

I have another friend who says her relationship with her mother is like having a sibling. Her mother had her at a young age, and they have grown together. The blessing is that they understand their roles and accept each other without the stress of trying to force their relationship into the generic mold of mother and daughter. They relate to each other better as sisters. She decided not to hold her mother responsible for the relationship she could not give her, and they are both better people as a result of the decision. God placed people in her life who filled the void of a mother along the way and we thank God for those people.

My mother left me very early in life and I miss her every day, so I intentionally share the love she gave to us as children. She was firm with us, but she was loving. My mother lost her mother at the age of nine, so there were things she did not know how to give us, but we were always surrounded by good people. As children, all we needed was her love. I remember our beach trips every summer with the Sunday school class. It was important to her that we took family trips every summer. We also went to the pool on hot summer days and had picnics. She enjoyed making sure we had a fulfilled summer and liked seeing us happy. Barbecuing outside was the highlight of the summer; my mom prepared all the food and made homemade ice cream. These memories of my mother will always be near and dear to my heart.

So, as we reflect on our mothers this Mother's Day, let it be therapeutic for you. If your mother is gone, remember

her fondly. If the memories are painful, ask God to deeply heal you. If she is still with you, hold onto her ever so dearly. Mothers are essential to the life we live. A mother's love is priceless.

This included canned items (vegetables, fruit, meat, ravioli, spaghettio's, pasta sauce and soup) as well as cereals, oatmeal, grits, rice, pasta noodles, jarred pasta sauce, peanut butter, and crackers.

Rev. Tom Wall, with the Methodist Student Network, picked up our donation on April 16 and was very appreciative of Windsor's contribution to the food drive.

• bar soap, toothpaste/toothbrushes and paper towels/toilet paper are also appreciated



### **Trustee Report 2020-2021**

The Trustees have been busy during the pandemic in 2020 to the present day. Here is a list of tasks in process or completed:

- Removed two trees that were down behind the annex. This was done by church members.
- Repaired three water damaged areas on the backside of the education building due to leaking roof vent boots. This seems to have solved the ongoing leaks into the kitchen during heavy rain.
- Installed lights in the front and back of the church to improve visibility at night.
- Removed three dead pine trees on the church grounds.
- Department of Transportation repaired a sink hole outside of the storm drain in front of the church.
- Still waiting for the East Richland Sewer Company to finish sewer line replacement which will close off the line going under the church.
- Replaced range in the parsonage kitchen.
- Repaired garage door opener in the parsonage.
- Gutters cleaned and trees trimmed that were on the left side of the parsonage.
- In the process of putting galvanized pest screens under the overhang of the education building to prevent unwanted pests from entering the building.




