Windsor's November 7 serving day was a warm 80 degrees. 111 guests came through that morning to pick up their bagged meal containing a cup of soup, sliced ham sandwich, orange, granola bar, Halloween candy and bottle of water. The soup of the day was sausage, rice and beans. Terrence Chisolm, Soup Cellar manager, prepares soup no matter the weather because the guests like soup and it provides a lot of nutrition. Kathy Hart, Debbo Lackore, Anita Schmidt and Becky Leonard helped with the November serving. Many thanks to Kim and Jim Hinson for their donation of Halloween candy. The candy was combined with a few extra treats from the Alpine Community Trunk 'n' Treat held the week before at Windsor and included in the bag as an extra sweet.

It was a cold day for our December 5 serving. Bagged meals were handed out to 85 guests and included a delicious cup of hot chicken, rice and vegetable soup, a bologna or peanut butter and jelly sandwich, an orange, 2 muffins and a bottle of water. Windsor's serving crew of Kathy Hart, Debbo Lackore, Anita Schmidt and Becky Leonard helped that morning.

Windsor's next serving day will be February 6 as the Soup Cellar will not be serving on the first Monday in January. Windsor Responds to Flood Bucket Need

In late September, Hurricane Ian began to make its way across Florida and on September 30 made landfall near Georgetown, SC bringing hurricane force winds, storm surge, destruction and flooding to the area. Mucking-out a house is one of the first steps in the massive job of clean-up. All of the cleaning buckets on-hand at the UMC Conference

Office in Columbia were delivered to churches in the affected area and local churches were asked to assemble more flood buckets to replenish the much-needed supplies. Windsor responded to the request by filling 11 flood buckets. Each bucket contained 14 UMCOR designated items, including dish gloves, laundry detergent, concentrated household cleaner, dish soap, a scrub brush, scouring pads, a clothesline and clothespins, 33-45-gallon heavy-duty trash bags, work gloves, insect repellant, air freshener, handiwipes, and N95 dust masks—plus the 5-gallon bucket and lid.



Noreen Doughty, Anita Schmidt, Kathy Hart and Becky Leonard sorted the donated supplies and filled each bucket with the designated items. Blessings were bestowed upon the buckets and those who would receive them by Pastor Brown during Windsor's November 20 worship service. The following day, the flood buckets were delivered to the UMC Conference Office. They will stay in South Carolina to be ready for use in our next big storm.
