsett State Park, backpacking on the Palmetto Trail along the Peak to Prosperity section, Shooting Sports weekend, a campout at Table Rock State Park, and summer camp at Camp Barstow.

Currently, Troop 2870 has ten registered scouts. Girls ages 11-17 are welcome to join the troop at any time during the year. Girls will follow the same advancement requirements as boys. The 2019 program change allows girls to attain the rank of Eagle Scout for the first time. Additionally, the Order of the Arrow is now allowing girls to be elected into this BSA honor society. BSA requires scouts to describe how they "have done your duty to God" as a requirement for the ranks of Tenderfoot, Second Class, First Class, Star, Life and Eagle.

BSA youth protection guidelines require two adults at any meeting or event. For girl troops, at least one of the adult leaders must be a registered female over the age of 21. Currently, Troop 2870 has eight registered female leaders. Troop 2870 is not linked to a boy troop; campouts and meetings will be apart from boys. Overlap may occur at camporees or summer camp where troops of boys may be camping in separate campsites.

Ed Gatzke is currently serving as the Troop 2870 Scoutmaster. For three years he has been an Assistant Scoutmaster at Troop 287 where his son, Drew, is a Life Scout. Ed earned the rank of Eagle Scout in Troop 15, chartered by First United Methodist of Huntsville, AL. Along with many of the Troop 2870 adult leaders, Ed has completed his Wood Badge Scouting Leadership Training. He currently is a faculty member in the Department of Chemical Engineering at USC.

Windsor's Outreach Programs

Many of you know of Windsor's Outreach projects because you are able to help or see the information in the *Bulletin*—bookbag/school supply drive, bicycle drive, Christmas gifts, food pantry, flood buckets, Samaritan's Purse shoeboxes and serving at the Soup Kitchen.

But did you know the Outreach Budget provides financial assistance to numerous organizations? Among them are local groups (Harvest Hope, Sistercare, Oliver Gospel Mission, Epiphany Ministry, Cooperative Ministry, Scout troops at Windsor), United Methodist groups (UMCOR, Aldersgate Special Needs Ministry, UMVIM, Killingsworth Home, Epworth Children's Home) and financial assistance for members serving on Salkehatchie and global mission trips.

The following provides more information for two of the groups mentioned.

- Epiphany Ministry is an ecumenical Christian Ministry for young men and women who are in the custody of Juvenile Justice Facilities. Its purpose is to manifest God's love to incarcerated youth through a three-day short course in Christianity and an on-going follow up program. Each Epiphany weekend involves a team of adults and youth from the Christian community who work together to show the love of God to those attending.
- <u>Killingsworth</u> Home is a United Methodist Women's national mission institution. Its mission is to support, to empower, and to advocate for women recovering from various life crises within a safe, nurturing, Christian environment. The Columbia, SC home opened in 1947. Some of the issues many of today's residents face are addiction, prison, abuse, and mental and emotional problems. Each resident is required to be involved in some organized productive activity during her stay. For most residents that means employment.


