

Mental Health Awareness Month

Mental Health Awareness Month was established in 1949 to increase awareness of the importance of mental health and wellness in Americans' lives and to celebrate mental illness recovery. For the past 20 years, the Substance Abuse and Mental Health Services Administration has recognized Mental Health Awareness Month every May to increase awareness about mental health's vital role in our overall health and well-being.

Mental health awareness is crucial because it promotes understanding, empathy, and support for individuals experiencing mental health challenges. It involves increasing knowledge and understanding of mental health issues, reducing stigma and discrimination, and encouraging individuals to seek help when needed. Unless something touches our lives, we never really find value or validity in being aware of the causes or concerns that surround us. Mental health is one of those areas where, for many reasons, we do not have conversations.

However, I notice that mental health is a growing issue in almost all settings. As a child, I grew up shielded from thoughts or persons considered mentally ill, even though I had an uncle who was special. So, the subject became taboo for me, as most people have experienced. So, rather than being a subject considered healthy to talk about, we labeled it wrong, and thus the stigma continued to evolve, "Don't talk about mental health issues; it's private." Yes, like any illness it is private, but here is the problem: when people are in trouble, we have to talk about it, and it is often too late. Everyone should be concerned about their mental health wellness and that of society. The world might be better off if we look closer at ourselves and the others surrounding us.

Mental health is more than the absence of a mental illness—it's essential to our overall health and quality of life. Mental health includes emotional, psychological, and social well-being. It affects how we think, feel, act, make choices, and relate to others. So mental health awareness is necessary for each of us to live peacefully. Self-care can play a role in maintaining our mental health and help support our treatment and recovery. It also can be essential to share with people who may not be aware that self-care aids in healing.

Self-care means taking the time to do things that help you live well and improve your physical and mental health. Even small acts of self-care in your daily life can have a significant impact. Regarding your mental health, self-care can help you manage stress, lower your risk of illness, and increase your energy. Some self-care options include regular exercise, eating healthy meals, staying hydrated, getting plenty of rest, and relaxing. Stress is the #1 culprit of anxiety, which leads to other issues. Practice gratitude, focus on positivity, and stay connected to family and friends.

Self-care looks different for everyone, and finding what you need and enjoy is essential. It may take trial and error to discover what works best for you. In addition, although self-care is not a cure for mental illnesses, understanding what causes or triggers your mild symptoms and what coping techniques work for you can help manage your mental health. We play a part in one another's mental wellness.

Language matters. When it comes to mental health, words matter. The language we use to discuss mental health can perpetuate prejudice and discrimination or promote acceptance and compassion.

When we use open and compassionate language around mental health issues, we empower ourselves and encourage others to find the help they need. So let us practice being aware of our mental health wellness and support others as best we can. Check-in on each other and make it easy to talk about and hear people's pain; this is building community, and we need each other more than ever in these days and times.

WINDSOR SOUP KITCHEN AT WASHINGTON STREET UMC

Windsor UMC continues helping with the noontime meal serving at Washington Street UMC Soup Cellar on the first Monday of the month. A bagged meal format and added social distancing precautions were initiated at the beginning of the Covid pandemic to safely continue to provide a meal for those in need. For the foreseeable future, the Soup Cellar plans to keep the bagged meal format.

On Windsor's March 6 serving day, 79 guests came to pick up a bagged meal of a sliced ham sandwich, orange, doughnut for dessert, a bottle of water and a cup of Terrence Chisholm's (Soup Cellar manager) homemade

pork and beans with rice soup. Ferrie Ward, Anita Schmidt, Debbo Lackore and Becky Leonard helped that morning.

The following month our serving day was April 3. Terrence's soup of the day was hamburger with potatoes and vegetables. Ninety-one folks came through that morning to get soup along with a sliced ham sandwich, orange, doughnut, and bottle of water. Ferrie Ward, Anita Schmidt, Debbo Lackore, Noreen Doughty and Becky Leonard helped prepare and serve the meal that morning. As an additional treat, Debbo Lackore entertained the guests as they came to pick up their bagged lunch with her singing and ukelele strumming.

Soup is prepared every day, no matter the weather, because the guests like soup and it provides a lot of nutrition. At the beginning of Covid, soup was not initially being served and the guests were given two sandwiches, along with a fruit item, dessert and bottle of water. After several months, the Soup Cellar reinstated the soup when the doors were opened one morning with the guests chanting, "We want soup! We want soup!"
