

WINDSOR RETURNS TO THE SOUP KITCHEN AT WASHINGTON STREET UMC

On Monday, August 2, four Windsorites returned downtown to help with the Soup Cellar Ministry at Washington Street UMC. From April 2020 until June 14, 2021, volunteers were suspended and a small group of Washington Street UMC staff and members continued the weekday noon meal service during the Covid pandemic.

Beginning mid-June of this year, Washington Street UMC invited groups such as Windsor UMC to return to help prepare and serve the noon meal to those in need. As our July serving date fell on a holiday for the Washington Street UMC ministry, the August serving was Windsor's first time to volunteer since March 2020!

The Soup Cellar continues the take-out bagged lunch service it has provided since the Covid pandemic began. Each day's volunteers are limited in number and need to wear a mask and observe pandemic protocols. Volunteers make sandwiches, pack items included in the bagged meal and hand the meal out.

Masked guests come to the serving counter one at a time to receive their bagged meal and depart so that the next guest may pick up their meal. For added protection, servers stand behind a plexiglass screen and pass the meal to the guests. The bagged meal on Windsor's serving day included a pimento cheese sandwich, pasta salad with turkey, a cup of canned mandarin oranges, cupcake and bottle of water.

Over the past months, guests coming to get a meal have significantly decreased from


pre-pandemic counts of 150 guests each weekday to current figures close to 60. Windsor's crew of Ferrie Ward, Debbo Lackore, Kathy Hart and Becky Leonard served 65 men and women.

Windsor's next serving date will be **Monday, October 4**—time still to be determined. Our September serving date falls on a holiday for Washington Street UMC and the Soup Cellar will be closed.

- bar soap, toothpaste/toothbrushes and paper towels/toilet paper are also appreciated

You may drop off your donations at the church office during the week or bring to the 10 a.m. Sunday worship service. A bin has been provided for your items.

Read this before you look away. This might be the very nudge you needed to find ways to serve your church and God. A certified lay servant is a professing member of a local church or charge, who desires to serve the Church and who receives specific training to witness to the Christian faith through spoken communication, to lead within a church and community, and to provide caring ministry. Lay Servant courses are 10 hours long and are on a variety of subjects, Praying in Public, Leading a Bible Study, Planning Worship, etc. Everyone starts with the Basic Course. Lay Servant academies also are a great way to meet other Methodists from South Carolina. This year, talk to Pastor Brown if you are interested. Applicants need the Pastor's approval and are presented at Charge Conference on October 14 for approval.
